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Litter Report Update - January through June 2004

This report is prepared pursuant to Session Law 2001-512, Sections 9 and 10¹ and provides information describing the outcome of North Carolina's 2004 anti-litter campaign.

The state's 2004 anti-litter campaign brings together three components:

- Litter cleanup
- Education/prevention
- Enforcement

Litter Report Update Summary

The focus of this update report is to provide information in regards to litter cleanups, education/prevention and enforcement for the period of January through June 2004. This type of information was last provided within the *2003 North Carolina Interagency Report On Litter Cleanup, Education/Prevention and Enforcement* dated March 31, 2004.

The NC Department of Transportation (NCDOT) sponsored Spring Litter Sweep from April 17 through April 30, 2004. This statewide roadside litter cleanup resulted in more than 3,000,000 pounds of litter being picked up. That's a 10% increase in the amount of litter collected this year versus the spring of 2003.

In addition, the NCDOT Office of Beautification Programs and other state agencies collectively supported statewide litter prevention initiatives. The other agencies included the Administrative Office of the Courts, Departments of Correction, Crime Control and Public Safety, and Environment and Natural Resources. This report will include a breakdown of litter cleanup information and an update of the Administrative Office of the Courts' data, which includes charges and convictions by county, as well as by the various law enforcement agencies.

Anti-litter education/prevention activities continued through the first six months of 2004. The Office of Beautification Programs promoted and supported anti-litter projects through various channels. These channels included enhancements to its Internet home page, participation on various statewide organizational boards, promoting litter prevention information at the local level, and supplying litter prevention promotional items to a multitude of local organizations. In addition, the litter prevention radio campaign began in January 2004 and will air through the end of this year. Finally, the Adopt-A-Highway hotline reporting system upgrade has been installed and has been working at the expected performance levels.

Statewide Roadside Litter Cleanup - January through June 2004

North Carolina Department of Transportation

The North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) maintains 78,500 state roadway miles. In order to maintain environmentally and aesthetically clean, safe and attractive roadsides, the NCDOT has built relationships with citizens, other agencies, local governments and organizations/industries. Examples include the Adopt-A-Highway (AAH) volunteers, an alliance with the Department of Correction (DOC), participating on organizational boards as that of Keep America Beautiful and Big Sweep and working with the North Carolina Soft Drink Association.

NCDOT Adopt-A-Highway Program

The NCDOT through its Roadside Environmental Unit (REU) Office of Beautification Programs administers the Adopt-A-Highway (AAH) program. To assist with the local AAH roadside adoption, the NCDOT has 56 AAH Coordinators who oversee the adoption process in their assigned counties. The 6,000 AAH volunteer groups are primarily made up of school, civic, business, professional, religious and social groups, as well as many individuals and families who also adopt roadside sections. The AAH program is an example of state government working with citizens to improve the cleanliness and quality of life in communities across the state.

In 2004, Spring Litter Sweep was April 17 through April 30, 2004. During Litter Sweep, the NCDOT provides volunteers with safety vests, gloves and bags for roadside litter cleanups. It also provides the manpower to ensure full bags are picked up for immediate disposal.

NCDOT and Department of Correction (DOC)

The NCDOT alliance with the DOC is critical in keeping roadside litter to a minimum on many heavily traveled routes throughout the state. This alliance makes it possible to have 1,360 inmates performing litter pick up on a daily basis (weather permitting).

The number of pounds collected does not include items which will not fit within a bag i.e. tire and construction debris.

Community Service Work Program (CSWP).

- Members of these work crews are not in the prison system, but are citizens who have been assigned community service through the court system.
- CSWP is a sentencing option operated by the Division of Community Corrections (DCC). The courts order, as a condition of either supervised or unsupervised probation, lower risk offenders to perform community service hours.

The DOC inmate crews and the CSWP litter pickups are performed separately and independently of one another. The pounds of litter reported above represent the litter pick up efforts of each separately.

Department Of Environment and Natural Resources

Division of Parks and Recreation Litter Cleanup Efforts

Everyday, staff at each state park, spends four to eight man-hours, on average, emptying trashcans and picking up litter. In addition, all units of the state parks system hold litter cleanup days with the help of various community volunteers.

During the first six months of 2004, there were some 70 organized litter cleanups held which contributed 550 bags of trash as well as a variety of other larger items. The following table depicts the results of these litter cleanups by park.

Please note “No activity” means that there were no *additional* litter cleanups *beyond* the daily litter collection done by park staff. For example, at a small park, such as Pilot Mountain, the park staff often picks up a total of 300 bags of trash during one year.

Summary Statement: During January through June 2004, approximately 70 litter cleanups were held across the state park system. About 550 bags of trash and a number of large items such as tires and refrigerators were collected from roadsides and waterways in or near state parks.

Other Statewide Litter Cleanups

NC Big Sweep

In 1989 North Carolina Big Sweep, Inc. became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization whose purpose is to promote environmental education, and to plan and coordinate the annual waterway cleanup, including watershed areas. Its origins go back to 1987, when Dr. Lundie Spence, of the NC Sea Grant College Program founded it. More information can be found through its Internet address www.ncbig sweep.org. NC Big Sweep (annual cleanup) is being held October 2, 2004.

NC Keep America Beautiful

North Carolina Keep America Beautiful (NCKAB) is a nonprofit public education organization dedicated to enhancing the natural beauty of North Carolina communities, improving waste handling practices and empowering individuals to take greater responsibility for improving community environments. NCKAB is comprised of local, independent affiliates located in communities all across North Carolina.

The KAB Affiliates have been working on establishing a unified and KAB Inc. recognized statewide organization. They are in the process of approving their bylaws. In the meantime they participated in their 2004 Great American Cleanup™ - held from March to the end of May 2004.

Anti-Litter Education/Prevention – January through June 2004

Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR)

Division of Pollution Prevention and Environmental Assistance (DPPEA)

The DPPEA distributed recycling activity books as well as Recycle Guys packets to schools local governmental and civic organizations promoting waste reduction and recycling. More information about teaching aids and educational efforts can be found in their web site at www.p2pays.org.

Beginning in June 2004, the DPPEA started to show three sets of cinema ads in the following counties: Alamance, Beaufort, Buncombe, Chatham, Caswell, Cleveland, Davidson, Durham, Forsyth, Greene, Guilford, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Madison, Martin, Pitt, Sampson, Union, Wake and Yancey. These will continue through May 2005

These sets of three ads will change quarterly. They feature the www.recycleguys.org web site, where visitors have access to local government contact info and other Internet sites. Current images can be seen at <http://www.p2pays.org/recycleguys/download/cinema/index.asp>.

Division of Parks and Recreation

Each unit in the state park system provides an adequate number of trashcans in convenient locations to encourage visitors to keep the parks clean and provides at least one recycling center for visitors and campers.

The Division of Parks and Recreation also seeks to exemplify and encourage good stewardship of natural resources by reducing, reusing and renewing materials where possible. To reduce the amount of paper that might become litter, the Division uses Internet servers instead of printed materials where possible. Park maps and other information can be viewed online, or via computer interactive exhibits in park offices.

Division of Marine Fisheries - Marine Patrol

Marine Patrol Officers of the Division of Marine Fisheries patrol the waters of North Carolina working to control the discharge of litter into the state's coastal waterways. Officers are stationed along the coastal counties from the Virginia State line to the South Carolina State line. As part of their daily patrol, officers also ensure the disposal of trash, discarded equipment and abandoned fishing gear is done properly.

NC Wildlife Resources Commission

The Division of Engineering Services maintains 191 boating access areas and 36 public fishing access areas across the state spending time spent policing and removing litter from these sites. "Littering is Illegal" signs are maintained on all sites. The Division of Enforcement Officers also provides numerous public service announcements pertaining to the proper disposal of lawfully taken wildlife.

NCDOT - Office of Beautification Programs

During the first half of 2004, the Office of Beautification Programs provided a variety of educational materials for schools, civic groups and others. This included anti-litter stickers, decals, pencils, car litterbags, temporary tattoos, leaflets and Swat-A-Litterbug cards. Other items available through their Internet web site included links i.e. to Swat-A-Litterbug, Adopt-A-Highway, Litter Sweep, printable activity pages, and litter activity book with lessons and activities for 2nd and 3rd grades and information about NCDOT's fight against litter.

The Office of Beautification Programs also distributed car litterbags through rest areas, welcome centers and on request to numerous groups.

Annual Litter Prevention Awards Contest: The NCDOT, along with the Office of the Governor and the NC Soft Drink Association, sponsors a litter prevention awards contest annually. Eligible categories are as follows: Government Agencies, Schools/Youth Groups and Nonprofits. Each category offers first place prizes of \$1,000 and second place prizes of \$500. Winning groups are required to use their winnings to expand existing litter prevention programs. Notification of this year's contest was being prepared for distribution. Winners are posted to the Office of Beautification Programs web site's Litter Prevention Contest link.

Swat-A-Litterbug Program: The Office of Beautification Programs continues to administer the Swat-A-Litterbug program. Through this program, those who are observed littering can be reported on-line through the Office of Beautification Programs web site at www.ncdot.org/~beautification, or through the mail (Swat-A-Litterbug cards), or by calling *HP or the NCDOT Customer Service Office at 1-877-DOT-4YOU. Those submitting the license plate

numbers are kept anonymous. The information required in a Swat-A-Litterbug report is the vehicle license plate number, time, date, street, city, county, and a description of the littering offense.

Swat-A-Litterbug is viewed as an educational tool, which informs those observed violating the litter law. There were 3,600 Swat-A-Litter bug letters mailed to litterbugs from January through June 2004. There were more than 6,000 letters mailed in all of 2003.

The letters, which are signed by the Colonel of the State Highway Patrol, inform recipients of their littering, that littering is illegal and the penalties they could receive upon conviction. There are no citations or warnings issued from these reports and no record is kept regarding who receives the letter. Again, this is mainly a tool to help educate those observed littering.

Litter License Plate: The General Assembly approved the Anti Litter License plate during the 2000 session. The initial 300 plates were sold in 2001 and the plate became available through the tag agencies by the beginning of 2002. Ten dollars of each plate sold will be diverted to a "Litter Prevention Fund" on a quarterly basis. The remainder of the money is used to help support other statewide anti litter efforts. As of this report date, there have been 431 plates issued.

Radio Litter Prevention Ads: The ads are both in English and Spanish. They began airing in January of 2004 and will continue throughout the rest of year. These are airing through the North Carolina News Network (NCNN) every second and fourth week each month. NCNN makes available 80 affiliate stations with English speaking format statewide. There are also 3 Hispanic stations in the network. It is expected that more than one million listeners will hear the messages to stop littering and secure their loads.

Litter Enforcement – January through June 2004

Department of Crime Control and Public Safety

In the first half of 2004, the State Highway Patrol issued 349 tickets for littering. The State Highway Patrol also cooperates with NC Department of Transportation (NCDOT) to offer the *HP as an option for reporting littering activity on the highways. Information provided by callers is captured by the State Highway Patrol and when appropriate it is submitted to the NCDOT Swat-A-Litterbug program for processing.

Division of Parks and Recreation

Division Marine of Marine Fisheries

The Marine Patrol continued its litter enforcement efforts as part of their overall mission. Officers issued two citations during this period. They also investigated complaints concerning illegal dumping of materials on beaches and other coastal waters.

The following data are from the AOC's Automated Criminal/Infraction System for the first half of calendar year 2004. The number of charges and convictions represents totals from district and superior court filings. Some of the defendants have other charges in addition to a littering offense. It is possible for a defendant to be charged in one calendar year and convicted in the next. Thus, for any given calendar year, the defendants convicted are not necessarily the same defendants charged in that year.

With respect to the charging agency, "Other" represents only those cases in which clerks did not indicate the charging agency or an invalid agency name was entered. All littering offense codes are listed for the statewide data. County data include only the codes for which there were any charges. There is not an offense code for littering under NCGS 75A-10(c); this code is designated by three asterisks.

ATTACHMENT A: Session Law 2001-512, Sections 9 and 10

SECTION 9. The text of G.S. 147-12 is designated as subsection (a) of that section, and G.S. 147-12 is further amended by adding a new subsection to read: “(b) The Department of Transportation, the Department of Correction, the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, the State Highway Patrol, the Wildlife Resources Commission, the Division of Parks and Recreation in the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, and the Division of Marine Fisheries in the Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall deliver to the Governor by February 1 and August 1 of each year detailed information on the agency's litter enforcement, litter prevention, and litter removal efforts. The Administrative Office of the Courts shall deliver to the Governor by February 1 and August 1 of each year detailed information on the enforcement of the littering laws of the State, including the number of charges and convictions under the littering laws of the State. The Governor shall gather the information submitted by the respective agencies and deliver a consolidated semiannual report on or before March 1 and September 1 of each year to the Environmental Review Commission, the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee, and the House of Representatives and the Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Natural and Economic Resources.”

SECTION 10. The first reports required to be delivered by the Department of Transportation, the Department of Correction, the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, the State Highway Patrol, the Wildlife Resources Commission, the Division of Parks and Recreation in the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, the Division of Marine Fisheries in the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, and the Administrative Office of the Courts to the Governor under G.S. 147-12(b), as enacted by Section 10 of this act, shall be due February 1, 2002. The first report required to be delivered by the Governor to the Environmental Review Commission, the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee, and the House of Representatives and the Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Natural and Economic Resources under G.S. 147-12(b), as enacted by Section 10 of this act, shall be due March 1, 2002.

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
