On July 6, 2023, the Board approved an initial maintenance allocation totaling \$1,754,947,872. At the time of preparation of this agenda item, House Bill 259 had not been ratified by the General Assembly. However, staff recommends allocating an additional \$521,699,955.

Of the total additional funds, \$180,360,918 is from the current credit balance, \$2,000,000 from a Ferry loan repayment, and \$10,358,783 in previous year's undistributed funds resulting from various rate adjustments. The remaining \$328,980,254 is a recommended cashflow from future year allocations as detailed below:

The recommended cashflow funds will be distributed to the divisions to support and continue the operations and maintenance of the system, as well as ongoing contract activities, new contract lettings, and associated force account work and inspections.

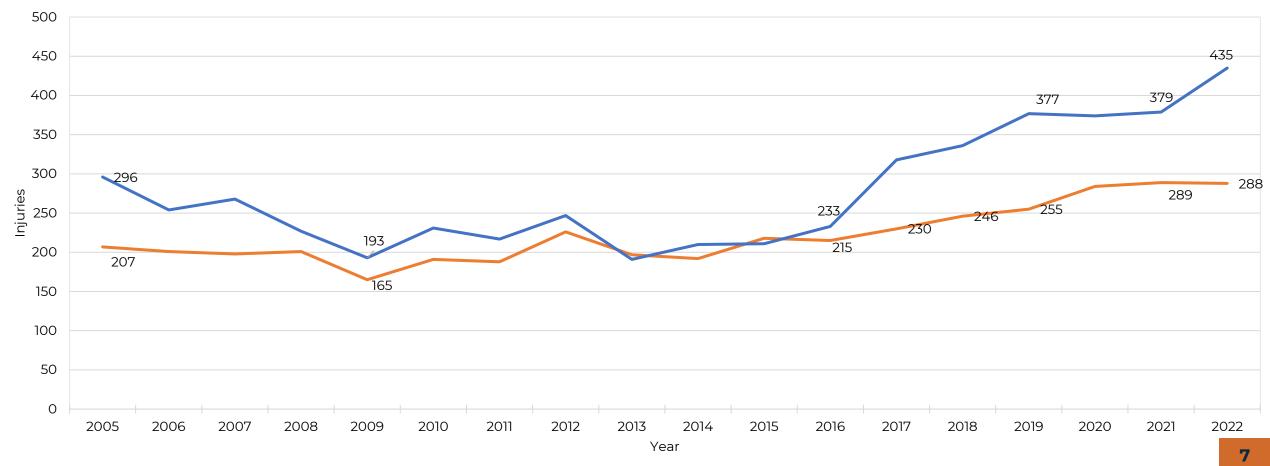

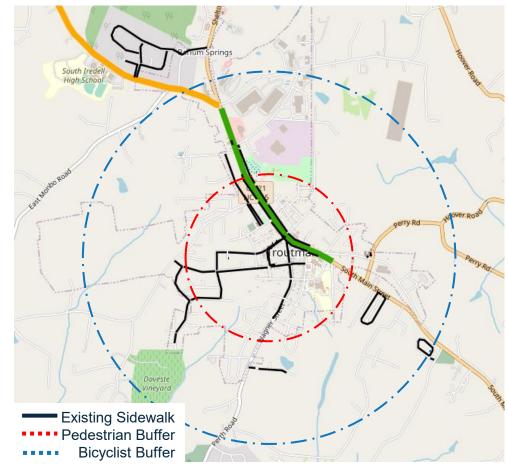
The Complete Streets Project Evaluation Methodology process serves as guidance to aid in the evaluation of highway projects for Complete Streets elements. This guidance is intended to support Project Leads and Managers throughout the PDN stages, beginning with all five steps in PDN Stage 1 and select steps revisited in PDN Stage 2. Project Leads and Managers should supplement this process with local conversations, detailed analysis of conditions, and engineering judgement to design the appropriate facility to meet identified needs.

REVISED RESTRICTIONS AND CONDITIONS FOR A LIMITED LEARNER PERMIT (LEVEL I)



- Effective May 1, 2023, a Teen Level 1 Driver issued before June 30, 2023, requires at least 6-months from issuance date when applying for Level 2 Limited Provisional License; requires a road test.
- The 6-month provision will sunset on December 31, 2023. On January 1, 2024, a Level 1 Teen Driver requires at least
 9 months of driving from the issuance date when applying for the Level 2.
- Beginning August 1, 2023, a Level 2 Driver, when driving unsupervised, there may be one passenger that is under 21 that is not a member of the same household as the driver if they are being driven to and from school; this is in addition to the existing provision allowing one passenger under 21 that is a family member or member of same household.

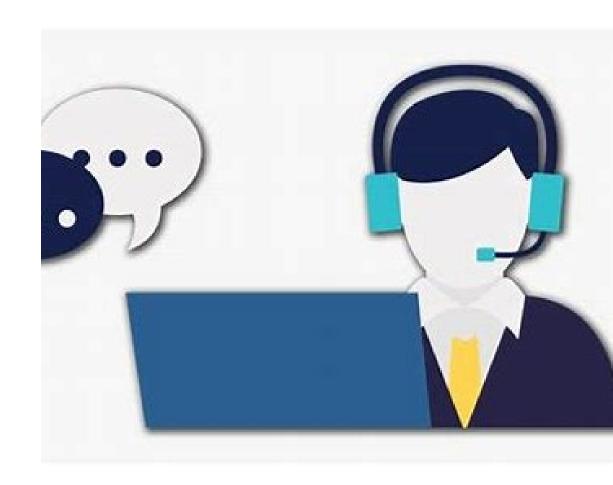

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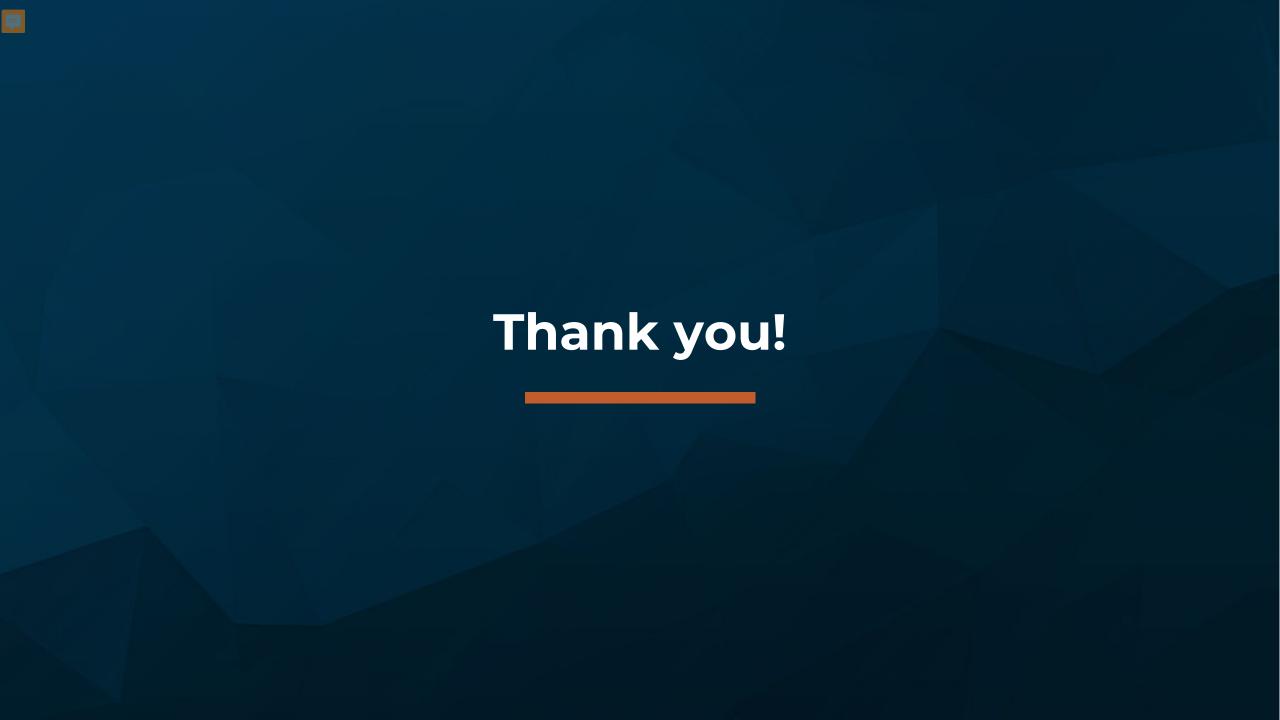

Enabling Legislation

General Statutes

§136-18(46) (2019)

Background

Law provides:

- Ability to enter into partnership agreements with private entities to finance, by contracts, revenues of facilities, and other financing methods authorized by law, the cost of acquiring, constructing, equipping, maintaining, and operating communications infrastructure supporting transportation infrastructure on the Interstate System.
- Ability to plan, design, develop, acquire, construct, equip, maintain, and operate communications infrastructure supporting transportation infrastructure within the State of North Carolina.
- Requires a competitive process

Information

• Per law, communications infrastructure supporting transportation infrastructure means fiber optic trunk lines, microcell towers or other broadband or data transmission facilities located within the right-of-way of the interstate or primary highway system that is owned, and utilized completely or partly, by the Department for traffic management, highway safety, vehicle technology integration, and other functions of the Department.

Action

• An agreement entered into under this subdivision requires the concurrence of the Board of Transportation. Report to JLTOC regarding contract details 60 days prior to signing.

Executive Order 91

March 14, 2019

- Establishing the Task Force on Connecting North Carolina
- Promoting Expansion of Access to High-Speed Internet
- Removing Barriers to Broadband Infrastructure Installation

Leveraging NCDOT Right of Way

Leveraging controlled access ROW to bridge rural connectivity gaps and fulfill its own ITS objectives

- Broadband connectivity is reliant on an end-to-end network which generally includes a long distance "middle mile" or "backbone" component that is connected to a shorter distance "last-mile" component to serve customers.
- In rural areas, there is often a shortage of both middle-mile and last mile networks. The
 installation of middle mile networks can provide a catalyst for the deployment of last mile
 networks, and bridge rural connectivity gaps.
- Controlled access ROWs may be attractive to developers as they could present a significant opportunity to install a backbone over long distances without having to navigate the complexities of multiple land purchases and/or easements.
- In addition to bridging rural connectivity gaps, controlled access ROW backbone networks provide NCDOT with broadband connectivity for the deployment of ITS infrastructure.
- As demonstrated with the I-95/US-70/US-74 Project, in exchange for providing ROW, NCDOT can share in the commercialization potential of the network and use this to offset its O&M and capital costs.

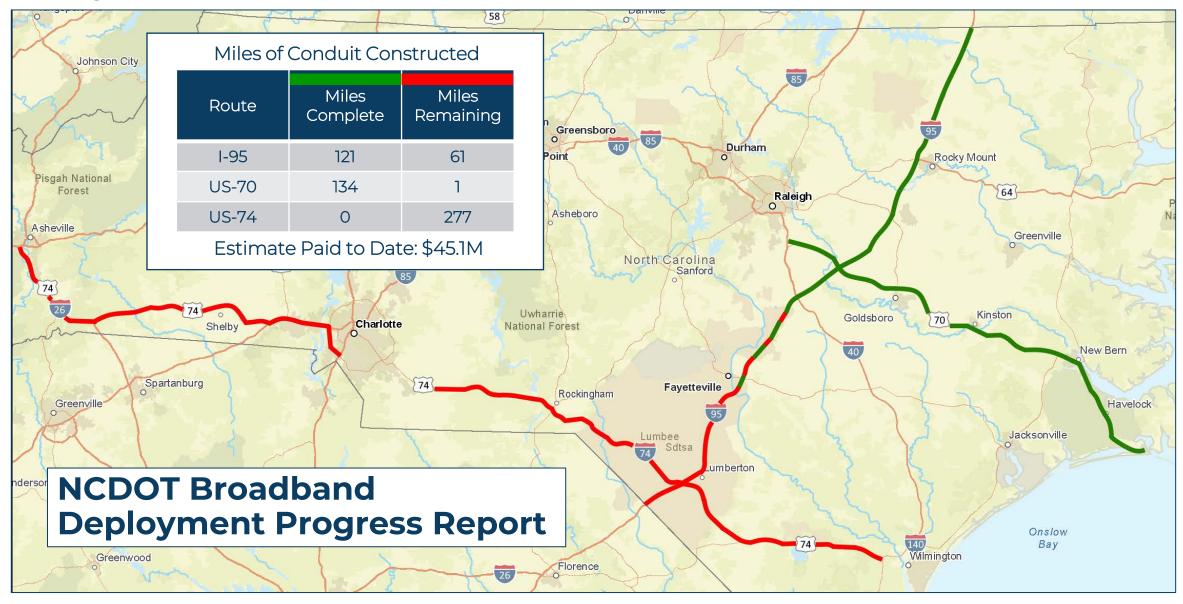

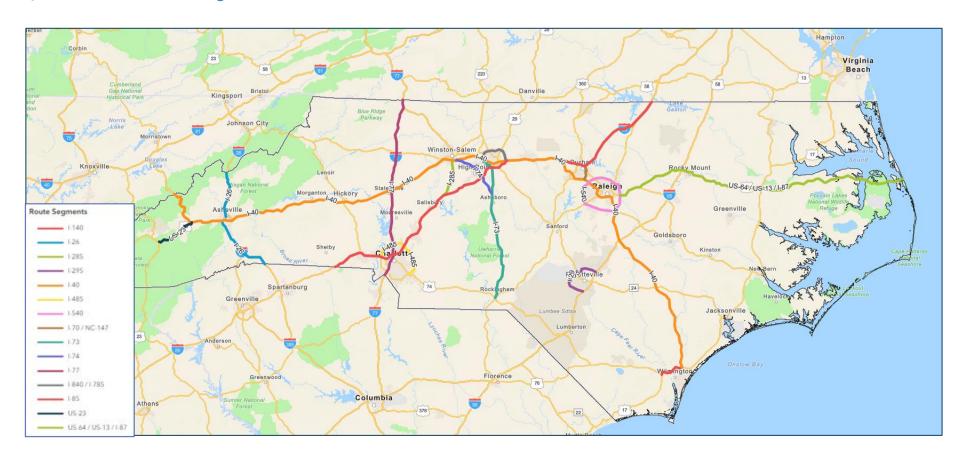

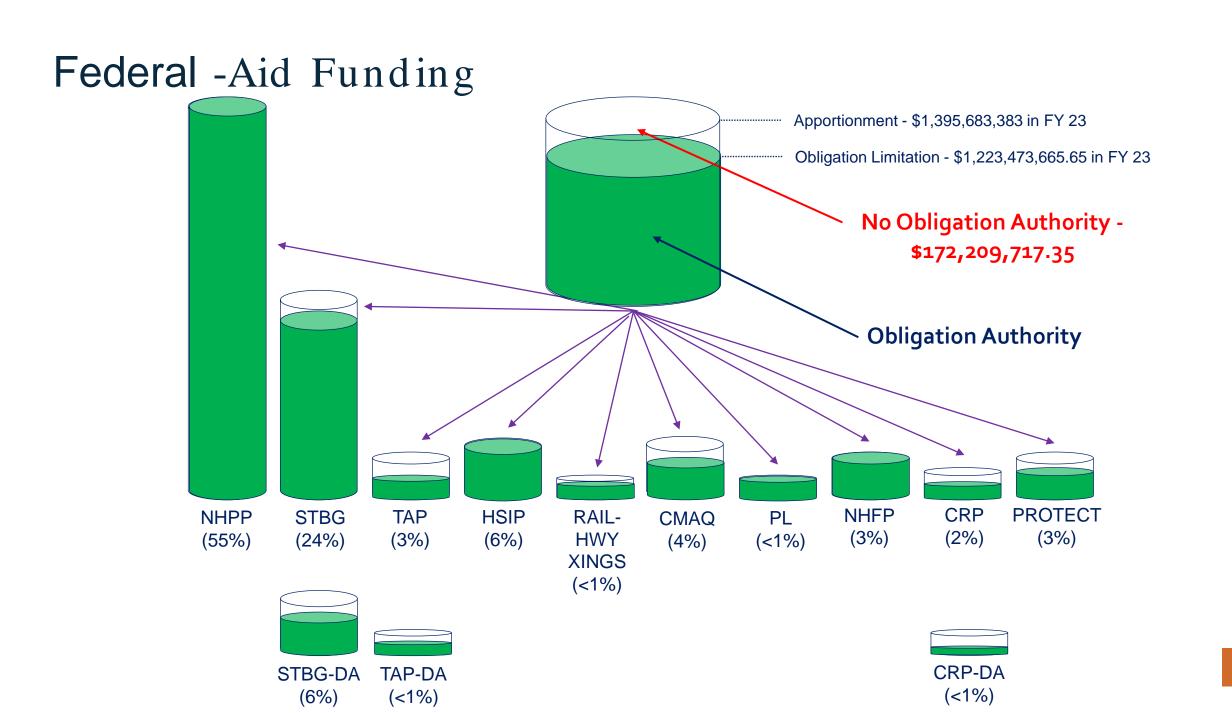

What is August Redistribution?

Where FHWA redistributes unused obligation authority (OA) from federal programs that won't use their OA for that federal fiscal year to states that can use it

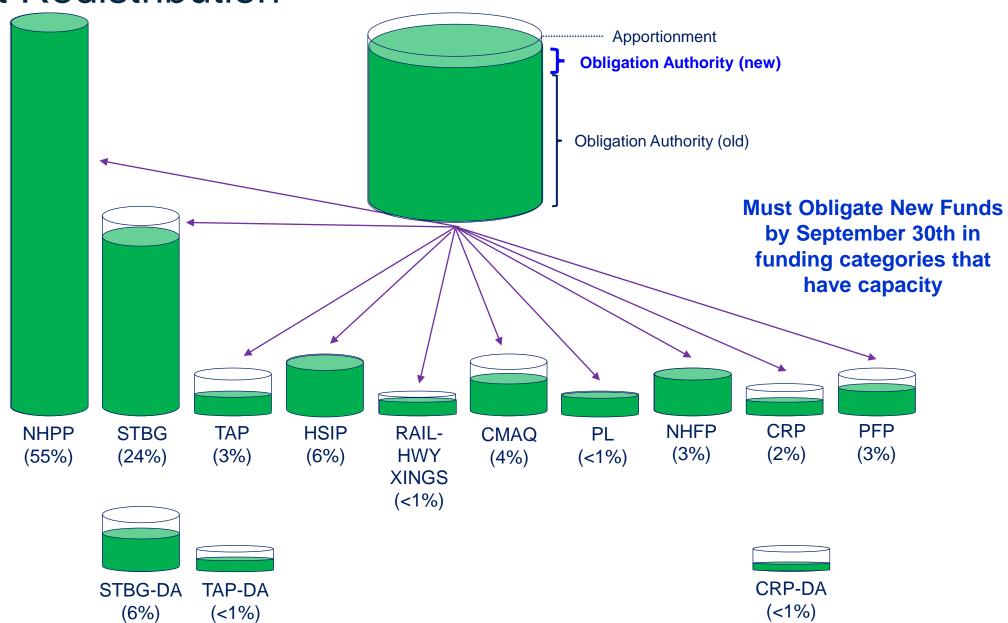
- Occurs each summer
- Think of OA as federal funding

Each July, NCDOT submits a request for add'l OA we can use by Sept. 30th

By Aug. 30th, FHWA notifies each state how much add'l OA they'll receive.

Key to a larger request is to obligate as much federal funding in each of the different federal funding categories as possible

• Biggest challenge is authorizing funds in categories with Locally Administered Projects



Where does additional Obligation Authority (new funding) go?

- Must be obligated by September 30th

- Largest variances are in Construction (\$85.8M) due to material and labor issues.



August Redistribution



- We seek to maximize federal highway funding
- Each July, we submit a request to FHWA for additional funding obligation authority August Redistribution.
- This year's August Redistribution notification of \$264,828,202 was received last week.



Economic Update



- NC showed signs of economic health in July, including employment and GDP growth.
- Lower labor force participation and unemployment rates may lead to a tighter NC labor market.
- July's CPI suggests a decrease in inflationary pressures, but an increase in August oil prices may signal increased pressures.

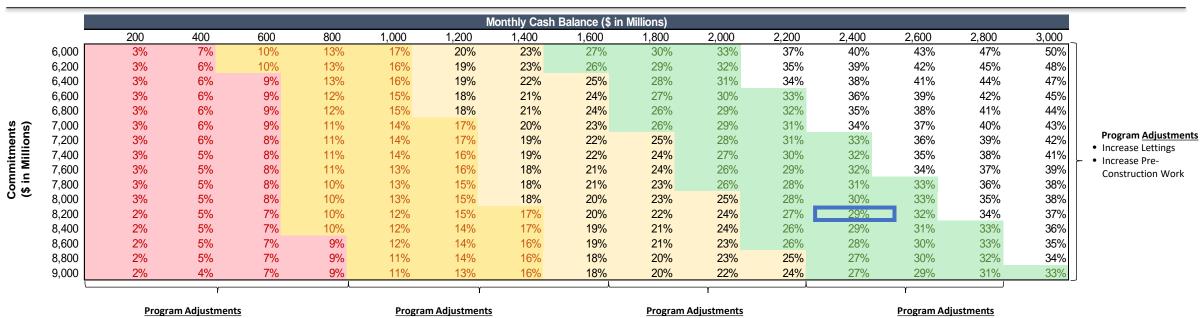

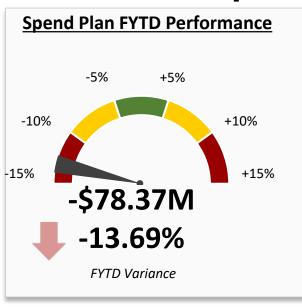


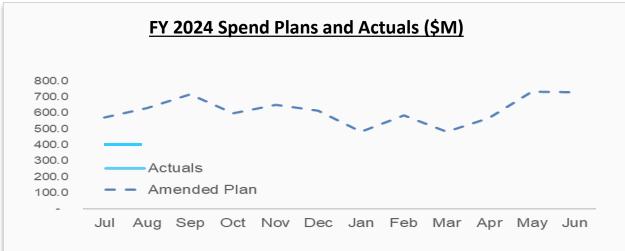
Revenue Commentary

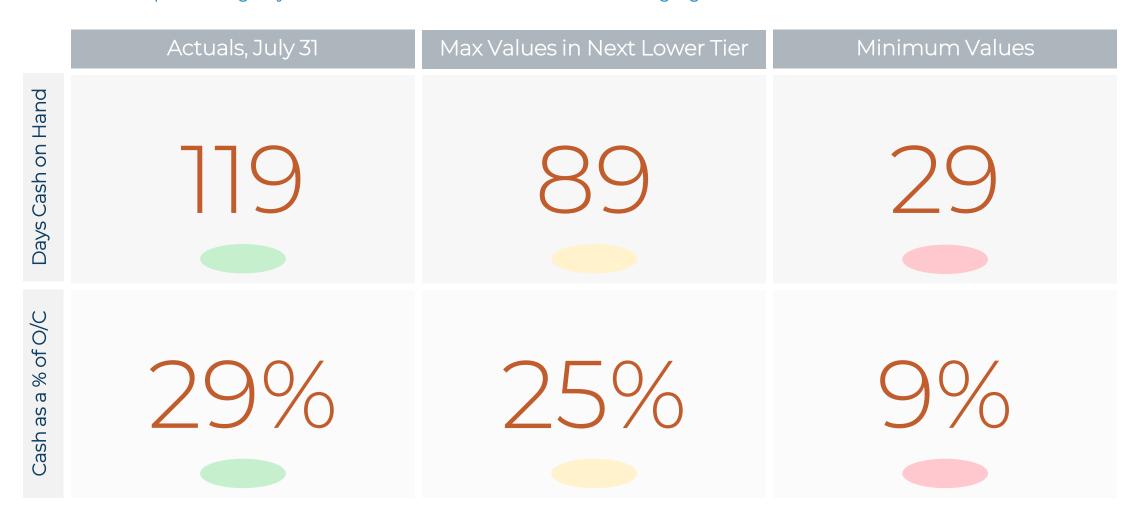

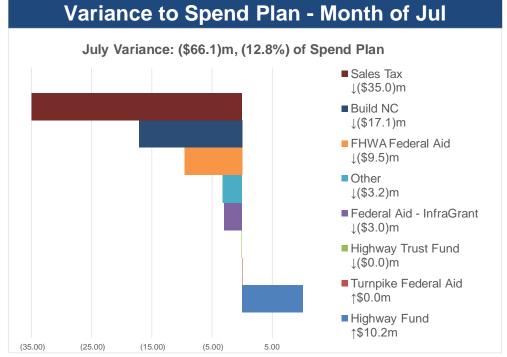

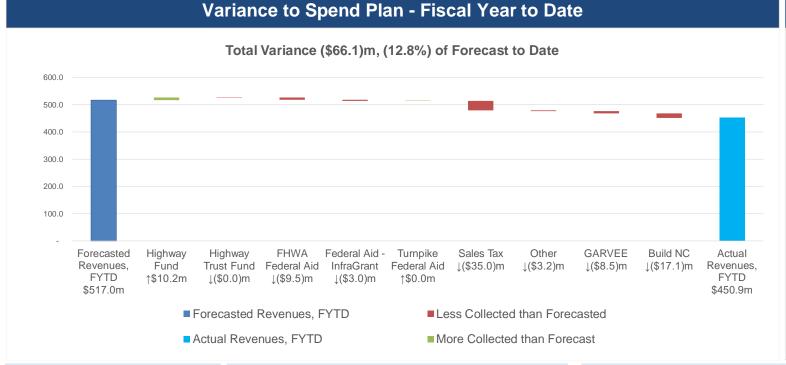

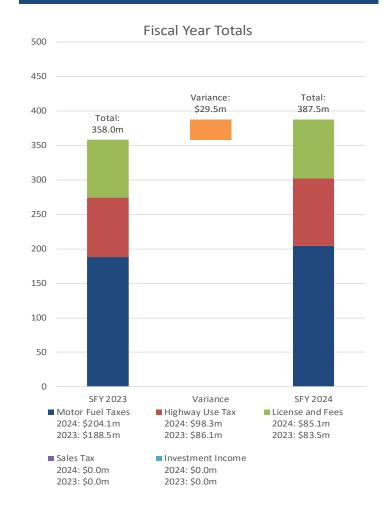

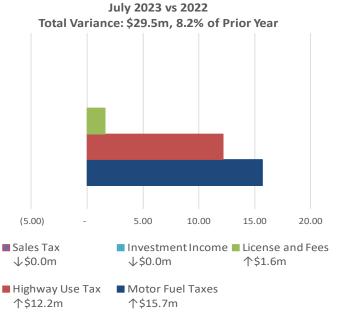

FYTD YoY Variance



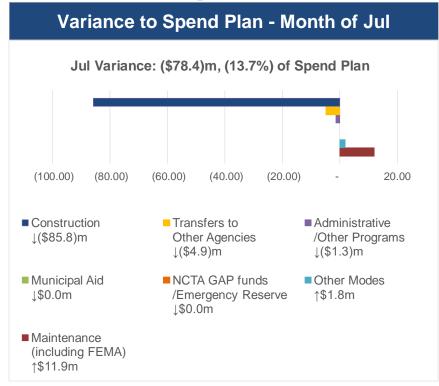

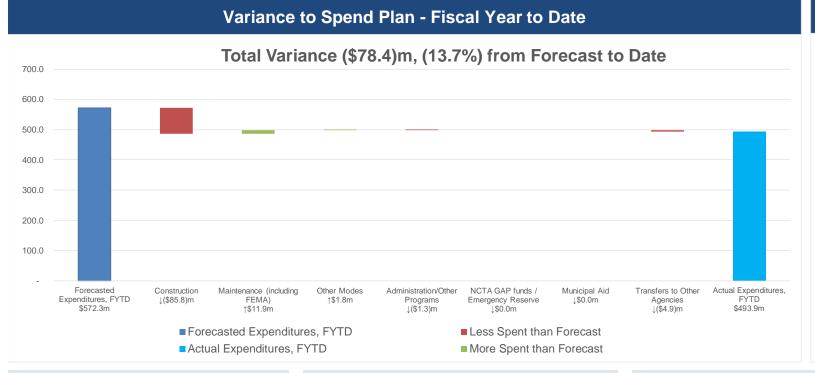

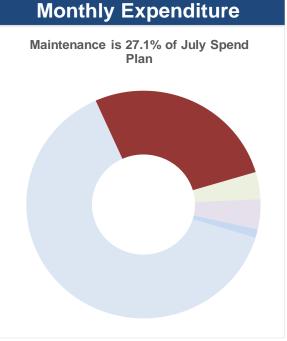

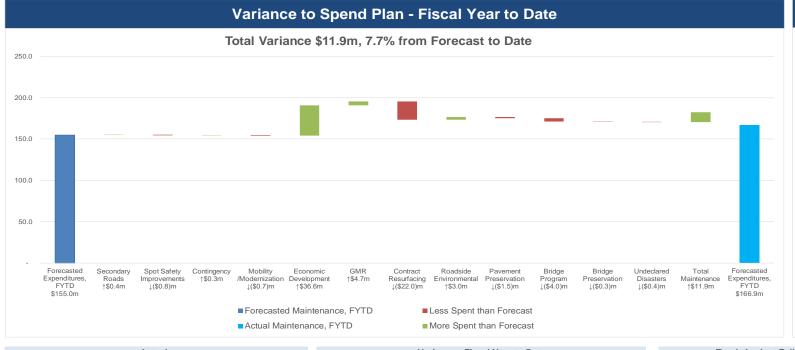

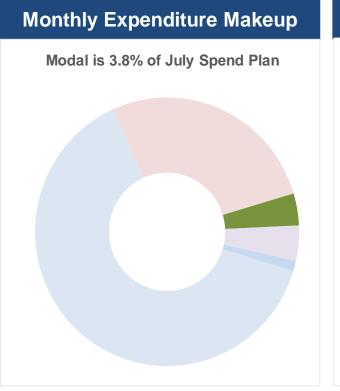

Modal Expenditure Variances – Monthly (\$M)

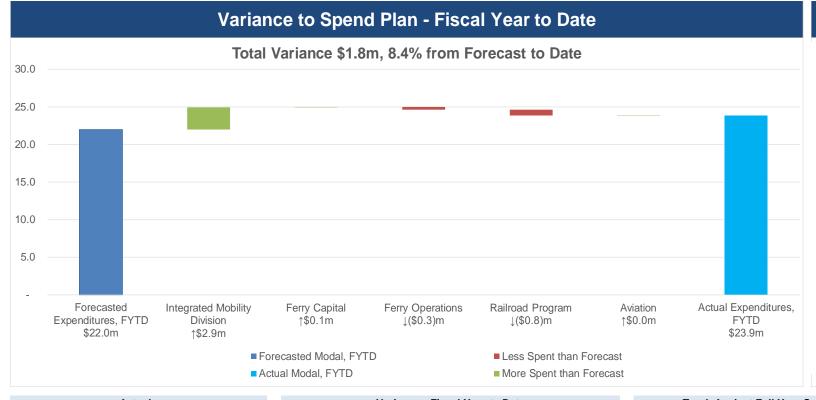

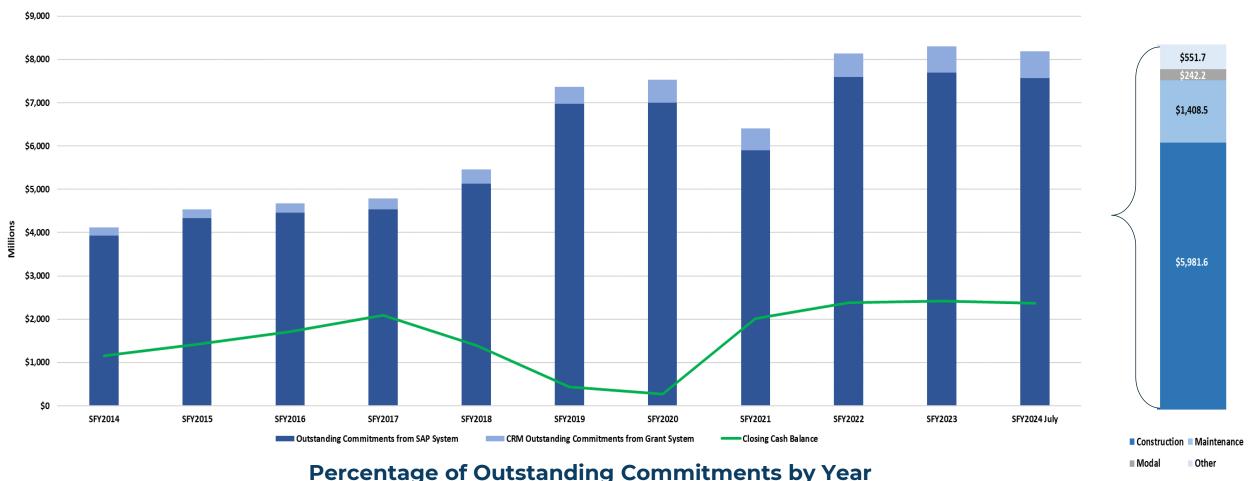

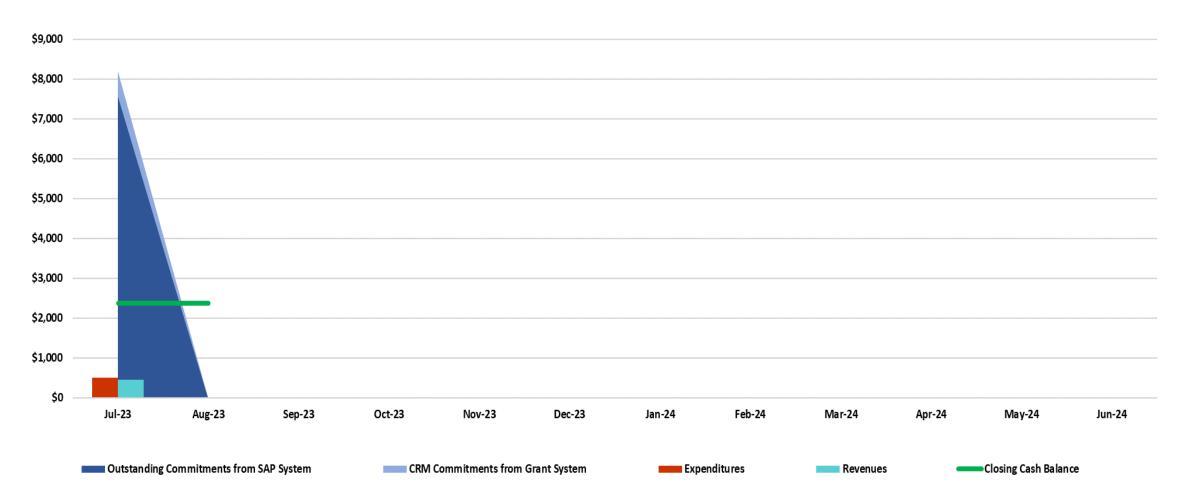
NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by State Fiscal Year

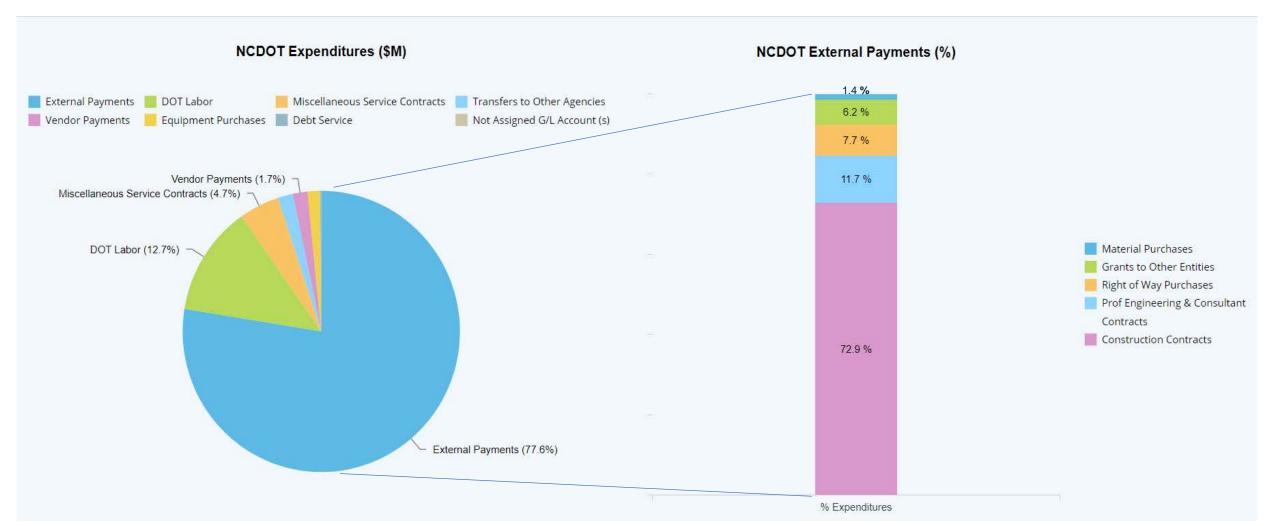
NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by Month

NCDOT Expenditures SFY2024 as of July 31, 2023



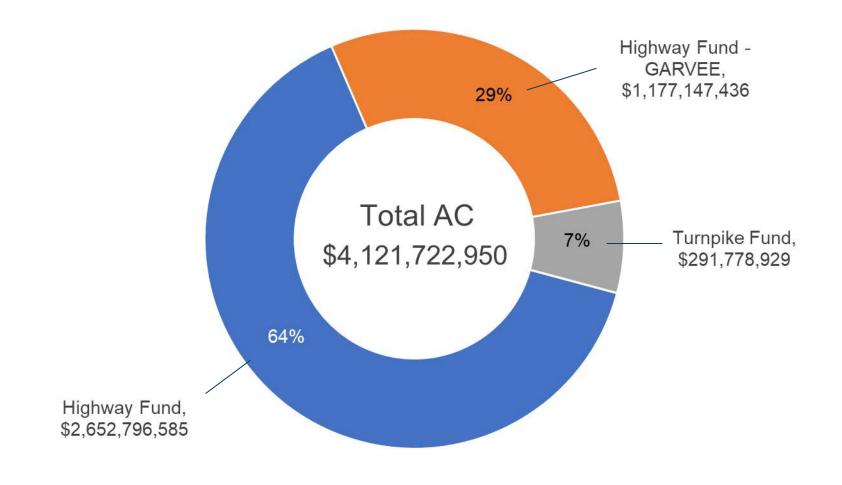

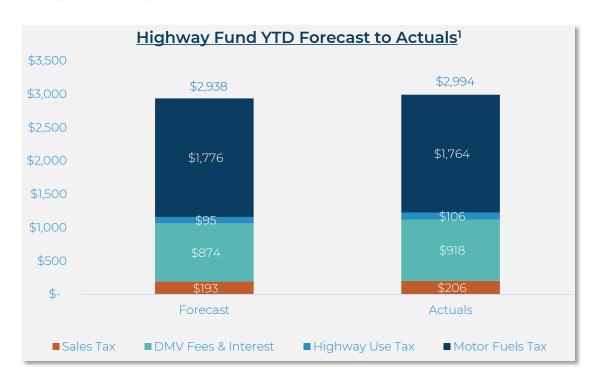

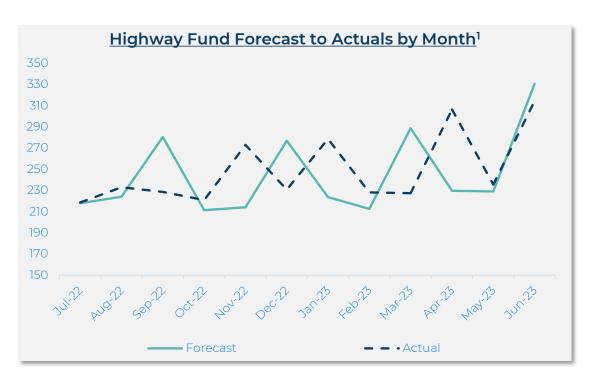

Highway Fund Revenue Performance Snapshot – SFY23

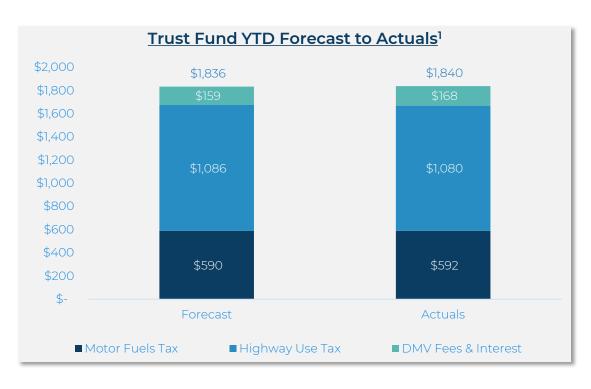


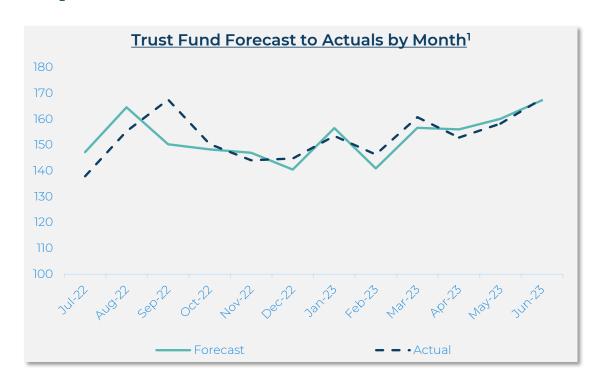

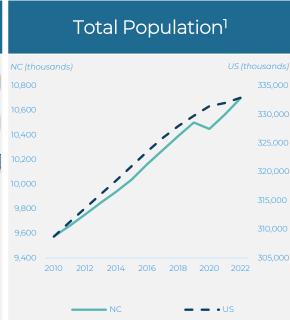
- Aggregate production of goods and services (GDP) continues to increase at an annual rate better than the national rate

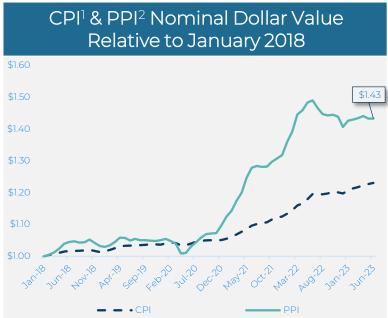

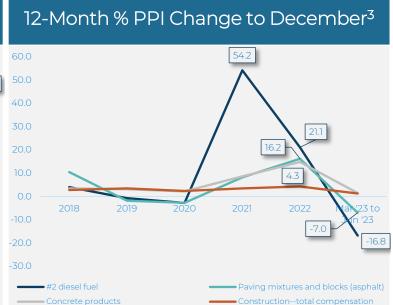

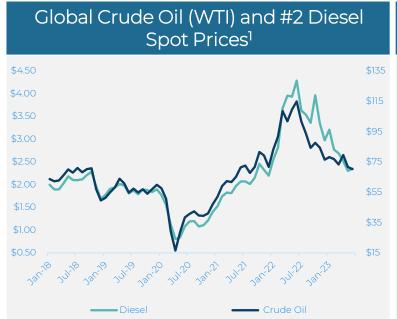

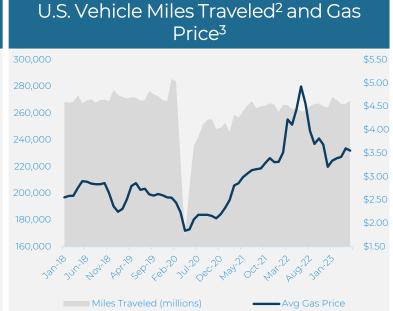

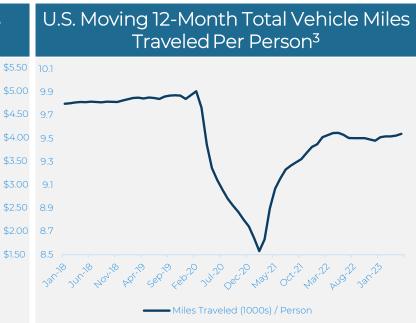

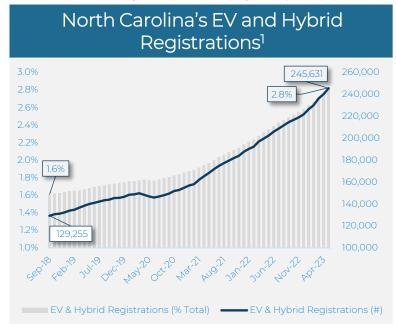


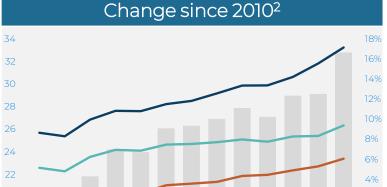

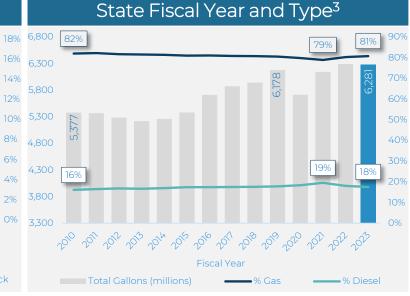

	Key Points:	
	 Interstates are freeways (or tollways) that have grade separated interchanges with limited access. Interstates and freeways are not the same. Freeways also have interchanges and limited access but are not built to interstate standards. There are many millions of dollars difference between freeway standards and interstate standards. Completing the interstate designation process should take decades. Shortest time frame Mr. Lacy has seen is 10 years (I-587 near Greenville) 	



HIGHWAYS COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

There are two paths: (1) Administrative Process and (2) Congressional Process. Both processes converge after you receive approval.

Administrative process: FHWA & AASHTO

Reference: 23 USC 103(c)(4)(A) and 23 CFR Part 470

- NCDOT must coordinate with, and obtain resolutions from, all local officials, county commissions and municipal planning organizations (MPOs)
- NCDOT must request an addition to the Interstate System from FHWA
- Route must be on the National Highway System (NHS)
- Route must meet Logical Addition Criteria
- Route must meet Interstate System design criteria
- Route number and addition must be approved by AASHTO and FHWA

<u>Logical Addition Criteria</u>: This is the most important part if you are going through the administrative process.

- The route is a viable transportation route, i.e., provides interstate travel and/or connects principle metropolitan centers for national defense and economic development.
- Route should not duplicate another Interstate.
- Route directly serves:
 - a) Major traffic generators (urban area over 100,000)
 - b) Major government centers
 - c) Principle Industrial Centers
 - d) Major Military Complexes
 - e) Major transportation terminals
- Route connects
 - a) Interstate to Interstate route
 - b) Interstate route to International boarder
 - c) Interstate route to major traffic generator
- The route meets Interstate Design Criteria

Interstate Design Criteria:

- Controlled access
- Design speed
- Minimum number of lanes
- Maximum grade
- Minimum lane width
- Shoulder width
- Median width
- Recovery area
- Vertical clearance
- Horizontal clearance

<u>National Highway System (NHS)</u>: the NHS includes the Interstate System as well as other roads important to nation's economy, defense, and mobility:

- Interstates
- Other Principal Arterials

- Intermodal Connectors
- NHS Route additions also have a formal process.

Congressional process: US Congress

Reference: Section 1105(c) of ISTEA (Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act)

- Congress must designate the route as a high priority route
- NCDOT must request an addition to the Interstate System from FHWA
- Approval for the addition of a high priority route to the Interstate System is decided by the US Secretary of DOT
- The high priority route must meet Interstate System design standards
- Must be connected to an Interstate Route at one end and an NHS route at the other end.
- The route number must be approved by AASHTO

High Priority Corridors in North Carolina: Congressional Route Examples

- I-73 / I-74 through Winston Salem

What is Right of Way?

What is Right of Way?

Right of Way is the real property (land and improvements) and rights therein acquired for public use to construct highways for the betterment and safety of the public. Right of Way may be acquired through negotiated settlements or condemnation. It is one of the last major steps before a project is released to bidders for construction

Subject to Government Laws, Statutes, Rules and Regulations (NC General Statute 136 for reference)

Key element is the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (the Uniform Act) 49 CFR Part 24

In the acquisition of right of way, NCDOT must treat all property owners with impartiality, fully explain all legal rights, pay just compensation in exchange for property rights and furnish relocation assistance, if needed.

Right of Way Organization

Right of Way Unit is separated into 3 major work forces:

Negotiations: State Negotiation Agent – Luis Pages - Acquisition of land rights, condemnation of land rights. Works with property owners to convey offers based on just compensation and fair market value as per the Uniform Relocation Act of 1970.

Appraisal: State Appraiser – Lane Jones - Appraisal of land rights, damages to remaining property, witnesses for court. Appraises all land and damages as per USPAP and NC Appraisal Board Standards.

Relocation: Acting Relocation Director – Chris Coughlin -Relocation of owners and tenants of residential and non-residential properties and move to replacement properties. Additionally, relocation is subject to laws of property management of vacated residential and non-residential properties

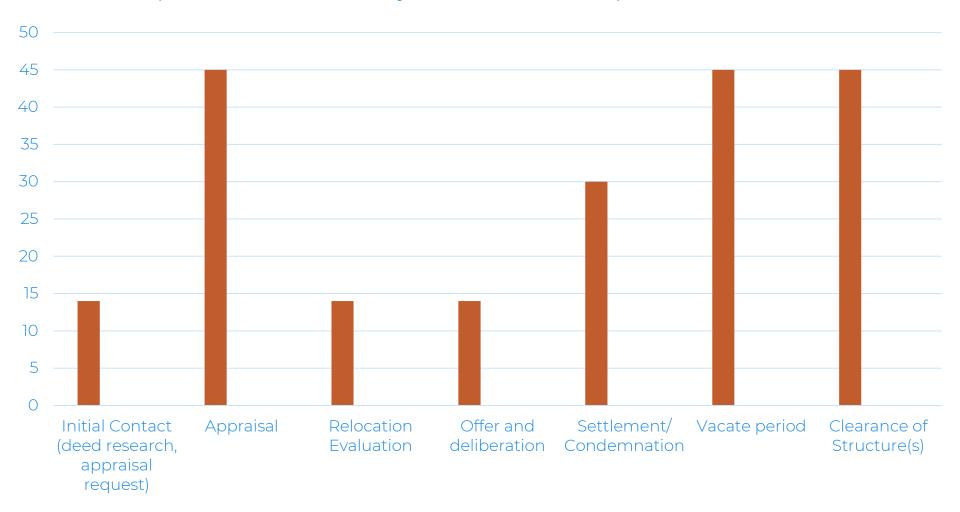
Right of Way Responsibilities



- Contact property owners to explain plans and impacts, present offers and answer questions about the project & the ROW process
- Ensure that all affected property owners are afforded their legal right to an appraisal
- Appraise proposed rights of way and easements to be acquired including any damages and costs to cure to remainder property
- Determine just compensation for all rights acquired
- Settle or condemn proposed property rights to allow NCDOT access to the property
- Mediate complicated or condemned right of way claims with the Attorney General's office
- Provide relocation assistance, including financial assistance, to persons and businesses displaced by right of way acquisitions
- Inspect for asbestos and demolish structures on acquired rights of way not included in the Roadway Contract
- Dispose of any surplus or residue properties acquired by NCDOT
- Manage assets acquired by NCDOT prior to construction
- Acquire secondary road rights of way
- Monitor & certify Local Municipal Projects requiring Federal or State funding
- Provide Environmental Impact Studies for Environmental documents as needed
- Participate in public hearings, as needed, to provide information about the right of way process during the planning process

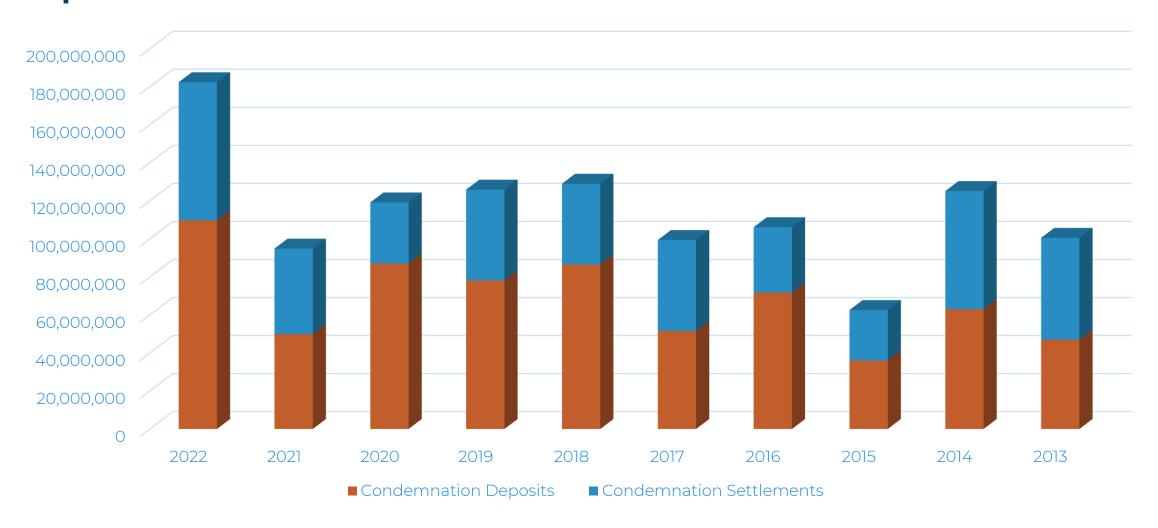

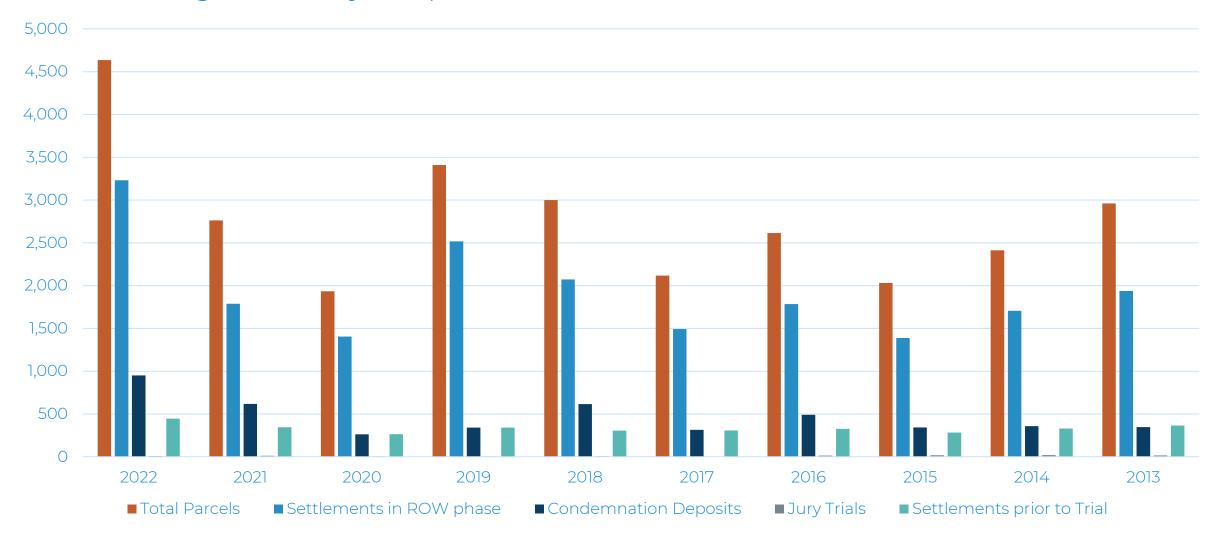

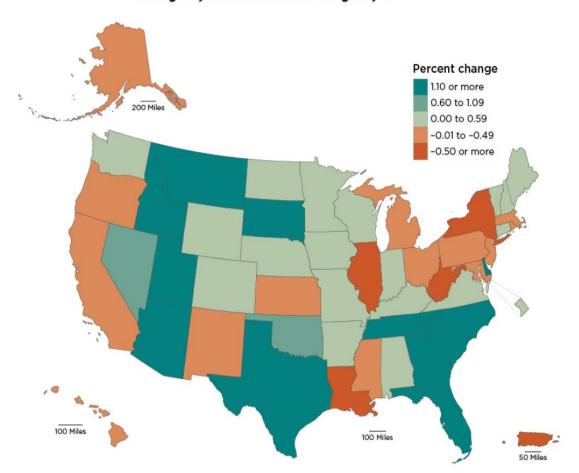

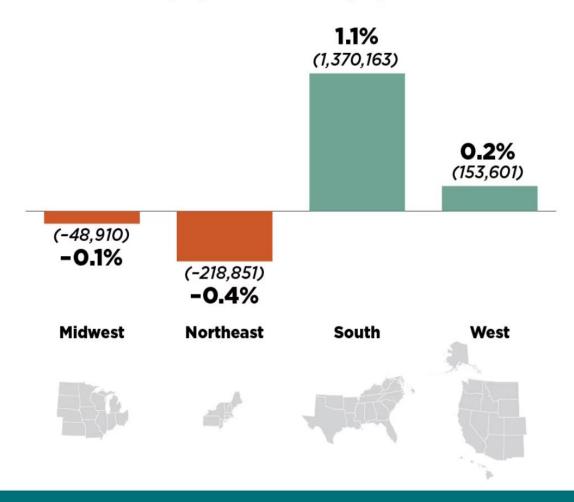
Percent Change in State Population:

ADVANCE RIGHT-OF-WAY ACQUISITIONS

Right-of-way acquisitions occur when land or easements are acquired to complete a transportation project. They typically occur after a project's plans have been completed.

This brochure details advance right-of-way acquisitions, which typically occur before the completion of right-of-way plans for the entire project or part of it.

Advance right-of-way acquisitions are acquisitions performed by the N.C. Department of Transportation for transportation purposes.

Advance acquisitions typically occur prior to completion of the final right-of-way plans for the entire project or segment of said project.

HOW DO ADVANCE ACQUISITIONS ARISE?

1. UNDUE HARDSHIP (INITIATED BY THE PROPERTY OWNER)

- a. Medical: Medical conditions that would require the immediate sale of the property and potential move to a replacement location.
- Financial: Difficulties that require immediate sale of the property.
 Examples include, transfer of employment; loss of employment; potential or filed bankruptcy; change of marital status.
- c. Safety: Immediate safety concerns of the property that would require the sale AND required move to a replacement location. Examples include: structures severely weakened or unlivable by storms, fire, or other acts of nature; residences deemed uninhabitable by a local jurisdiction.

2. PROTECTIVE PURCHASES (INITIATED BY NCDOT) EARLY ACQUISITION (INITIATED BY NCDOT)

a. Complex relocations involving utilities or complex properties

3. EARLY ACQUISITION (INITIATED BY NCDOT) PROTECTIVE PURCHASES (INITIATED BY NCDOT)

- a. Accelerated project
- b. Conservation or environmental mitigation
- Other identified high priority project needs, and those situations allowed by law





WHO CAN APPLY?

Any property owner with property affected by the pathway of a highway project as shown on public hearing maps or plans, can apply for Hardship Advanced Acquisition.

WHAT INFORMATION IS NEEDED FOR THE APPLICATION?

- Hardship Acquisition Request Form (HARF): The HARF
 is available online in PDF form, at public meetings, and upon
 request. This document is required for all types of
 Hardship Acquisition.
- Letter from a NC licensed Realtor or Listing Service:
 The owner must also document and support an inability to sell the property for fair market value within a typical period of time. The price at which the property is offered for sale must be representative of fair market value. If the property has been offered at an unrealistic price, then the requirements of the Federal Guidelines have not been met.

WHEN DO I SUBMIT A HARDSHIP APPLICATION?

 Hardship Advanced Acquisitions Applications can be submitted any time before the N.C. Board of Transportation authorizes the right-of-way acquisition for the project.

WHERE DO I SUBMIT A HARDSHIP APPLICATION?

All advance acquisition hardship request packets should be delivered to the NCDOT highway division right-of-way office in your area. See the map and corresponding contacts on the next page.

INITIAL CONTACT WITH NCDOT

Once a transportation route is approved and the design is complete, detailed plans are developed which determine the amount of land needed for the construction of the transportation project. If you are identified through a title search as an owner of property needed for the project, a Right of Way agent will contact you to discuss the highway project and its impact on you.

Right of Way agents are trained to explain the project and answer any questions you have.

- The transportation project may require only a portion of your property (partial acquisition) or your entire property
- You will be shown highway right of way plans to see how your property may be affected
- You will be advised of your legal rights during the initial meeting





YOU HAVE THE LEGAL RIGHT TO:

- . Have your property appraised by a licensed appraiser
- 2. Accompany the appraiser on the inspection of all structures on your property
- Have your property appraised for value without any appraiser conflict of interest and without undue influence or coercion reflected in the appraised value
- 4. Receive a written offer for compensation
- Negotiate with NCDOT on your written offer
- Be paid the full amount of compensation prior to being required to vacate your property
- Receive an offer to purchase any small, remaining tracts left over from your acquisition at market value
- Be informed of your rights and benefits under the Relocation Program if your dwelling or commercial building is in the path of the highway project
- Be assured of your rights under Title VI, the Civil Rights Act of 1964, N.C. General Statutes, and 49 CFR Code of Federal Regulations
- Have your compensation determined by a court of law if you cannot reach a settlement with NCDOT

WHAT MOVING EXPENSES ARE ELIGIBLE FOR PAYMENT?

If you choose a payment for actual, reasonable, and necessary moving and related expenses, you may be reimbursed for the following costs:

- Transportation of your personal property. Transportation costs beyond 50 miles are ineligible, unless the department determines that relocation beyond 50 miles is justified.
- $oldsymbol{arphi}$ Packing, crating, unpacking and uncrating personal property.
- Disconnecting, dismantling, removing, reassembling, and reinstalling relocated personal property including machinery, equipment, substitute personal property and connections to utilities available within the building. This also includes modifications to the personal property mandated by federal, state, or local law, code or ordinance necessary to adapt it to the replacement structure, the replacement site, or the utilities at the replacement site to the personal property.
- ✓ If necessary, upon approval from NCDOT, storage of the personal property for a period not to exceed 12 months.
- Insurance for the replacement value of the property in connection with the move and any approved storage.

- The replacement value of property lost, stolen, or damaged in the process of moving where insurance covering such loss, theft, or damage is not reasonably available.
- Any license, permit or certification required at the replacement location. However, the payment will be based on the remaining useful life of the existing license, permit or certification.
- Professional services as the Agency determines to be actual, reasonable, and necessary for planning the move of the personal property, moving the personal property, and installing the relocated personal property at the replacement location.
- Re-lettering signs and replacing stationery on hand at the time of displacement that is made obsolete because of the move.



- Loss of tangible personal property incurred as a result of moving or discontinuing the business or farm operation.
- If an item is not moved but is promptly replaced with a substitute item that performs a comparable function at the replacement site, you may be reimbursed the lesser of: the cost of the substitute item, including installation costs at the replacement site, minus any proceeds from the sale or trade-in of the replaced item; or the estimated cost of moving and reinstalling the replaced item but with no allowance for storage.
- Reimbursement, up to \$2,500, for time spent searching for a replacement location.

REPLACEMENT HOUSING PAYMENTS

If you are displaced from your residence, you will be given a written eligibility notice at least 90 days prior to being required to move. The notice will describe, in detail, all the relocation benefits you may be eligible to receive. One of these benefits is a Replacement Housing Payment, which depends on if you are a homeowner or tenant, and how long you have lived at the current residence.

Replacement Housing Payments can be better understood by familiarizing yourself with the terms Comparable Replacement Property and Decent, Safe and Sanitary.

COMPARABLE REPLACEMENT PROPERTY



PRESENT DWELLING

The asking price or rent of a comparable replacement dwelling will establish the maximum amount you may receive for your replacement housing payment. The comparable replacement dwelling should be functionally similar to your present dwelling.

While it will not be identical, the replacement should have certain attributes such as:

- Similar number of rooms and living space
- ✓ Located in an area not subject to adverse environmental conditions
- Generally, not located in an area less desirable than your present location with respect to public utilities and commercial and public facilities
- ✓ Land area that is typical in size for similar dwellings located in the same, or similar, neighborhood or rural area
- Within the financial means of the displaced person

- Your Right of Way/Relocation Agent is available to assist you during convenient hours, including evening hours when necessary. Your agent has access or can refer you to the appropriate person/agency for a variety of information concerning.

SOCIAL SERVICES PROVIDED BY OTHER AGENCIES

Your right of way/relocation agent is familiar with the services provided by other public and private agencies in your community. If you have particular needs, the agent will make every effort to secure assistance from those agencies who have the expertise to help. You should talk to your relocation agent if you would like these kinds of services.

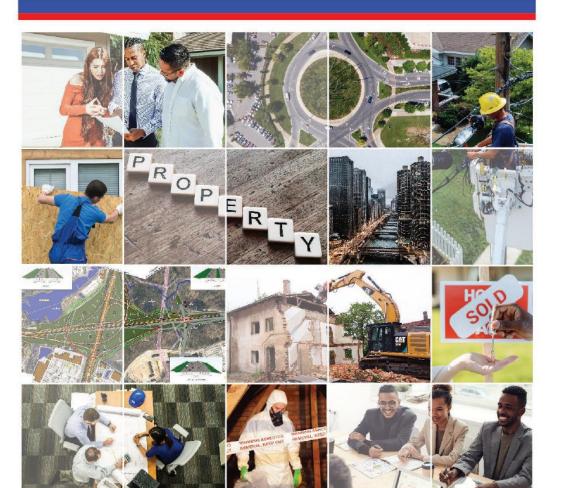
RELOCATION ADVISORY ASSISTANCE CHECKLIST

This checklist summarizes the relocation advisory assistance you will receive if you are displaced. Your right of way/relocation agent will meet with you to:

- ☑ Determine any specific needs and/or requirements
- Explain the relocation process and entitlements
- **☑** Offer relocation advisory assistance
- ☑ Offer transportation, if necessary
- ☑ Ensure the availability of a comparable property ahead of displacement
- **☑** Provide referrals to comparable properties
- ☑ Provide the amount of your maximum replacement housing entitlement in writing, 90 days or more before the required vacate date
- ☑ Inspect replacement homes for decent, safe and sanitary (DSS) standards. This is required on all replacement dwellings.
- ☑ Help minimize hardships

Consultant and Agency Developmental Courses

"Asbestos Awareness": This 3-hour course teaches general awareness and safe work practices for employees who may come in contact with (but not disturb) asbestos. This course meets the EPA AHERA and OSHA Class IV operation requirements.

"Central Office Internal Right of Way Operations": This course is designed as a process-driven workshop to introduce participants to the various administrative offices within the Right of Way unit.

"Condemnation Nuts and Bolts": This course is a practical hands-on workshop series designed to build on the basics of real estate law, provide an understanding of the right of way condemnation process, while collaborating with right of agents, appraisers, and various experts.

"Interdisciplinary Right of Way Processes": This course is designed to provide an overview of the right of way process and how the disciplines interrelate to each other.

"Introduction to Appraisal Concepts": This 3-hour course is designed to introduce the employee to the three approaches to value and the appraisal premise.

"Introduction to Relocation": This workshop is designed to introduce concepts and compliance measures that explain the fundamentals and practical aspects of the relocation process. The objective of workshop is to familiarize participants with basic relocation principles to allow for more advanced relocation professional development.

"Land Titles": This course offers explanation and examples referencing the legality of land titles and a guide to the review process involved in securing legal title.

"Mediation Techniques": This 4–6-hour course is designed to introduce employees to the Mediation process of the NCDOT; and offers mediation training through role-play, case history, and exercises in dispute resolution. This course is designed as a workshop with situational discussions on mediation techniques.

"Non-Residential Relocation – The Move Process": This course is designed to lead the agent though the move process and to include developing the personal property inventory, move cost specifications, obtaining estimates and managing the move with the vendor.

"North Carolina Real Estate License Course": This course is intended to provide students with the basic knowledge and skills necessary to act as a licensed real estate broker in a manner that protects and serves the public interest and prepares students for the North Carolina real estate license examination.

"Plan Reading": This is an instructor-led course and is presented in three capsules. It is designed for right of way practitioners, new personnel, and existing personnel whose duties involve the reading and interpretation of highway plans. The objectives of this Plan Reading Course are to present a step-by-step process to teach you how to read, interpret, and relate to a standard set of right of way and construction plans; help

1. Call to Order, Roll Call, Declaration of Quorum, Non-Conflict Statement in accordance with N.C. G.S 143B and Consideration of the August 2, 2023, Meeting Minutes - Chairman Perkins Chairman Perkins asked if anyone had a conflict of interest, and he stated if anyone had a conflict that person should refrain from participating in the meeting. He then asked if there was any conflict and based on the response, he stated there were no conflicts. He called the *Inspector General Committee Meeting* to order. Chairman Perkins determined that a quorum was present. Chairman Perkins asked if everyone **DISCUSSION SUMMARY** had read the minutes. Billy Clarke motioned that the minutes be approved. Melvin Mitchell seconded the motion. Motion was accepted. Chairman Perkins recognized Lonnetta Raynor (Inspector General) and turned the meeting over to her. **ACTIONS TAKEN** NONE TAKEN 2. OIG Updates - Lonnetta Raynor Lonnetta Raynor (IG) provided the Committee the following updates: Completed Engagements/Audits: Internal audit completed one engagement: Roadway Design Unit - Project Delivery Process The IG stated all FY audits have been completed and submitted to OSMB. Chairman Perkins asked for clarification on submitted, and the IG stated the reports were downloaded on the OSMB website. DISCUSSION SUMMARY SAMM Tool: The IG stated the tool was submitted to OSBM. She explained the in-house tool is a tool where OIG was required to score themselves and gave primarily three or four, if scored a 2 it was due to staffing. Billy Clarke asked how it is measured. The IG explained on a scale of one through five. OSBM reviews and may ask why/how we scored a certain way, and we would provide documentation. The tool is required to be completed by all state agencies. Perkins asked if all the vacant positions had been filled and the IG stated yes.



INSPECTOR GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

The Eagle Audit Report:

The IG stated the Eagle Report has been submitted, and she explained the audit was conducted by a third party. The IG stated there were five minor findings and that report was also uploaded on the OSMB website prior to due date, July 28, 2023.

The Attestation Report:

The IG stated the Attestation report has been submitted to OSMB as well. The report details the communication between the Secretary and IG about the audits completed. The IG explained the Internal Audit charter is required. Perkins stated the report is for the IG to communicate with senior management. Perkins asked if OIG had a charter and the IG responded yes.

Productivity Report:

The IG stated the report had been submitted and there are 2080 working hours in a year, and the practice is to itemize the hours to include leave, administrative time, and direct labor hours. That data is uploaded in the portal in a timely manner. Pat Molamphy asked the IG if she knew the average hours spent on an investigation, and the IG stated she will have an estimated workload with hours in the next audit plan, and that information will be given to the committee.

Chairman Perkins asked how long it takes for OSMB to respond to the reports, and the IG stated OSMB has not responded to the report. Chairman Perkins expressed some concerns about not getting feedback on the findings if there are any, and he stated we should just march on. In response, Pat Molamphy stated it appears they are just checking a box, and he stated the State Auditor's Office is different from the OSMB.

Ongoing Audits/Investigations:

The IG stated there are three ongoing audits/investigations, which will be completed by October, in the following areas:

- (1) DBE certification review which is coupled with an open investigation.
- (2) Rail Safety/Railroad crossing grant audit
- (3) IT Support Staffing

The DMV:

Chairman Perkins/Malomphy asked if the OIG does any work/audits with DMV annually. In response the IG stated she could only speak for a year, and she had not done any audits, but she is aware of an ongoing investigation, and some issues concerning the handling of cash in the past. Chairman Perkins responded by stating he is aware of some cash reconciliation issues in the past due to weak internal controls, and he commented on an issue with points not being registered on drivers' records because of a snafu with the court system.

Pat Molamphy stated there should be a full-blown audit/investigation of DMV, and he wanted to know if the DMV had an "internal control unit". In response Chairman Perkins stated if the DMV does not have someone dedicated to cash issues, then a position should be created. Chairman stated if any committee members have any suggestions about the DMV, he/she should submit those suggestions to the IG by August 11th.

Commissioner Goodwin was asked if the DMV had an audit department, and he deferred the answer to Deputy Portia Manley. Later he stated the DMV has an "audit unit", and he will provide a summary to the OIG committee regarding cash handling and points on drivers' records. Commissioner Goodwin stated the issues surrounding the court snafu and the cash audit occurred before his time. In response Billy Clark stated he had concerns about the cash issue and the points not being placed on drivers' records. Commissioner Goodwin stated the DMV is often negatively impacted by the faults of others, and he is aware of current litigation concerning the matter concerning points.

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Closing:

IG will provide the 1) Audit plan for current fiscal year and 2) Audit plan for next fiscal year.

Chairman Perkins asked if there was anything else that needed to be discussed, and there no other items.

Primary Purpose of the Accountability and Auditing Unit

- The purpose of the audits are to ensure the offices we audit are operating in accordance with Federal and State laws, standard operating procedures, and Contractual agreements.
- Evaluate adherence to pertinent laws, regulations, policies, and industry standards by auditing key objectives such as legal adherence, risk mitigation, operational efficiency, transparency and accountability, and data security.

Audit procedures

- Our procedures are designed to ensure accuracy, reliability, and compliance with applicable laws, regulations, and policies.
- Our audits focus on three main areas.
 - 1. Financials: Ensure DMV Departments/Units and Contractors are depositing state funds in accordance with applicable financial reporting framework.
 - 2. Physical Inventory: Mitigate fraud and theft; and identify any discrepancies between recorded inventory levels and actual counts.
 - 3. Compliance and adherence: Comprehensive evaluation of internal controls, policies, and standard operating procedures to ensure DMV Departments/Units and Contractors are adhering to applicable standards and identify any compliance gaps.
- All audits are in person, onsite audits.
- Our audits focus on three main areas Finding of Facts are documented and the audit report is signed by the Auditor and Representee.

Accountability and Auditing Unit

- The Accountability Auditor performs audits throughout the state.
 - 10 Field Auditors stationed across the state, and 1 Lead Auditor stationed at Rocky Mount Head Quarter office.
 - 140 Contracted License Plate Agencies and Vehicle Service State offices.
 - On-line dealers; 841 within the State of North Carolina, and (20) On-line dealers located out-of-state who are contracted with DMV and the On-line Dealer Vendor to license and title vehicles.
 - 7 License & Theft District and the warehouse.
 - 116 Driver License Offices.
 - Customer Compliance Unit
 - Data Management Unit.
 - Motor Fleet Audit.

Vehicle Service Audits

- Audit License Plate Agencies every 30-45 days.
- I. Audit all deposits submitted to Treasurer's Office
- II. Audit physical inventory provided by the Division of Motor Vehicles
- III. Audit of processed documents and transactions to ensure applicable laws were followed, proper taxes were collected, and fees were not omitted arbitrarily.
- IV. Yearly audits of Fixed assists/equipment provided by the Division.

Online Dealers and Vendors

- Online Dealer audits are performed twice per year.
- I. Audit physical inventory provided by the Division of Motor Vehicles
- II. Audit of processed documents and transactions to ensure applicable laws were followed, proper taxes were collected, and fees were not omitted arbitrarily.

Driver Service Audits

- Driver License audits are performed once every 4 months.
- I. Audit all deposits submitted to Treasurer's Office
- II. Audit of processed documents and transactions to ensure applicable laws were followed, proper fees were collected, and fees were not omitted arbitrarily.

Customer Compliance Audits

- Driver License audits are performed once every 3 months.
- I. Audit all deposits submitted to Treasurer's Office
- II. Audit of processed documents and transactions to ensure applicable laws were followed, proper fees were collected, and fees were not omitted arbitrarily.

License and Theft Audits

- L&T District and Warehouse audits are performed quarterly.
- I. Audit physical inventory and assets assigned to the L&T unit including all equipment issued to law enforcement officers and unassigned motor fleet vehicles stored by the Division.
- II. Audit of covert funds used for investigation and ensure funds are properly accounted for and supporting documentation is presented.

- III. Check documentation and evaluate the quality and relevance of fleet management reports and data analytics.

Due to sufficient evidence and finds gathered during our audits, the division has been able to move forward in criminal charges, civil litigation, and restitution. Our findings and investigations are turned over the License and Theft Unit to move forward prosecution.

	As we continue to monitor the Ferry Division current Fiscal Year cash spend as compared to actuals we are spending slightly ahead of where we had projected to be. At this time, we are projecting a \$1.4m deficit much of which is due to fuel prices running higher than projected. The law was changed effective for this fiscal year that the Ferry Division can no longer spend more than appropriated. As such, we are delaying the typical schedule changes we do to accommodate the increasing traffic we experience this time of year as well as facility maintenance projects, vessel maintenance projects, and not bringing on the temporary seasonal help we would typically be hiring at this time.			
	The passenger ferry we built is getting ready for her second summer season launch. As you know, we started the passenger ferry route with a leased vessel in 2019 and the NCDOT Board of Transportation passed a resolution that

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	allowed the Ferry Division to set a toll rate up to \$7.50 each way or \$15 round trip. This allowed us to start the rate low and then grow it based on ridership. The fare in 2019 was \$3.00 each way and our passenger survey found 78% saying the charge was just right and 21% saying it was too low. In 2020 we raised the fare to \$5.00 each way where it has remained. In the 2022 98% of passengers surveyed said the rate was just right or too low. We are raising the rate this season to \$7.50 each way. The Albemarle Commission RPO passed a resolution in 2018 that supported the Board setting the rate at \$7.50 each way. We are required to inform the RPO, and the General Assembly of our rate increase 30 days before it takes effect which we are in the process of doing. Because the Board already adopted a resolution that allows us to raise it up to \$7.50 there is no Board action required.
	The Federal Rail Administration's Federal State Partnership grant has been made available for application with \$4.4B available this round. Very few projects are as ready as the S line to complete in this round. We are submitting a grant application for construction from Raleigh to Wake Forest.
	March was third best month ever in our history of running intercity passenger rail with over 47,000 riders. We broke records in January, February and now March which means we are on track for another record-breaking year.
	Our autonomous transit shuttle CASSI is up and running through a partnership with the Town of Cary at Bond Park. We have moved from our earlier shuttle to a newer technology and would encourage you to go see it if you have time. CASSI runs at Cary's Bond Park weekdays from 10-4pm until June 2. She has four stops along her route and an interface with a traffic signal.
