Raleigh and Fayetteville Railroad, LLC (RFCC) RAIL This Raleigh and Fayetteville Railroad (RFCC) Master Rail Freight Assistance Agreement is for the improvement of railroad infrastructure, health, and safety within the State for the operating efficiency of rail corridors. Project specific work and funding shall be identified through separate written addenda to this Master Agreement.

U.S. Department of Agriculture U.S. Forest Service 11425

This Agreement with the U.S. Forest Service to continue funding for reimbursement of costs for work performed by USFS staff, primarily the existing NCDOT-USFS liaison working on NCDOT projects not covered by the Category 5 Master or the Category 6 Major Cost Recovery Agreements. The work covered by this agreement includes work that is not project specific or that occurs on projects prior to the identification of detailed study alternatives (for Merger projects) or prior to scope definition (other projects). The Department shall reimburse the U.S. Forest Service an amount not to exceed a maximum of \$460,000 for the five (5)-year period.

Town of Havelock Craven County BR-0074A 67074.3.1 1000017075 This Project consists of replacing bridges 91 and 92 on US 70 in Craven County. USDA US Forest Service Carteret County R-2514 34442 11423 This Project consists of construction of the multi-lane bypass of Jacksonville to New Bern. This agreement (16MJ-11081103721) is to reimburse the US Forest Service monitor the project for compliance with the project design features, minimization measures, and required mitigation measures. This amendment will extend the expiration date through December 31, 2027.

Division 3

CSX Transportation, Inc. (CSXT) Brunswick & New Hanover Counties P-5740A 48156 RAIL On October 2, 2009, the Department and CSXT entered into a Railroad Master Construction Agreement which detailed the terms and conditions by which CSXT would construct various rail safety improvements within the State of North Carolina. This Project Addendum No. 13 to the CSXT Railroad Master Construction Agreement covers rail improvements to the CSXT rail line along the Wilmington Beltline in Brunswick and New Hanover Counties, North Carolina. The project will construct tie and rail rehabilitation, bridge rehabilitation, curve realignments, upgrading switches, and installing track signals between CSXT's Davis Yard and 3rd Street (excluding three fixed bridges) in order to increase train speed from 10 mph to a maximum of 25 mph and bring FRA safety designation from Class 1 to Class 2. CSXT will be responsible for construction of the project. The total estimated cost to the Department is \$33,000,000.

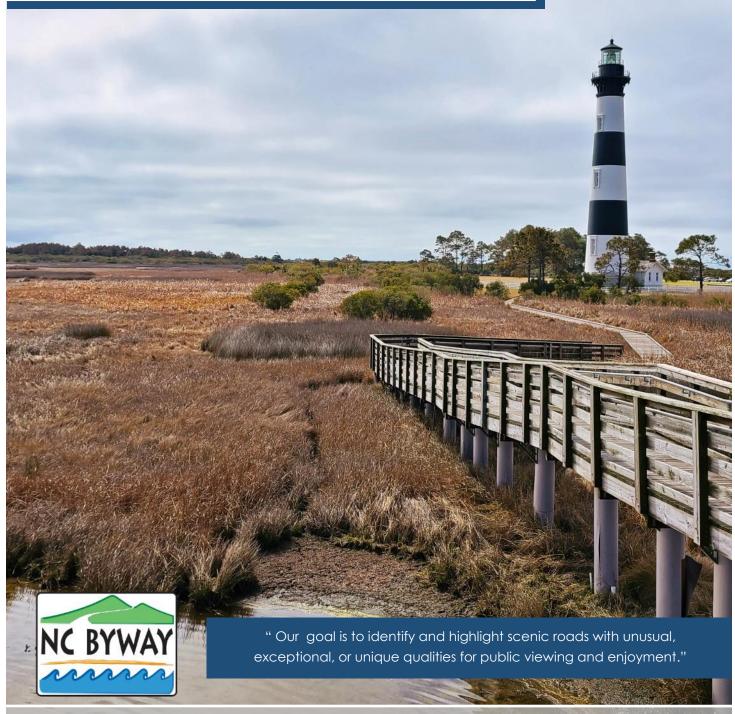

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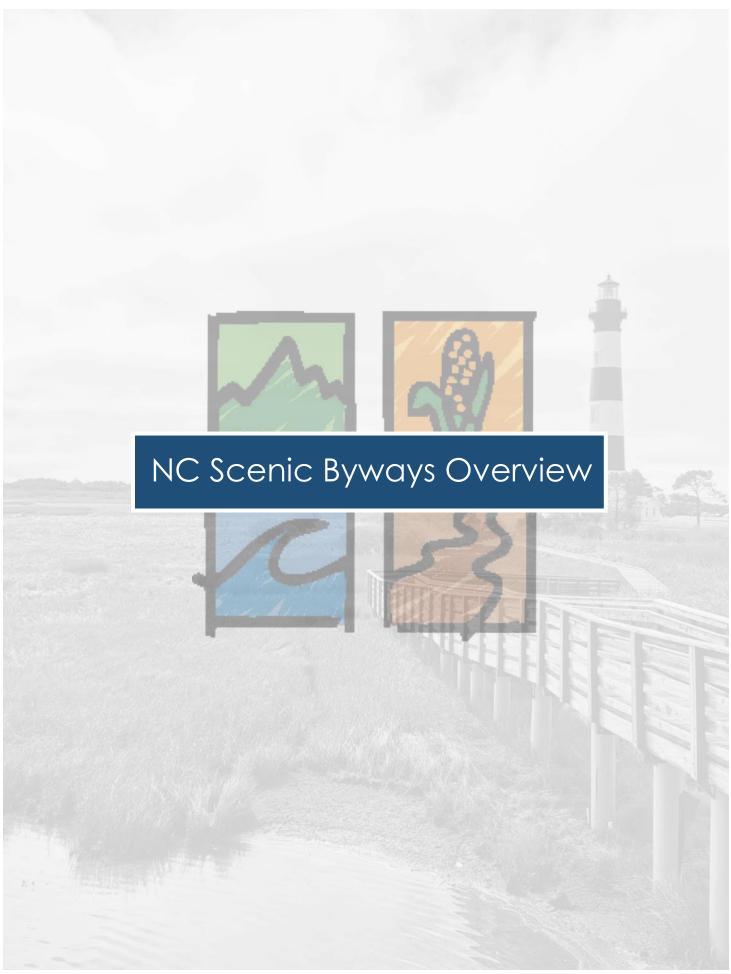

Since it inception in 1990, the N.C. Department of Transportation has designated 62 scenic byways to give visitors and residents a chance to experience North Carolina's history, geography, and culture, while also raising awareness for the protection and preservation of these treasures. Byways are carefully selected to portray the diverse beauty and culture of the Tar Heel State and provide travelers with safe and interesting alternate travel routes. These byways are intended as an alternative to the faster-paced traffic and commercial areas found along our state's major highways and interstates. Following the byways, motorists will see some of North Carolina's most breathtaking scenery, from the Blue Ridge Mountains to the fertile plains of the Piedmont to the crystal blue shores of the coast. The routes vary in length from 1.5 to 173 miles and are clearly marked with highway signs with the Scenic Byways logo. North Carolina Scenic Byways are selected based on natural, cultural, and historic features along the route. Motorists will see little or no development along the routes that detracts from the natural character and quality of the byway.

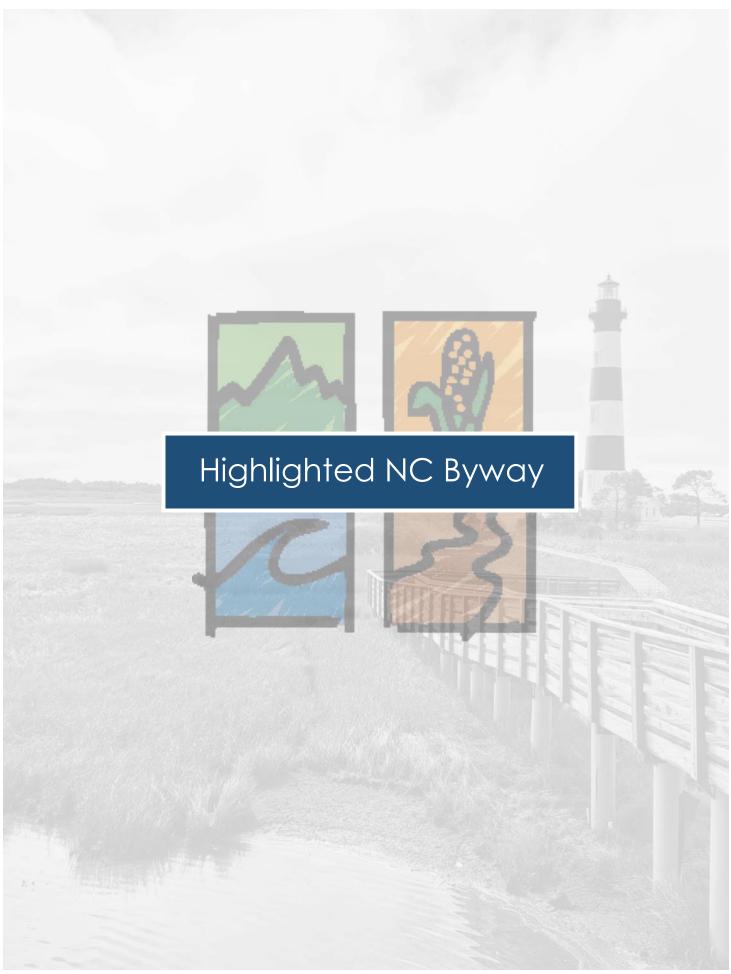

Little Parkway



Built in 1889 by men and mules as a toll road, Little Parkway, also known as Yonahlossee Trail (one of many privately-owned roads in the state), winds its way along the side of Grandfather Mountain and served as the link between Blowing Rock and Linville before the completion of the Blue Ridge Parkway in 1987. While traveling from Linville to Blowing Rock, watch for signs marking the Eastern Continental Divide, an invisible line that separates the waters flowing to the Atlantic Ocean from those flowing to the Gulf of Mexico.

- This grant opportunity will result in the distribution of up to \$22 million that are currently available. If additional funding is provided for the NSBP during FY 2022, FHWA intends to use those funds for projects selected to receive a grant under this NOFO. This notice identifies selection criteria, application requirements, and technical assistance during the grant

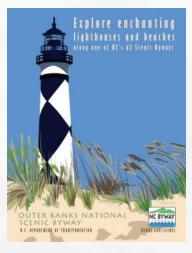
solicitation period for this one-time solicitation. The FHWA will distribute these funds, as described in this notice, on a competitive basis in a manner consistent with the selection criteria. For the 2022 NSBP grants, FHWA seeks projects that meet the statutory eligibility and advance one or more of the four goals: (1) Safety; (2) Equity and Accessibility; (3) Economic Strength; and (4) Climate and Sustainability.

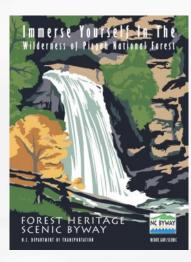
- NC Scenic Byways worked with Programs Management and four byway groups (Dare Co., Surry Co., Blue Ridge Pkwy Assoc., & NPS) to prepare, organize, and submit five grant applications worth a combined total of \$6,678,809. Applications were submitted on June 14th, 2022.
- Application results have not been announced as of 2/2/2023
- \$20 million in additional funding has been appropriated for 2023 by the FHWA and National Scenic Byways Program. The FHWA plans to announce another NOFO in 2023.

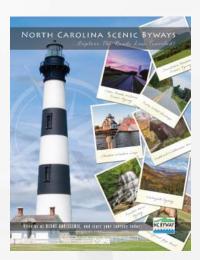


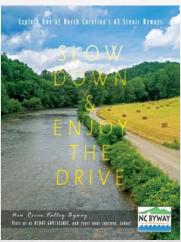

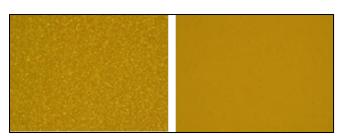

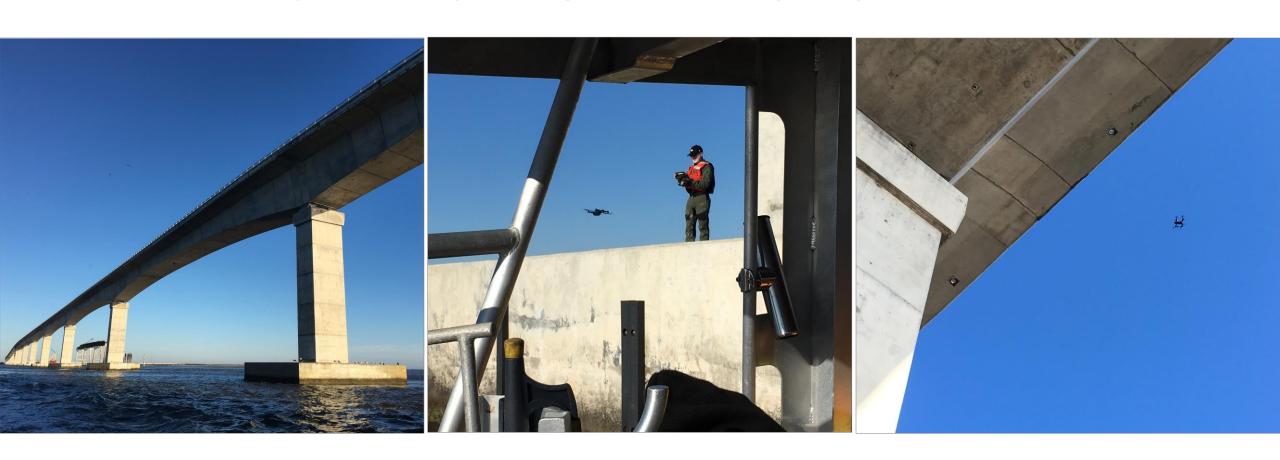

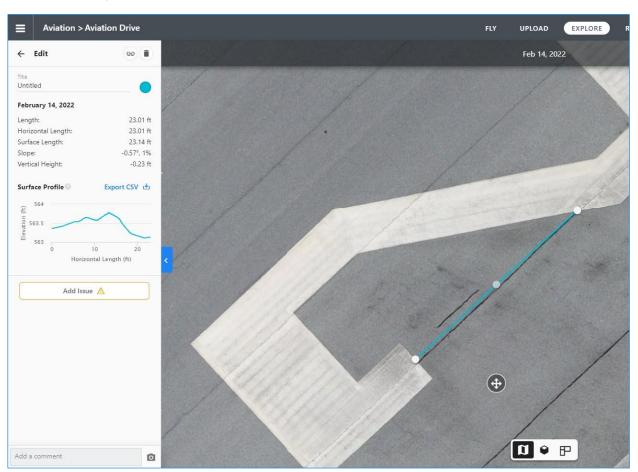

State and federal revenue have recovered from negative variances from the prior 2 months. First quarter Sales Tax revenue from DOR is expected to be recognized in October. Accelerated Build NC billings occurred to close out 2020B Bond Series.	
DISCUSSION SUMMARY	Expenses. First quarter expenses are lower than forecast by \$162.3M or 8.1% in September. Largest variances remain in Construction (\$82.4m) and Maintenance (\$75.9m) programs due to material and labor issues. Over 77% of September cost were to external parties. Mobility & Modernization, Contract Resurfacing, and Bridge Program showing the largest difference in Maintenance. Areas are expended at higher levels than the previous year.	
	Biennial Budget Formulation. Biennial budget process started and agency submittals are due to OSBM by Nov. 23rd (fall of even numbered years). Base

	Federal Update. Continuing Appropriations Act was passed for continued operations thru Dec 16th for a 77-day period. Per FHWA Notice N4520.277 (10/20/22), NC received \$252.7m in Obligational Authority. Currently developing strategies to position NC for August Redistribution next year based on the potential of high-level spending of additional billing authority.	
	SAS has provided DOT new analytic forecasting that we are continuing to validate internally w/ E&Y. SAS will have additional economic variables in the forecast which will be tested further in the coming months. Additional functionality will be developed to fully see actuals and forecasted cost by phase of work (Preliminary Engineering, Right of Way, Construction).

4. Advance Construction – Leigh Wing, ST	IP EASTERN REGION MANAGER	
	Leigh Wing discussed what an Advance Construction is and why it is beneficial. Advance Construction (AC) allows FHWA to authorize a project without obligating federal funds. FHWA determines project eligibility for federal funding but does not commit to funding the project.	
	AC requires state funds availability to pay for all projects until reimbursement is made. In addition, there needs to be a stable federal program.	
DISCUSSION SUMMARY	Traditional funding requires full obligation authority and budget authority when authorizing funds. With AC, we can obligate funding over several years rather than at the beginning of a project.	
	Session Law 2020-91 required DOT to submit a report to the GA about the use of AC at NCDOT.	
	There are 2 types of AC, which are considered separately: GARVEE and Non-GARVEE. NC General Assembly has statutory limits in place thus the policy did not require additional tests for GARVEE.	
	For non-GARVEE AC, we use 2 tests to ensure AC usage is monitored prudently.

	Mr. Tasaico started off with the Federal Aid presentation stating the Continuing Appropriations Act was passed for continued operations thru Dec. 16th for a 77-day period. NC received \$252.7m in Obligational Authority. NC ranks 9th in Obligation Authority but 5th in August redistribution.
DISCUSSION SUMMARY	Mr. Tasaico then discussed the Quarterly Revenue Update. Overall State revenues were 3.4% below original forecast. The cause for the underperforming revenues is due to motor fuel tax (MFT) and highway use tax (HUT). MFT were 4.8% below forecast and HUT were 3.4% below forecast due to the current economic conditions. The DMV Fees and Interest helped reduce the drop in revenue by giving us 1.6% more revenues than forecast.

The second half will be distributed by January 2023 to 508 municipalities. Largest recipient was Charlotte (\$13.6M); Smallest recipient was Falkland (\$1.1K).

Obligation of Pre-Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) Apportionments

March 1, 2023

Summary



- There is a major disconnect in Pre-BIL Contract Authority balances between two key DOT financial management systems: DOT's accounting system of record (Delphi) and the Federal Highway Administration's grants management system (FMIS)
- Information in these two systems should match, but instead, DOT and FHWA have determined that balances of Pre-BIL Contract Authority in FMIS are approximately \$3.5B greater than Delphi
- The discrepancy dates to FY 2005 and prior fiscal years and after exhaustive efforts, the specific cause(s) of the funding discrepancy have not been identified
- **The two systems must be reconciled**. Over the next few months, DOT and FHWA are reexamining financial transactions in 2004-2005 to reaffirm FHWA's prior analysis
- In October, pre-BIL contract authority was not made available to the States. FHWA made some of the pre-BIL funding available while the reconciliation plan is finalized
- This issue does not impact the overall or state-by-state total highway spending allowed by law.

Contract Authority & Obligation Limitation



- Contract Authority is a special type of budget authority that allows FHWA to enter into obligations in advance of an appropriation
- Contract Authority has a Period of Availability of 4 years, unless specified otherwise in law, and provides the States with flexibility that helps them in planning long term-major highway construction projects
- Unlike funding that is provided by the Appropriations Committees, the annual amount of Contract Authority is established by the authorizing Committees in multi-year surface authorization acts (e.g., IIJA)
- At the beginning of each fiscal year, Contract Authority is distributed by a statutory formula to the States for apportioned programs
- The Appropriations Committees have their own tool for controlling spending. They establish an Obligation Limitation which sets a ceiling on how much Contract Authority can be obligated in a given time period -- generally annually for Federal-aid Highways

FHWA Guidelines



Use of Pre-BIL Apportioned Funding Subject to Formula Obligation Limitation

- States may de-obligate pre-BIL funds and re-obligate funding in same program code.
- States may obligate pre-BIL funding for
 - ➤ Programs not continued by BIL, or
 - Funds set to lapse (expire) at the end of this fiscal year
- States should refrain from obligating pre-BIL funding for any program continued by BIL.
 - NC's amount \$75.7 million of the \$4.3 billion national total
 - If justified, may obligate 5% of \$75.7 million

The Fast Five



Revenues



- Revenues are within -3.9% of the forecast for the year.
- Motor Fuel Tax, Highway Use Tax, and DMV Fees are in alignment with forecast.
- Optimized FHWA billings will be realized in future periods due to receiving Obligational Authority in February.



Expenditures



- FYTD expenditures are 11.3% less than forecast but nearly 22% higher as compared to SFY 22.
- Construction expenditures picked up in the last two months taking advantage of the mild weather; However, largest variances remain in Construction (\$286M) & Maintenance (\$225M) due to material and labor issues.
- Mobility & Modernization and Bridge Program showing the largest difference in Maintenance.



Forecasting



- Forecast data with SAS and Ernst & Young models current and future projects transitioning away from the short-term economic factor approach implemented last year.
- Challenges remain in predictive modeling with economic factors applied for the Long Term modeling.
- DOT has transitioned to the Hybrid Modeling approach this month.



Consensus Forecast



- Biennial consensus revenue forecast for the Highway Fund and Trust Fund was released.
- Revised revenues align with the Apr 22 forecast: Anticipating overcollections of 0.4% among the two funds.
- Total revenue for both funds is projected to rise from \$4.79B in FY23 to \$5.16B FY24 and \$5.64B in FY25.
- Per S.L. 2022-74, sales tax will help increase revenues by \$207M in FY23; \$419M in FY24 and \$643M in FY25.
- Projected growth in MFT and HUT collections in both years of the biennium. DMV fees will increase in FY25.



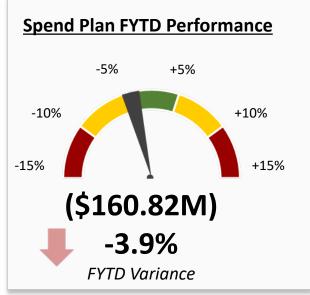

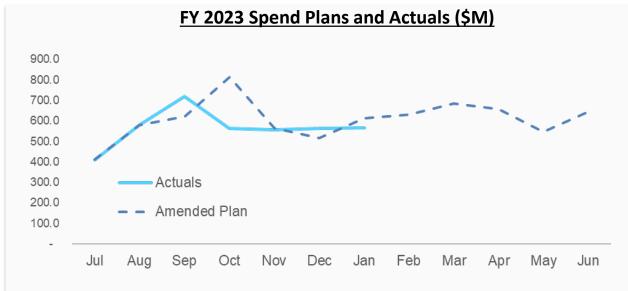


- There is a contract authority (funding) discrepancy between two Federal DOT systems in an amount of \$3.5B.
- This issue is prior to the Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act.

- North Carolina total is \$75.7M with an allowance of \$3.8M to close projects and prevent lapsing federal dollars. (i.e.Texas \$591M, Tenn 335.6M, New Jersey \$276M)

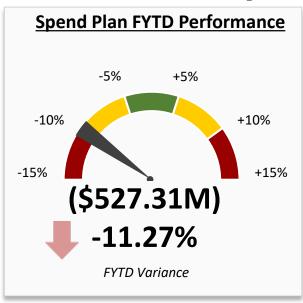

Expense Commentary

- Overall negative FYTD variance to spend plan is -11.3% or \$-527.3M; attributable to Construction and Maintenance.
- Total monthly expenditures (-1.9%) are in line with forecast due to Construction's larger STIP projects being able to progress, taking advantage of mild winter weather with no major snow/ice events.
- FYTD overall Construction and Maintenance expenditures continue to fall behind forecast due to labor and material shortages.
- Overall expenditures are up YOY, increasing by 21.7%

- Payout projections for projects with significant variance between the Long-Term and Short-Term models are analyzed to create the Hybrid Forecast. As of February 2023, payout curves for 28 active projects were modified to create the Hybrid forecast using actual project specific payouts.

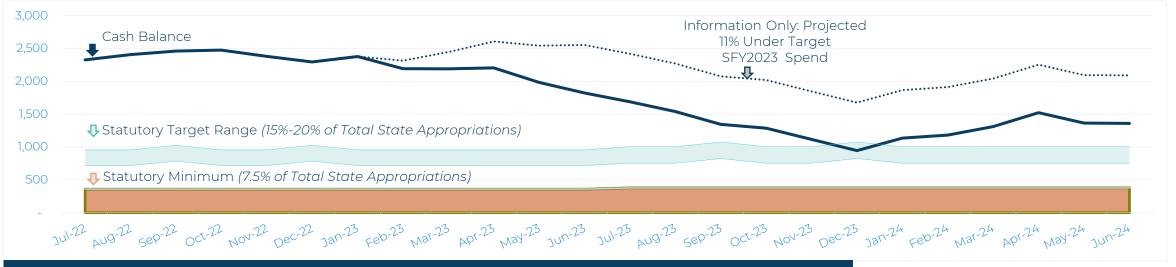

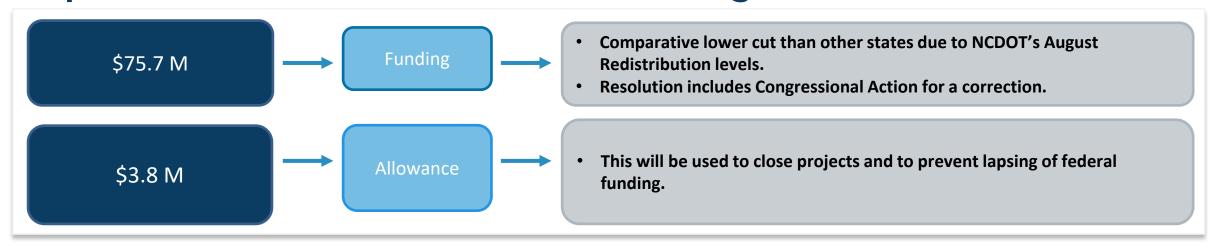
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Detailed Report

FHWA Financial Reconciliation Issue Notification

- There is a disconnect in Pre-Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) contract authority balances between two key Federal DOT financial management systems:
 - Delphi USDOT's accounting system of record and
 - FMIS Federal Highway Administration's grants management system
- USDOT and FHWA determined that balances of Pre-IIJA Contract Authority in FMIS are approximately \$3.5B greater than Delphi.
 - A contractor worked with FHWA to reconcile FMIS and Delphi; The discrepancy dates to FY 2005 and prior fiscal years.
 - FHWA was unable to identify the specific cause(s) of the funding discrepancy; reconciliation efforts continue
 - The two systems must be reconciled DOT and FHWA are reexamining financial transactions in 2004-2005
- FHWA has made some pre-IIJA funding available to States for limited purposes ensuring an adequate balance remains in Delphi.

Original Spend Plan



- Original Spend Plan was approved by the Board of Transportation and the Office of State Budget & Management June 8, 2022 and May 31, 2022, respectively.
- Revenues were based on the consensus revenue forecast from May 2022.
- The underlying budget used for the spend plan was the Certified Budget for SFY 2023 and the SFY 2023 Continuation Budget less nonrecurring items for SFY 2024.



Spend Plan Amendment #1



- Spend Plan Amendment #1 was approved by the Board of Transportation and the Office of State Budget & Management August 11, 2022 and August 9, 2022, respectively.
- Changes were made to include sales tax revenue per Session Law 2022-74 Section 42.3
- Total expenditures increased by \$135 million due to inclusion of Session Law 2022-74 Section 41.9 Time-Limited Cost Escalation Adjustment. Vendors shall make claims within 60 days of the enactment of the act, (July 11, 2022) and the Department shall issue a written decision within 30 days of a claim.

Amendment #2



- Spend Plan Amendment #2 was approved by the Board of Transportation and the Office of State Budget & Management October 5, 2022.
- Revenues were updated due to August Redistribution, SL 2022-74, SCIF Section J Item 21, Ferry Division capital projects, and Section H Items 26-35, and revised federal revenue from FAA and FRA to correspond with Aviation and Rail Division projected federal expenditures.
- Expenditures were adjusted largely due to target changes for SL 2022-74 and forecasting adjustments

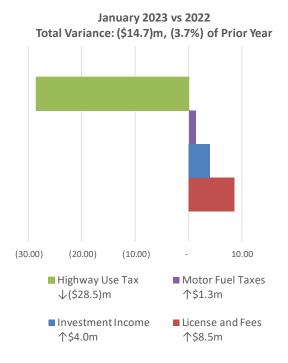

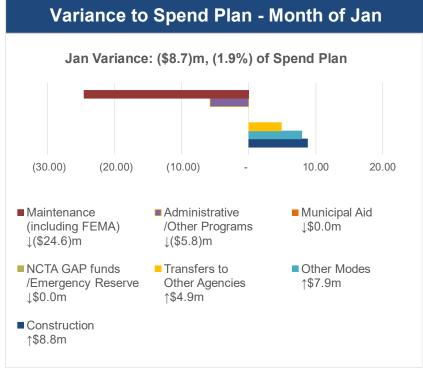

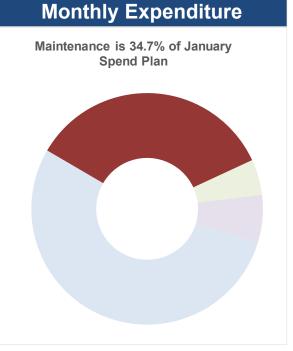

Maintenance Expenditure Variances – Monthly (\$M)

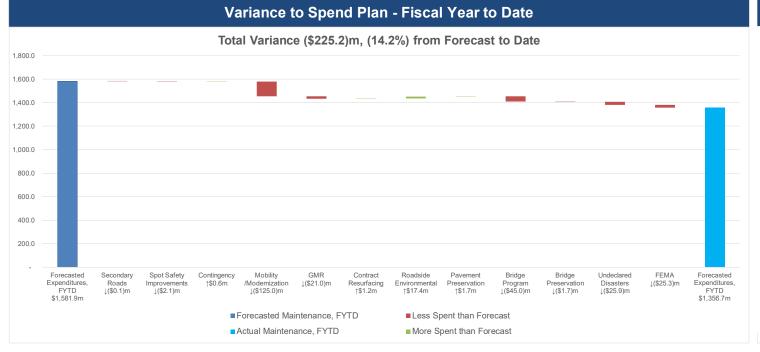

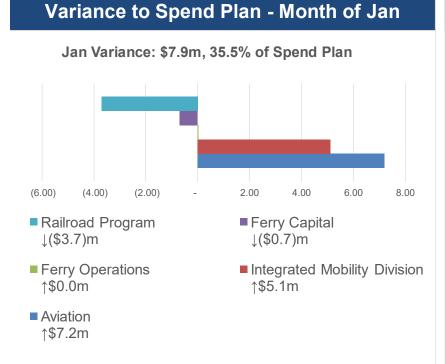

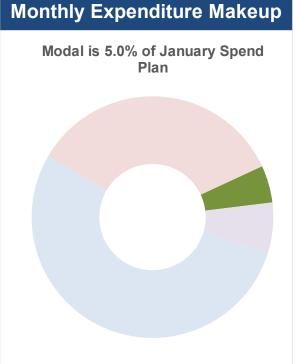

Modal Expenditure Variances – Monthly (\$M)

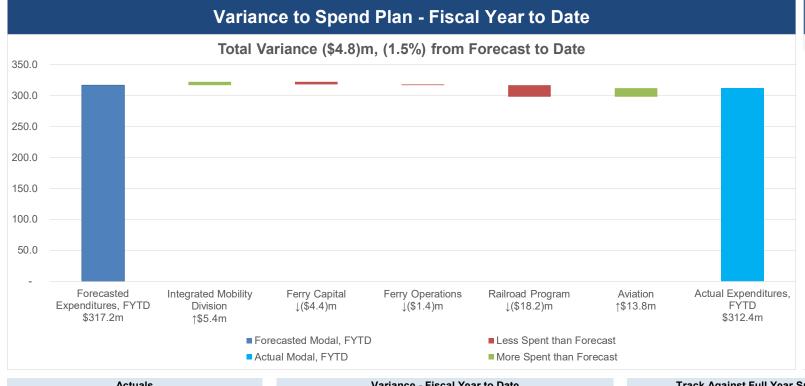

Modal Expenditure Summary and Variances – FYTD (\$M)



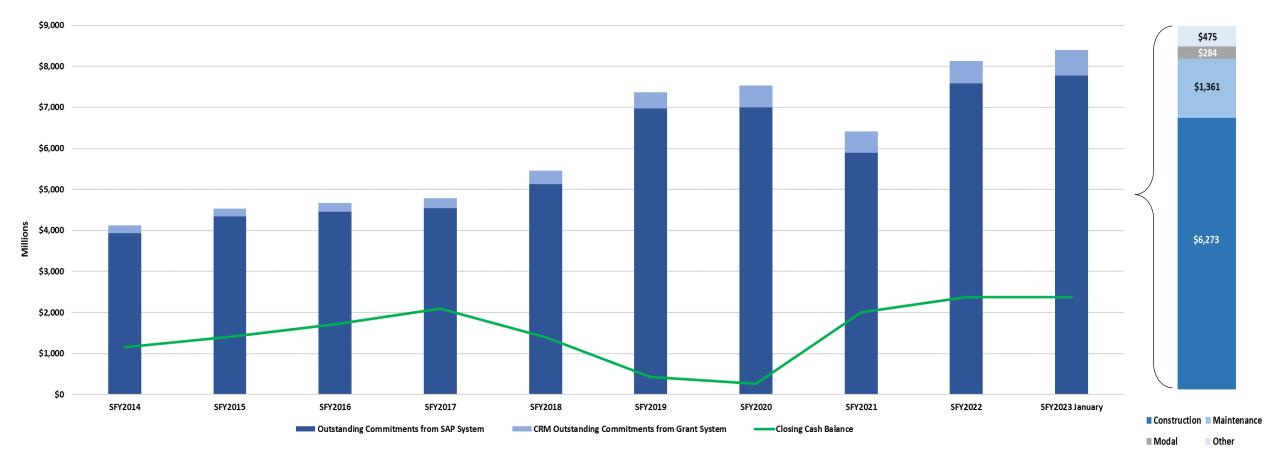

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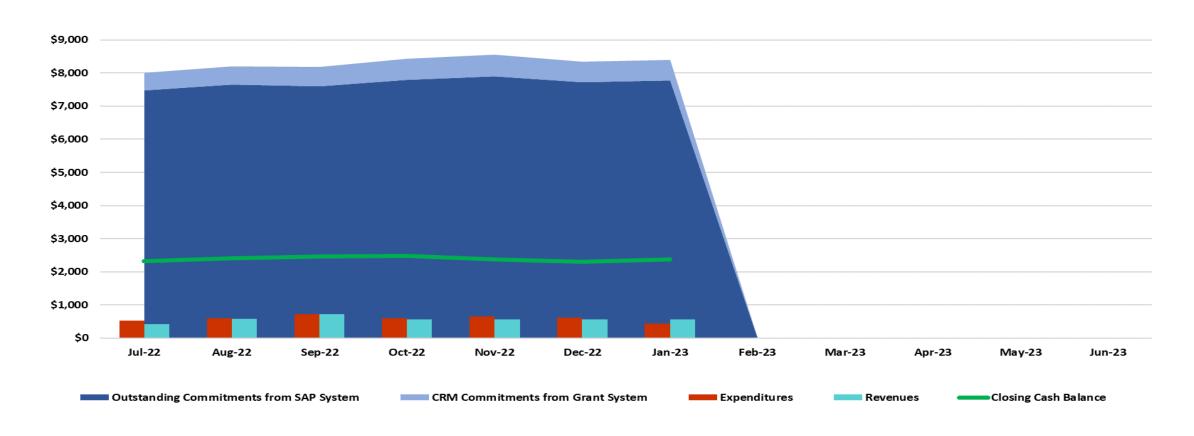
NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by State Fiscal Year

NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by Month



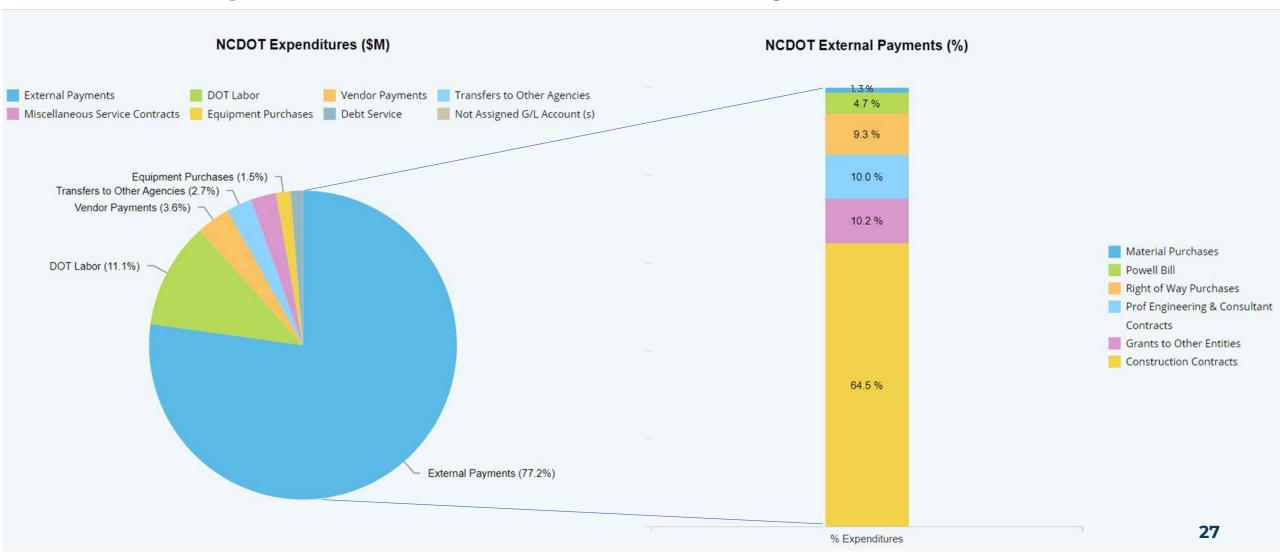

Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee

January 2023 – Reporting Required

- N.C.G.S 143C-6-11(m) requires DOT to report each month when the department's combined average daily cash balance for the month is outside of the statutory target range.
- For January 2023, the **combined average daily cash balance** of the Highway Fund and the Highway Trust Fund was \$2.24 billion.
- The cash target amounts representing 15% and 20% of the total appropriations for the current fiscal year are \$716 million and \$955 million, respectively.
- The closing cash balance for January was \$2.38 billion which is above the target range and above the minimum cash balance requirement of \$358 million under N.C.G.S. 143C-6-11.

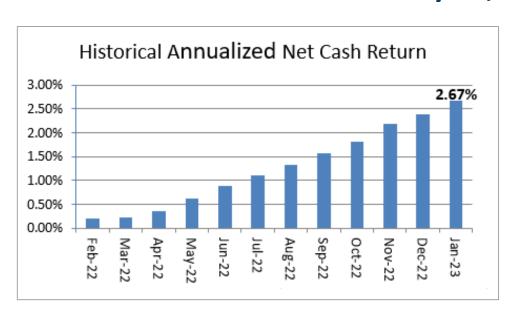

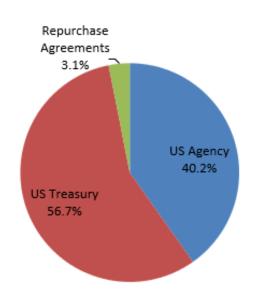


North Carolina Short Term Portfolio (STIF)

STIF Allocation



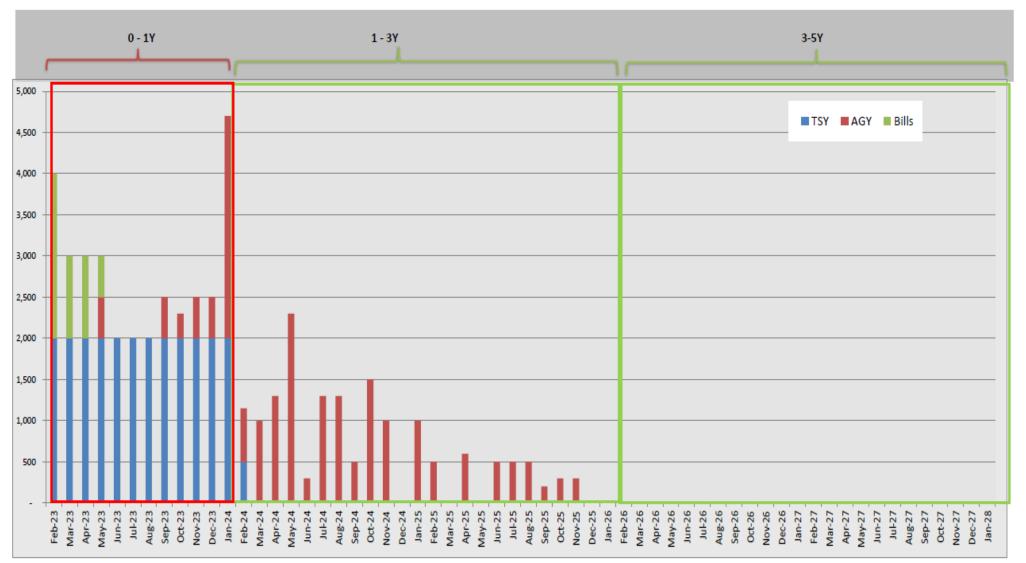

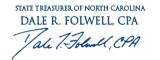
Short Term Portfolio (STIF) Maturity Profile

as of 1/31/23

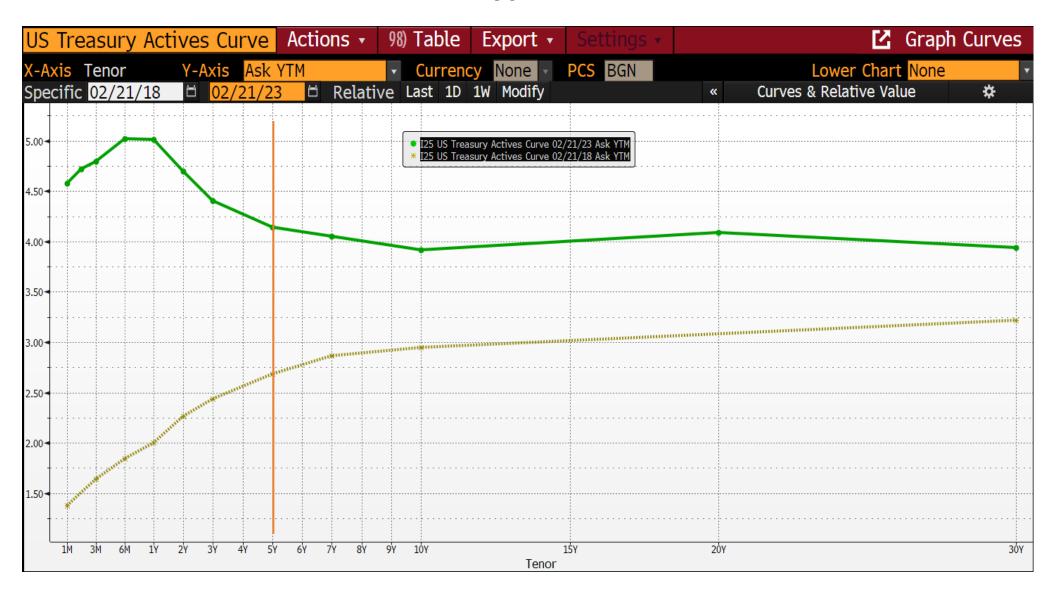

Inverted vs Typical Yield Curve

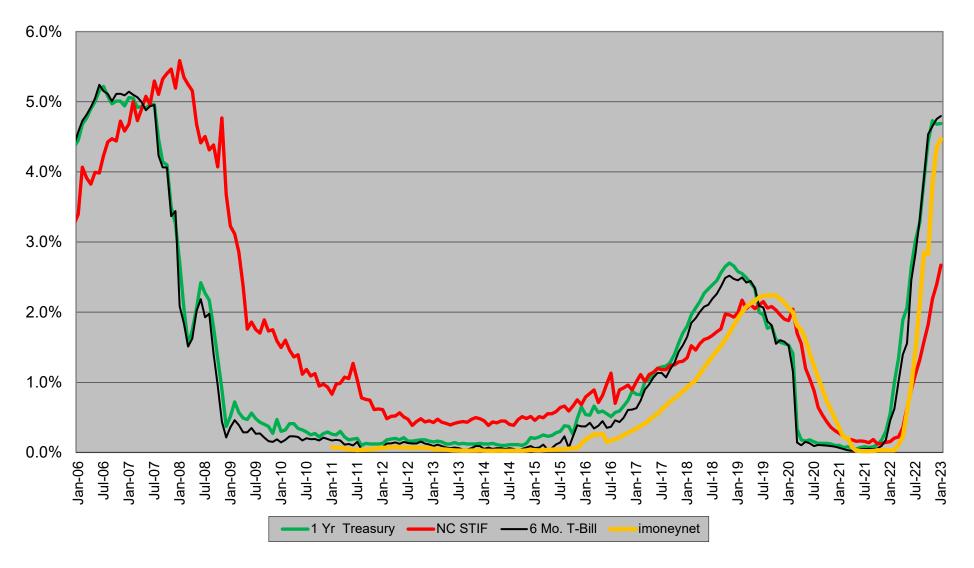






Short Term Portfolio (STIF) Rate History

He explained how DOT contracts outline the work to be performed, detail how compensation will be provided, and establish contract times and key dates.							
DISCUSSION SUMMARY	After contract award, however, many factors may prompt the need to change or adjust contract terms. Examples include:

	There are two main types of contractual adjustments: (1) Supplemental Agreements and (2) Claims.							



HIGHWAYS COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Supplemental agreements are written agreements between contractor(s) and the Department that formally amend the contract. Claims are requests for additional compensation or additional contract time. There are four (most common) bases for supplemental agreements:

- Extra Work
- Altered Work
- Overruns and Underruns
- Value Engineering

Processes for how the Department handles supplemental agreements and claims were explained. (1) The contractor or NCDOT identifies an issue not covered in the contract, or recognizes changes; (2) the contractor notifies NCDOT and requests additional compensation for the work; (3) if NCDOT agrees, the price and time are negotiated, and a supplemental agreement is executed; (4) if NCDOT does not agree, the contractor can notify NCDOT of their intent to file a claim; (5) Work is performed; (6) if work is in dispute, the contractor files a claim.

Mr. Tharrington discussed key points about claims:

- NCDOT claims processes are essential to keep projects moving forward
- The process protects both the industry and NCDOT by providing a mechanism to resolve disputes
- Claims can be resolved during active construction or after project completion
- NCDOT has developed closeout conference procedures to resolve issues in formal discussion

The presentation ended with a brief overview of DBE contract awards.

Discussion followed.

3. Preparing for Connected and Autonomous Vehicles Presented by Mr. Kevin Lacy, PE

DISCUSSION SUMMARY

The second presentation, titled *Preparing for Connected and Autonomous Vehicles*, was provided by Mr. Kevin Lacy, Director of Strategic Planning and Programming. Mr. Lacy began the presentation with an overview of the autonomous and connected vehicle industry.

Time-Limited Cost Escalation Adjustment legislation included in SL 2022-74(HB 103), Section 41.9(a) and signed into law July 11, 2022.

\$135 MIL appropriated to address precipitous rise in material prices.

Department developed process for claim submittals outlined in memorandum to Industry Partners on July 12th, 2022.

Distribution included all qualified prime contractors, subcontractors, and material suppliers.

All requests for price adjustments were to be submitted by no later than close of business on September 10, 2022.

Contract Eligibility Requirements

- Contracts awarded on or before March 1, 2022, where either contract performance was not completed, or the final estimate was not paid by this date.
- Material Requirements
 - Material must be purchased after July 1, 2020.
 - Material must have been or will be permanently incorporated into the work.
 - Required documentation to include price quotes, invoices for materials, or purchase order contracts.
 - Adjustments are for materials only and not for labor, transportation charges, profit, markup, etc.

Summary of Requests

- The Department received **457** material escalation requests on 457 unique projects.
- The total amount requested was **\$143,859,311.92.**
- The Department approved **\$67,492,048.50** for eligible materials upon first review.
- The Department provided a written decision to each Prime Contractor with the total amount approved as well as review comments relating to their submittal.

Appeals Process

- The Department provided opportunity to submit an appeal of the initial review decision.
- The Department received 223 appeals.
- The Department approved \$98,876,646.48 following the review of appeal submittals.

Bonus & Retention Program

- The Office of State Human Resources (OSHR) provided state agencies the ability to grant bonuses for hard-to-fill & retain positions.
 - This initiative aids in the employment for critical positions with labor market shortages affecting business needs and impairing delivery of essential services.
- Agencies may develop programs to provide bonuses for hard-to-fill occupations. Roles must have:
 - 1. Turnover rates significantly higher than acceptable, and/or
 - 2. Retention rates significantly lower than acceptable, and/or
 - 3. Vacancy rates significantly higher than acceptable.
- To be eligible, employees must
 - Be permanent employees, not be on probation, or leave of absence.
 - Not have received a sign-on bonus in the past 24 months from an NC agency for their job classification.
 - Have an overall performance evaluation of at least "Meets Expectations."
- Bonuses are NOT tied to goals, productivity, quality/accuracy of work, or attendance.

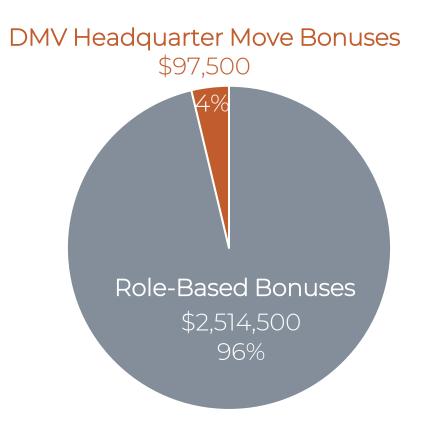
