SPEAKER: -- really small, like KGB 1 2 designed recording device. It's tiny and we're going to hope that it captures just us here. Okay. 3 4 So let me just go over the ground rules with you. 5 As we've talked about -- Beth already went through them, but the goal -- I'm -- is we're going to 6 capture information based on these six questions. 7 8 I wish I had some tape to put them up. And we ask 9 that you listen to each other, so be -- be polite. 10 No side questions -- so not side 11 conversations. Please try not to interrupt people. 12 Focus on answering the questions, okay? You -- I 13 know you may have other concerns, but let's focus 14 on answering the questions. As I get through the 15 questions as they are -- are asked, as you're

16 listening, consider the different opinions that you 17 here. People live in different places, they have 18 different opinions about what's happening and what 19 is needed in the area. Speak one at a time. 20 As Beth said, speak from your own 21 household's experience. So this isn't a general --

23 design process as your own personal experience as a
24 household in this study area. What is your
25 experience driving, working, living, playing,

we -- the generalness is not as helpful in the

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taking your kids to school, going to work, shopping in this area? What is your household's experience?

3 Please be concise. We have a limited 4 amount of time. And use concrete examples as much 5 as you can, so this intersection and that intersection. And so I'm going to encourage 6 everyone to participate. It's nice -- it's a nice 7 8 small group, so I ask that nobody dominate the 9 conversation. You might -- if it seems that there's -- you're going long and maybe going 10 11 off-topic, I'll do a little time-out or if I -- if 12 you've made your point and we've all heard your 13 point and now you're reiterating your point, I 14 might do a little backup, okay?

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So I'll try to be polite and be kind. If you ignore my signals, I may just cut you off, okay? So that's my job. Don't take it personally, but I really do want us to get through and I want everybody to have a chance to speak, okay?

20Okay. So we're going to do a lightning21round as the first step, and the first question22here is, with one word, describe what is the most23important thing to you and your household or24business that must be considered as this project25moves forward. We'll give a minute to think about

it 'cause we just want one word, okay? What's the 1 2 most important -- important thing that you -- if 3 nothing else gets out from this listening session 4 to the designers -- your one -- them to think about 5 one thing, what is that thing? One word. 6 SPEAKER: Safety. 7 SPEAKER: Neighborhood. 8 SPEAKER: Traffic. 9 SPEAKER: He stole my word. 10 SPEAKER: Okay. 11 SPEAKER: I saw you thinking. 12 SPEAKER: I know, but I'll say safety 13 too. 14 SPEAKER: Okay. 15 SPEAKER: Can you tell them all? 16 SPEAKER: But I don't think, like, when I 17 say safety they're going to think of safety the way 18 I'm thinking of safety. They're going to think of 19 making a safe intersection and I'm thinking of 20 safety on Ridge Road. 21 SPEAKER: Well, I'm thinking of school 22 kids. 23 SPEAKER: Yeah. 24 SPEAKER: We have a lot of school kids. 25 Yeah, so I'll take that as a second word.

SPEAKER: Okay -- okay -- okay. So 1 2 that's great. Love the lightning rounds, easy to 3 write. Okay. Now, what do you believe is needed 4 to ensure the safety of your family, the people who 5 live in the area and the people that travel through the area, okay? So again, what -- what do you 6 7 think is needed? What do you believe is needed to 8 ensure the safety, okay? Again, we're looking for 9 what your concerns are or what your ideas are, not 10 your solutions. 11 SPEAKER: Right. 12 That's -- the engineers will SPEAKER: 13 come up with solutions, but more of what do you 14 want people to think about? What -- what -- the 15 designers to think about? 16 SPEAKER: Okay. 17 SPEAKER: Let's start there. 18 SPEAKER: Yeah, you go --19 SPEAKER: Less traffic on Ridge Road. 20 SPEAKER: Okay. 21 That's what I need for more SPEAKER: 22 safety. 23 SPEAKER: Okav. 24 SPEAKER: I think I'd like them to know 25 that people on Ridge Road move around in more than

just cars, so bikes, pedestrians. Now, we get 1 2 those fricking scooter thingies, but -- but there 3 is a neighborhood of a lot of -- I think most 4 people on -- in Raleigh think of traffic as the 5 only means of transportation and in our neighborhood, I am happy to say we have a lot of 6 7 different means of transportation. Scooters, bikes, foot. 8 SPEAKER: SPEAKER: Foot. To name a few. 9 10 SPEAKER: Okay. 11 SPEAKER: To me safety would be ensured 12 by no Ridge Road interchange unless what is the 13 board offended the safety and certified it. 14 SPEAKER: But the one that goes into the 15 mall would also be considered a Ridge Road 16 interchange to you? 17 SPEAKER: It sure would. 18 SPEAKER: Like, if they put one that 19 comes up and it goes into the mall, but it doesn't 20 go onto Ridge Road, but comes a little onto Ridge 21 Road and goes into the mall. That's still a Ridge 22 Road interchange to you, correct? 23 SPEAKER: Yeah. 24 SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah. 25 SPEAKER: Yeah, I agree with you.

1 SPEAKER: So -- yeah. 2 SPEAKER: For anything --3 SPEAKER: So we're not talking about the 4 one that's there currently? 5 SPEAKER: Right. 6 SPEAKER: I mean, we may be talking about 7 that as well, but we're talking about anything that 8 comes up to Ridge Road that goes on to the mall. SPEAKER: That -- maybe I should amend 9 10 that and say no new Ridge Road interchange. 11 SPEAKER: Yeah. 12 SPEAKER: Something like that. 13 SPEAKER: And no interchange at the mall. SPEAKER: To the mall off of Ridge Road. 14 15 SPEAKER: Right. There you go. 16 SPEAKER: I think a speed limit might be 17 a consideration as well --18 SPEAKER: Oh, good lord. SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 19 20 SPEAKER: -- because they come off of 440 21 going 60 or more --22 SPEAKER: Yep. Uh-huh. 23 SPEAKER: -- and it's a 35 and I would 24 have -- from a safety perspective, I do not think 25 that speed limit should be over 35, like ever.

1 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 2 SPEAKER: So I would say speed limit no more than 35. 3 4 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 5 SPEAKER: I'm not sure how to express 6 this, but I am concerned about the possibility of 7 some kind of construction going on on Ridge Road, 8 Glenwood, et cetera at the same time as one up around Meredith, Collins. 9 Uh-huh. 10 SPEAKER: 11 SPEAKER: Okay. 12 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 13 The widening project they're SPEAKER: 14 talking about? 15 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah. 17 SPEAKER: That makes a lot of sense. 18 SPEAKER: So --19 SPEAKER: If we get two of these things 20 going -- have an overlap it's going to -- well, I 21 guess it would certainly stop any speeds. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. And if there's still, like, the 23 SPEAKER: 24 one on Wake Forest Road then you get through. 25 SPEAKER: Oh, that's going to be huge

1 too, 'cause they [inaudible]. 2 SPEAKER: Is that the right one 3 [inaudible]. 4 SPEAKER: How are they going to --5 SPEAKER: Yeah. SPEAKER: And it would --6 7 SPEAKER: Your concern is the timing with 8 other construction of other projects, right? SPEAKER: Uh-huh. Yeah. That's good. 9 10 SPEAKER: I'm sorry. Another place 11 besides Meredith, did you say? 12 SPEAKER: There's one going on at Wake 13 Forest Road as well, which is about two exits away from --14 15 SPEAKER: Okay. 16 SPEAKER: And Meredith's what, maybe 17 three exits away? So yeah. 18 SPEAKER: But they (sic) already on their 19 construction now, or they're planning? 20 SPEAKER: Meredith's already been 21 approved, but I don't think they started, yet. 22 SPEAKER: They're supposed to start soon. 23 SPEAKER: Yeah, really soon. SPEAKER: Yeah. Is it? Uh-huh. 24 25 SPEAKER: Yeah, so I think this is

1 farther down the road, but I have no idea. 2 SPEAKER: Yeah. 3 SPEAKER: I'm making things up now. Did 4 you have any? 5 SPEAKER: I'm not it -- up to speed of the interchange on Ridge Road. 6 7 SPEAKER: Okay. 8 SPEAKER: I think --9 SPEAKER: But that's okay. But do you 10 have other thoughts of your own? 11 SPEAKER: I'm just questioning what that 12 would be. It's interchange to the mall? 13 SPEAKER: Yeah. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah, so the current -- well, 15 the thing they -- it's not current, 'cause I guess 16 they scrapped everything, but the plan they showed 17 a few months ago had an interchange coming off of 18 the Beltline up onto Ridge Road and then turning 19 and going over to the mall. 20 SPEAKER: [Crosstalk]. Even though I'm the one that 21 SPEAKER: 22 made the point about the lots of different ways I 23 do think that the -- that the traffic that we 24 already are dealing with --25 SPEAKER: On Ridge Road?

SPEAKER: -- on Ridge Road has, like --1 2 SPEAKER: It's a lot. It drives me 3 SPEAKER: So Glen Eden. 4 crazy to go up to Glen Eden. Just so you know, 5 it's a one -- it's a one-lane, but when you get to Glen Eden it goes two-lanes. One's a turning lane 6 7 and one is a straight or a right. And how 8 dangerous it is -- people -- unless you, kind of, live here and come everyday, don't know that it's 9 10 going to turn left there's a lot of miss --11 confusion. So -- I don't know how to explain that. 12 A miscommunication as to traffic patterns --13 current traffic patterns already. SPEAKER: Current traffic -- current 14 15 traffic patterns are unsafe. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah, and so --17 SPEAKER: I think I want to add here --18 SPEAKER: I think that's where the 19 concern comes from. If you're going to add to it, 20 it's going to get worse. 21 SPEAKER: Right. 22 SPEAKER: That makes sense to my mind. 23 Uh-huh. SPEAKER: SPEAKER: Does that make sense? 24 25 SPEAKER: [inaudible]. Okay. So your

concern is to really, kind of, improve that, not 1 2 make it worse? 3 SPEAKER: Yeah, a lot of the intersections are already not doing great and then 4 5 they're -- we don't want to make them worse. We would like to make them better. 6 7 SPEAKER: Right. SPEAKER: Like I said, I don't see 8 9 anything else -- well, I don't see another question 10 when we'd be able to put this up there, but under 11 safety, I absolutely believe that any interchange 12 around the Ridge Road area accessing to the mall is 13 going to necessitate the widening of Ridge Road. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah, it'll happen somewhere. SPEAKER: And Glen Eden Drive. It will 15 16 have to do it and the proof is out there on Lynn 17 Road and Millbrook Road. 18 SPEAKER: Yeah, that was a little --19 SPEAKER: That was the first. There's also Ridge Road at 5 o'clock in the afternoon when 20 21 the Beltline's backed up. 22 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 23 It backs up all the way. SPEAKER: 24 SPEAKER: But see, there's an argument 25 that when they do the narrative thing that's going

1 to go away, right? 2 SPEAKER: But we don't know --3 SPEAKER: Let's go -- okay. Let me go 4 back -- let's go back to the question. 5 SPEAKER: Sorry. 6 SPEAKER: Which -- and -- and phrase what 7 your -- your concern in terms of the question. 8 SPEAKER: Ultimately, the widening of 9 Ridge Road and really --10 SPEAKER: Is that a --11 SPEAKER: Of just the roads if you want 12 to put it that way. 13 SPEAKER: We can maybe put that in traffic columns. 14 15 SPEAKER: [Crosstalk]. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah, we'll wait. 17 SPEAKER: We'll wait. We'll wait. 18 SPEAKER: We'll wait, because we're all 19 going to jump on that. You're 100 percent right. 20 It was -- yeah. Yeah, we'll SPEAKER: 21 wait. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah, you know, this whole 23 we're not widening Ridge Road is a -- is a 24 [inaudible]. 25 SPEAKER: Okay.

1 SPEAKER: So, yeah. 2 SPEAKER: What do you believe will ensure 3 the safety of your family? 4 SPEAKER: Oh, I -- I think under this one 5 we can put -- I think one thing that needs to be done to ensure the safety of my family is there 6 7 needs to -- Lacy and Martin need to be included in 8 the study area. SPEAKER: And the churches. 9 10 SPEAKER: And the churches and the study 11 -- and a study needs to be done at 2:15 --12 SPEAKER: Are those schools? 13 SPEAKER: Yes. 14 SPEAKER: Oh, yeah, at the schools. 15 SPEAKER: At 7:30 in the morning, 8 16 o'clock in the morning, 2:15 in the afternoon and 3 17 o'clock in the afternoon, 'cause hundreds of 18 children walk. 19 SPEAKER: So between those two schools --20 now, between those two schools you have a 21 population of over 2,000 students. 22 SPEAKER: Okay. 23 SPEAKER: Between those two schools. 24 SPEAKER: Okay. 25 SPEAKER: Two thousand plus students. So

1 -- and you've got carpool going on, you've got 2 walkers going on, and you've got busses and when --3 just when I was at Martin, a bus hit a kid. They 4 were crossing the road and broke his leq. 5 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 6 SPEAKER: Oh. Okay. 7 SPEAKER: So this is a very --8 SPEAKER: Oh, a bus hit a kid this year 9 too. 10 SPEAKER: Oh, son of a bitch. 11 SPEAKER: Okay? Yeah? 12 SPEAKER: Yeah. 13 SPEAKER: Okay. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah, it -- yeah, and so I 15 think the study needs to be widened out some and 16 certain times. 17 That's great. That's -- these SPEAKER: 18 are good. That's what we need is where are the 19 important -- where are the [inaudible]. 20 SPEAKER: Oh, I've got one. I've got 21 one. 22 SPEAKER: Look at your notes. 23 SPEAKER: So I think one thing that would 24 help the safety of my family would be for Ridge 25 Road not to be a cut-through to Wade Avenue.

Uh-huh. 1 SPEAKER: 2 SPEAKER: Okay. So minimize use as 3 cut-through to Wade. 4 SPEAKER: Oh, yeah. I guess having --5 SPEAKER: Yep. 6 SPEAKER: [Crosstalk]. Is this one that 7 8 SPEAKER: Okay. SPEAKER: Is it just right there? 9 SPEAKER: I don't even -- what we're 10 11 saying is I don't even want a cut-way on --12 SPEAKER: Right, so figuring out how to 13 minimize that, right? So it's the concern, right? We're not -- we're not coming up with solutions. 14 15 We're coming up with concerns that Ridge Road is --16 is being used as a cut-through. 17 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 18 SPEAKER: I'm concerned that a lot of the 19 things that are on that particular chart will be 20 totally ignored because they're not in the study 21 area. 22 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 23 Uh-huh. SPEAKER: 24 SPEAKER: I understand that. 25 SPEAKER: Which is why she said to expand

the study area.

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2 SPEAKER: Right. I understand that, but 3 I think that as they -- my understanding would be 4 that as they're looking at the study area that 5 they're not going to ignore the community impact -the community input, that's why it's here, all 6 7 right? And, I mean, we're never all going to get 8 what we want, but you got to -- you got to voice your opinion now and we'll get -- it'll get to the 9 10 engineers and they will take it into consideration. 11 SPEAKER: So I don't see -- I think this 12 would fall under safety. One of the things I love 13 about our neighborhood is that the police get 14 trained in our neighborhood. 15 SPEAKER: Yeah. 16 SPEAKER: We have -- right? Who loves 17 that? 18 SPEAKER: Right. 19 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 20 So I am not kidding you, we SPEAKER: 21 have at any given time six police cars on Ridge 22 Road with recruits getting trained on how to drive 23 their stinking police cars and whatever it is they 24 do. 25 SPEAKER: You know what they do? They

1 estimate speed. 2 SPEAKER: Right. 3 SPEAKER: Like they -- they learn how to 4 estimate speed on our road. 5 SPEAKER: Right. So I -- my concern is if we turn this into a different kind of road that 6 7 we're going to lose that safety of -- of having, 8 like, a really great --9 SPEAKER: It uses Ridge Road? 10 SPEAKER: Yeah, uses Ridge Road. 11 SPEAKER: Uses Ridge Road. 12 SPEAKER: All up and down Ridge Road. So 13 from 440 down to Wade. They use the whole thing and we would lose that -- that benefit of that --14 15 just having that police presence, because even with 16 that police presence we have a decent amount of 17 crime, right? I mean, we still have break-ins and 18 all that other stuff, so --19 SPEAKER: So that's an asset? 20 SPEAKER: That is an asset that we don't 21 want to lose. 22 SPEAKER: Okay. 23 SPEAKER: Yeah, and then another safety 24 issue would be there are multiple bus stops on 25 Ridge Road obviously, but my son's bus stop is

1 literally when you get off the Beltline on Ridge 2 Road. SPEAKER: 3 Okay. 4 SPEAKER: So cars are always slamming on 5 breaks 'cause they don't see a bus stop there. 6 SPEAKER: Right. 7 SPEAKER: Yeah, it's an awful place to 8 stop. 9 SPEAKER: It's a terrible place because 10 they come around that blind corner. 11 SPEAKER: It is. Yep. 12 So school bus stops is a safe SPEAKER: 13 -- is a safety issue. 14 SPEAKER: And there is the bus stop at 15 Martin, like, a city bus stop as well. So there's 16 different kinds of bus stops. 17 SPEAKER: Okay. 18 SPEAKER: School and city, yep. 19 SPEAKER: There's school and city bus 20 stops. 21 But particularly, the one I'm SPEAKER: 22 talking about would be right where your interchange 23 is supposed to go. 24 SPEAKER: And I'm estimating the Lynn one 25 would be under the same situation, right? Do the

students wait up at that top of -- I know they used 1 2 to. 3 SPEAKER: Yeah, they do. Yep, they still 4 do. 5 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 6 SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah. Okay. 7 SPEAKER: Okay. 8 SPEAKER: And truthfully, like, one of 9 the bits you want to add on to the bus stops is 10 where there's bus stops there's never crosswalks. 11 Never, never, never, never, never, never, never. 12 SPEAKER: That's true. 13 SPEAKER: And then the kids get yelled 14 at, like you ran if front of the -- into the middle 15 of the road. It's, like, okay. So you want me to 16 walk a half a mile to a cross and then go back down 17 to my house? 18 SPEAKER: Right. 19 SPEAKER: It's not going to happen. 20 SPEAKER: Okay. Okay. All right. Let's 21 move on to the next question. 22 SPEAKER: I think we've quite filled that 23 page up. 24 SPEAKER: Yeah. We have more paper. 25 It's not a problem. We can fill more paper with

that, but I want to make sure we get through all 1 2 the questions and if you think of things we can go 3 back and -- and fill in if they -- if they fit that 4 question more. Okay. Where's my --5 SPEAKER: Yeah, that's what [inaudible]. Okay. Is there a specific 6 SPEAKER: 7 valuable community asset, something important to 8 the community or neighborhood located within this 9 project zone that you are concerned will be 10 impacted by it? If so what is it and how do you 11 believe it will be impacted, okay? 12 I might do [inaudible]. SPEAKER: 13 SPEAKER: As you think about that answer, 14 you've already got one answer. You want to put the 15 police on that one as well? 16 SPEAKER: The police one I think is an 17 asset that we love. At least I love it. SPEAKER: Okay. Police presence. 18 19 SPEAKER: I'm sure my -- I'm sure -- I 20 understand the teenagers that wish there wasn't 21 police around. SPEAKER: You know what? They kind of 22 23 ignore them, though. Like, I've seen teens do 24 stuff they shouldn't do and the police just sit 25 there and focus on their training.

1 SPEAKER: They're being -- they're being 2 kids. Yeah. 3 SPEAKER: 4 SPEAKER: Did you have -- did you -- do 5 you think -- would you feel that your non -- your 6 non-wide Ridge Road is an asset? 7 SPEAKER: Well, I -- I -- I guess the --8 the pedestrian friendliness is an asset. 9 SPEAKER: Okay. Good. Okay. Of Ridge 10 Road? 11 SPEAKER: Yeah. 12 SPEAKER: Of Ridge Road. Well, Ridge 13 Road and then Eden. That old border through there. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah. SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 15 16 SPEAKER: Glen Eden is two words, right? 17 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 18 SPEAKER: I think -- I love our 19 tree-lined streets and I am worried if we start 20 widening things they're going to take down the 21 trees. 22 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 23 SPEAKER: There's a tree that needs to 24 go, hanging over Ridge. 25 SPEAKER: You always see people walking

up and down, so presence. 1 2 Uh-huh. SPEAKER: 3 SPEAKER: Pedestrian presence? 4 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 5 SPEAKER: Yeah. I think it's -- yeah. Okay, but I think what he's trying to say is it's 6 7 more like it's -- you know, you'll go drive through 8 some neighborhoods and they're nice houses and everyone's lawn looks nice, but there's no one out 9 10 on the street. 11 SPEAKER: Yep, that's right. 12 There's no community there's --SPEAKER: 13 and ours is not like that. At any given time you 14 can be driving down there --15 SPEAKER: There's somebody walking. 16 SPEAKER: Someone's walking, someone's 17 got their dog, someone's riding their bike, 18 someone's yelling at their kid who's kicking a 19 ball, you know, whatever. There's always stuff 20 going on. I also want -- I want 21 Yeah. SPEAKER: 22 to, kind of, encourage you to think about the 23 actual study area and the interchange that actually 24 is in the study area. I know you're very focused 25 on Ridge Road and that's where you live, but I

assume that you all -- I don't even in live in 1 2 Raleigh and I've taken the -- the interchange from 3 440 to Ridge Road enough times to know that I don't 4 take it very often. 5 SPEAKER: Right. SPEAKER: So I -- I do want you to also 6 7 focus on that, you know, as you're thinking. 8 SPEAKER: Okay. Well, her and I live 9 square up -- so just so you know, when you come off 10 Ridge Road or 440 onto Ridge Road you'll hit her 11 house in about 50 feet and you'll hit my house in 12 about 70. 13 SPEAKER: Yeah, okay. Okay. 14 SPEAKER: So it's -- we are right off it. 15 That's why we're talking about speed limit zone. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah. 17 SPEAKER: Because we know they're coming 18 off those -- that highway going 60. 19 SPEAKER: Yeah. 20 SPEAKER: We know they -- we know they 21 When they get across the road -are. 22 SPEAKER: [Indaudible] they're still 23 going 60. 24 SPEAKER: They're not hitting 35 for 25 another, you know, half mile, so --

1 SPEAKER: Right. Yeah. Yeah. Okav. 2 SPEAKER: I understand what you're 3 saying. 4 SPEAKER: Yeah. 5 SPEAKER: But as far as -- I mean if you want us to talk about the -- the mall area. 6 7 SPEAKER: I don't go. 8 SPEAKER: Yeah. I mean, I don't go to the mall. 9 SPEAKER: 10 I think I remember. Do you SPEAKER: 11 guys remember that fire that happened right behind 12 the mall like a year ago? SPEAKER: Yeah. 13 14 SPEAKER: And it literally blew over and 15 landed on the woman's property right in the corner. They almost -- she almost lost her house. 16 17 SPEAKER: Yeah. 18 SPEAKER: So, like, right where you get 19 off the highway a timber flew across 440 and landed 20 there and that was it. 21 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 22 SPEAKER: So, I mean, there are things 23 that happen, like, over there that kind of impact 24 us. You know, like if something happens and they 25 shut stuff down, suddenly Ridge Road gets a time,

1 you know something like that. We had fire all 2 over, because they were worried timbers were flying 3 over the highways, fire trucks were all over. 4 SPEAKER: Right. 5 SPEAKER: Again, it was Tazwell and --SPEAKER: So is that a safety -- or 6 7 that's a traffic problem, where if something 8 happens on one of the larger roads the smaller 9 roads are impacted? 10 I don't -- I, you know -- it SPEAKER: 11 can be a safety thing because if anything happens 12 at the mall that -- that, like, we've had, you 13 know, the flooding or anything like that we end up -- affected by floods all the time. 14 15 SPEAKER: Right. 16 SPEAKER: So we end up getting the 17 residual. 18 SPEAKER: Okay. 19 SPEAKER: Anything happens at the mall we 20 get a residual. We're going to get the traffic. 21 SPEAKER: Or we're going to get the 22 responders. 23 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 24 SPEAKER: Right. 25 We're going to get something. SPEAKER:

1 SPEAKER: Because it's a cut-through. 2 SPEAKER: Yeah. 3 SPEAKER: The community aspect --4 SPEAKER: But at the same time I would 5 say being close to the mall is a community asset. 6 I mean, I like being near the mall. 7 SPEAKER: I don't go. 8 SPEAKER: I don't want to have to go to 9 town to get to it. 10 SPEAKER: Are there other thoughts about 11 what -- I mean, these are great community assets. 12 Other things located that you're concerned will be impacted? 13 SPEAKER: Well, how about noise? 14 15 SPEAKER: I mean, if we have more traffic there'll be more noise. 16 17 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 18 SPEAKER: So -- so the asset is up more 19 [inaudible]. 20 SPEAKER: Yeah, we're having trouble with 21 assets. Yeah, it's quiet right now. 22 SPEAKER: Not completely quiet. 23 SPEAKER: Right. 24 SPEAKER: Quiet considering where it's 25 located.

1 SPEAKER: Right, right. 2 SPEAKER: Comparatively considering where it's located. 3 4 SPEAKER: Yeah. The connection to Lacy is [inaudible] the field. They're out every day. 5 Both Saturday and Sunday there's people riding 6 7 bicycles and --8 SPEAKER: So at Lacy Park? SPEAKER: It's a -- a ballpark or --9 10 SPEAKER: Yeah, it's basically their 11 playground. 12 SPEAKER: Playground, yeah. 13 SPEAKER: Lacy's an elementary school, and lots of them use their playground. 14 15 SPEAKER: Yeah. 16 SPEAKER: So I would say the schools --17 SPEAKER: Definitely utilized. SPEAKER: The schools and the churches 18 19 are heavily utilized. Oh, you know another asset 20 is our community garden at the Highland. I love 21 that garden. 22 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 23 SPEAKER: Okay. 24 SPEAKER: I love that garden. 25 SPEAKER: Yeah. Uh-huh.

1 SPEAKER: I don't -- I don't go to the 2 church there, but I love the garden. SPEAKER: Okay. Where is the garden? 3 4 SPEAKER: It's on Ridge Road and it's 5 actually right next to us. 6 SPEAKER: Next door -- right next to this 7 church? 8 SPEAKER: Church and Lacy. SPEAKER: Ridge Road and what? 9 10 SPEAKER: This church. 11 SPEAKER: Oh, this church is. 12 SPEAKER: Where it -- where it -- right next to it. It said Highland Church. 13 14 SPEAKER: So Highland Church? Okay. 15 SPEAKER: I think the proximity to 16 greenways is nice too -- is another asset. 17 SPEAKER: But I don't know that we're 18 going to lose that. 19 SPEAKER: Was it --20 SPEAKER: What was the question? That 21 would be impacted. 22 SPEAKER: This is assets. 23 SPEAKER: No, this is assets. This is 24 things we don't want to be impacted. 25 SPEAKER: So tell me again what it is.

SPEAKER: That you are concerned would be 1 2 impacted, so that's what I was saying I don't know 3 that I -- we'll lose our access, but you know --4 SPEAKER: But you can put it on. Yeah, 5 for sure. 6 SPEAKER: So Greenway access. 7 SPEAKER: Greenway -- Greenway access. 8 SPEAKER: Because it's right off Glen Eden. 9 10 Yeah. SPEAKER: 11 SPEAKER: The Greenway access is squarely 12 in your study area. 13 SPEAKER: Yeah. Okay. That's good. 14 Yeah, this is what you -- what you want. What you 15 like and whether it's -- I mean, at this point we 16 don't know what's impacted, so it's more of what do 17 you want to keep or want to make sure isn't 18 impacted. 19 SPEAKER: So did we say say that access 20 to the mall was an asset? 21 SPEAKER: Yeah. 22 SPEAKER: I did. 23 SPEAKER: She did. 24 SPEAKER: Okay, but you might want to put 25 in parenthesis that was --

1 SPEAKER: Only one person. 2 SPEAKER: She was a minority. 3 SPEAKER: Everybody gets an equal voice. 4 SPEAKER: An outlier. 5 SPEAKER: It's okay. It's okay. I 6 thought you said, like, Greenleaf access, and I was 7 like, is that a restaurant? You know, Greenway 8 access [inaudible]. 9 SPEAKER: I like access to my polling 10 place, too. It's really close. 11 SPEAKER: Okay. 12 Which is right at the same SPEAKER: 13 place [inaudible]. SPEAKER: I love that answer. 14 15 SPEAKER: The other polling place is 16 right here. 17 SPEAKER: I know, but --18 SPEAKER: It's crazy. Martin and Lee 19 Ann. 20 SPEAKER: I don't even go to Martin. 21 SPEAKER: Because you can't. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. 23 [Inaudible] 24 SPEAKER: Not anymore, yeah. 25 SPEAKER: Okay. We can come back. I

mean, we -- we can go back to these. It's okay. 1 2 Traffic problems, okay. Moving on. 3 SPEAKER: [Inaudible]. 4 SPEAKER: From your perspective, what are 5 some of the most problematic traffic and pedestrian problems that need to be addressed? Be specific 6 7 with intersections, direction and/or time of day, 8 which we actually covered a little bit of those on 9 ___ 10 SPEAKER: Yeah, on the safety problems. 11 SPEAKER: So we're just going to copy 12 over. 13 SPEAKER: Well, I -- I think this is --14 it's about an intersection, but I don't know how it 15 fits into that question, but I don't see it fitting 16 into the other questions either, so --17 SPEAKER: Okay. Go ahead and write it 18 down. 19 SPEAKER: So every time the DOT gets on 20 they said something has to be done this has to be 21 done because we've had this many accidents in this 22 area. 23 Uh-huh. SPEAKER: 24 SPEAKER: I find that a little 25 misleading, because I would like to know how this

1 area compares to other intersections of the same 2 size. I also would like to know what kind of 3 accidents they are. Is it specific to problems 4 with the intersection or an accident that could happen anywhere in Raleigh? Because I'm one of 5 A lady ran into the back of me at the stop 6 them. 7 light because the turn lane light went green and 8 she thought it was our light, so she went. 9 SPEAKER: Right. 10 That has nothing to do with the SPEAKER: 11 fact I was on Glenwood Avenue. That could've 12 happened anywhere in Raleigh. So --13 SPEAKER: Okay. I -- I just think that's 14 SPEAKER: 15 something that's thrown out there like we have to 16 do this, because of this and it hasn't been really 17 quantified or qualified. SPEAKER: Right. 18 19 SPEAKER: Does that -- did I capture it? 20 That it's sort of not enough data for -- available 21 for residents. 22 SPEAKER: [Inaudible]. 23 I'm trying to frame it as a SPEAKER: 24 problem, right? 25 SPEAKER: Yeah.

SPEAKER: Of, kind of, what you're saying 1 2 is a problem and it's -- that you don't -- that 3 they -- that they say this, but they're not giving 4 you --5 SPEAKER: There's no quantitative 6 information there or qualitative. 7 SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah. Or qualitative. 8 SPEAKER: So it's just a number? SPEAKER: Yeah. 9 10 The engineers --SPEAKER: Yeah. 11 SPEAKER: No context. 12 SPEAKER: No context without a number. 13 SPEAKER: Yep. 14 SPEAKER: Well, that would bfixing a 15 problem that's not really a problem. 16 SPEAKER: Okay. 17 SPEAKER: Or that's not as big a problem 18 as -- as -- and -- well, and then -- I don't know 19 that that goes there either because the thing I was 20 -- I was going to say is not as big a problem. 21 Like, I think a lot of us -- like every time we 22 hear they say Crabtree -- Crabtree and I don't see 23 Crabtree as drawing more traffic in the future. I 24 see it as decreasing. 25 SPEAKER: That is -- that is a huge --

1 SPEAKER: 'Cause we -- I don't go. My 2 children don't go. Like, that generation just 3 doesn't go. 4 SPEAKER: This is a -- a generation of 5 non-mallers (sic). 6 SPEAKER: Yeah, exactly. 7 SPEAKER: I'm not understanding how we 8 think Crabtree's going to get worse. 9 SPEAKER: Okay. 10 SPEAKER: And Sears is closing. I mean, it's not like it's growing. It's decreasing. 11 12 SPEAKER: Yeah. 13 SPEAKER: Called the Amazon. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah. SPEAKER: Yeah. 15 SPEAKER: Like if Amazon relocates to 16 17 Crabtree Valley mall then we can worry, but I don't 18 think that's happening. 19 SPEAKER: Yeah. 20 SPEAKER: Right. 21 Because I really don't think SPEAKER: 22 we're going to end up being on the final. 23 SPEAKER: And if there were a study I --I'd be interested to know if the revenue at 24 25 Crabtree increases every year. Is it decreasing?

I mean, you are losing stores. I -- I really do 1 2 not go to the mall and I've lived here for 17 3 years. I may have gone a handful of times. 4 SPEAKER: Okay. 5 SPEAKER: Because, I mean, from what I saw, you guys have just spent hundreds of millions 6 7 of dollars on this and it -- you know, what a slap 8 in the face it'll be in five or 10 years if it was 9 completely unnecessary. 10 SPEAKER: Right. 11 SPEAKER: So I mean it's a lot. That's 12 millions of dollars, you know, that somebody in 13 politics said we need to do this, and we needed to 14 do it five or 10 years ago, but not necessarily 15 now. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah. 17 SPEAKER: I think that that's the big concern, though, is that most of that -- most of 18 19 the traffic that they addressed down there is really commuter traffic it's not mall traffic. 20 21 Yeah. It's -- they're --SPEAKER: 22 they're going through it. 23 SPEAKER: Yeah. 24 SPEAKER: Yep. They're using --25 SPEAKER: Now, and I -- and I think the

1 commuter traffic is going to probably increase so 2 3 SPEAKER: Okay. So I'm going to say commuter traffic. 4 5 SPEAKER: Yeah. He's got a good point. 6 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 7 SPEAKER: I don't think it's going to --8 SPEAKER: It's an issue. 9 SPEAKER: Yeah, because the mall cannot 10 even be open because --11 SPEAKER: Yeah, Crabtree. 12 SPEAKER: That's right. 13 Then we had -- we have specific SPEAKER: -- so we have these -- the Lacy and Martin and the 14 churches. Are there other --15 16 SPEAKER: Can you add to that before we 17 get off of it --18 SPEAKER: Sure. 19 SPEAKER: That general -- like, future 20 generation trend is not brick and mortar? 21 SPEAKER: Commuter traffic. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah, I said with a new 23 generation of online shoppers. Stuff like that. 24 SPEAKER: Shopping traffic is declining. 25 SPEAKER: Yeah, that's a good point.

SPEAKER: That's a good point to me. 1 The 2 traffic [inaudible]. 3 SPEAKER: So under commuter traffic you'd 4 say commuter traffic growing, shopper traffic 5 decreasing. That's -- I think -- sums it up good. SPEAKER: Okay. 6 7 SPEAKER: So I think -- if we can go back 8 to the whole safety thing? SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 9 10 SPEAKER: So there is a project to widen 11 440 that is happening, like, now. 12 SPEAKER: Soon -- very soon. 13 Two down, but one of the SPEAKER: 14 reasons they're doing that is because 440 gets 15 blocked up at rush hour and that's when we on Ridge 16 Road see a huge uptick. They're -- they don't want 17 to sit on 440 waiting. They jump off. SPEAKER: Right. 18 19 SPEAKER: Go down Ridge Road and jump 20 back on either at Lake Boone or Wade just to kind 21 of get through. 22 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 23 So our thing with traffic SPEAKER: 24 problems is back to this whole mall traffic thing. 25 Our other concern is once you widen 440 at Meredith

1 are you not going to have that problem? So we have 2 a major rush hour Ridge Road problem that may go 3 away once you widen Meredith. And for some bizarre reason, nobody wants to wait until that project is 4 5 over to see if that helps our traffic on Ridge 6 Road. 7 SPEAKER: And on Glenwood. 8 SPEAKER: And on -- and on Glenwood. 9 Good point. 10 SPEAKER: Okay. So the -- the widening 11 project on Glenwood? 12 SPEAKER: No. The widening project on 13 Meredith will -- should positively impact your 14 traffic on -- on Glenwood and on Ridge. 15 SPEAKER: It's around Glenwood and 16 [inaudible]. 17 SPEAKER: Right. Will --18 SPEAKER: Should positively impact 19 traffic on Glenwood and Ridge Road. 20 SPEAKER: Positively impact traffic. 21 SPEAKER: I just don't understand why 22 don't -- they don't think that -- that it will. 23 SPEAKER: Widening Meredith? 24 SPEAKER: Right. So -- so what they're 25 doing is -- no, it's --

1 SPEAKER: It's a -- Hillsborough. 2 SPEAKER: At Hillsborough, so when you 3 come down 440 and you pass Wade Road and you go to 4 Hillsborough it gets kind of narrow in there. It's 5 only two lanes instead of three. They're widening 6 it. So that's one reason why we get so much 7 traffic. 8 SPEAKER: And they're changing the exit off of Wade onto the Beltline so all of that. 9 SPEAKER: Right. It's all going to get 10 11 improved. 12 SPEAKER: Yeah. 13 SPEAKER: So once it gets improved there'll be more traffic. It'll be -- more traffic 14 15 will be able to go on 440 and they won't have to hop off at Glenwood and Ridge. 16 17 SPEAKER: But aren't you using the wrong 18 word when you say positively? 19 SPEAKER: Should positively. 20 SPEAKER: Well, I mean --21 SPEAKER: Well, he's saying --22 [Inaudible] 23 SPEAKER: She's asking a question. 24 SPEAKER: Next question. Will the 25 current widening project of Meredith positively

1 impact traffic on Ridge Road? 2 SPEAKER: Right. So if they widen that, 3 then in theory there should be less traffic on 4 Glenwood and Ridge Road. 5 SPEAKER: Right. 6 SPEAKER: Because people won't be 7 dropping off. 8 SPEAKER: And is it possible to wait to see the effects before -- before changes. 9 10 SPEAKER: Yes. Am I -- am I not saying 11 that right? How would you say it? 12 SPEAKER: Well, I understand what you're saying. I -- I don't have a better word yet. 13 14 SPEAKER: Well, if you think of a better 15 way to say it. 16 SPEAKER: Could it positively impact 17 people's decrease --18 SPEAKER: Decrease traffic. 19 SPEAKER: Yeah, but that traffic --20 SPEAKER: So if we're going with current 21 traffic problems we can say -- and it doesn't have 22 to necessarily be rush hour, Ridge Road backs up to the Beltline. Like, it's past my house. It's stop 23 24 and roll. So it's not just busier. It backs up to 25 the Beltline. Mainly because of the Glen Eden

1 light.

2	SPEAKER:	During rush hour.
3	SPEAKER:	And it doesn't have to
4	necessarily be during rush hour. It could be when	
5	there's a wreck.	
6	SPEAKER:	Well, yeah. Rush hour or a
7	wreck on 440.	
8	SPEAKER:	Yeah.
9	SPEAKER:	Oh, they're talking about the
10	same exact thing over there.	
11	SPEAKER:	An echo in the room.
12	SPEAKER:	That's right.
13	SPEAKER:	Right. Okay. Make room.
14	Okay. I got that.	
15	SPEAKER:	All right. Why not What
16	other kind of traffic problems do we have?	
17	SPEAKER:	I'm going to reiterate over
18	here the churches and	
19	SPEAKER:	And the speed limit.
20	SPEAKER:	Well, and so you were
21	SPEAKER:	and schools.
22	SPEAKER:	You were saying where specific
23	intersections and t	ime of days. So a specific
24	problem would be a a traffic problem would be	
25	speed of cars coming off of the Beltline.	

1 SPEAKER: Yep. 2 SPEAKER: Yep. 3 SPEAKER: Yep. And then -- and then I 4 just -- I just think that the light at Glen Eden --5 SPEAKER: It needs some help. 6 SPEAKER: It just needs help and there's 7 so many different things it needs help on. 8 SPEAKER: Yeah. 9 SPEAKER: The light at Glen Eden is 10 dangerous. 11 SPEAKER: It's dangerous. 12 SPEAKER: It's just --13 SPEAKER: And is it dangerous for 14 everyone or just for pedestrian kids? Because you 15 were talking about pedestrians. 16 SPEAKER: No. It's for everyone, because 17 I think it -- it -- like I said, it's -- it's a 18 multitude of problems. It backs up traffic at rush 19 hour. 20 SPEAKER: Okay. 21 There's a left turn lane that SPEAKER: you don't realize is a left turn lane until you're, 22 23 like, on --24 SPEAKER: Right. 25 SPEAKER: Some people go straight through

it. It's like it lines up with the road. 1 2 SPEAKER: I mean, the whole thing is a 3 It's just -- it's just a mess. mess. 4 SPEAKER: I'll just say it's --5 SPEAKER: And then when you are turning on it, you're turning onto a much wider road. Glen 6 7 Eden is a much a wider road than than Ridge. 8 SPEAKER: Yeah. 9 SPEAKER: There's just -- it's a little 10 discombobulating. Yeah, that's not a word, right? 11 But when you turn on to it you're like --12 SPEAKER: Right. Where do we go? What 13 do we do now? Okay. Any other thoughts before --14 I mean, and again, we can come back, but we'll -we'll keep moving here, okay? Okay. My next 15 16 question, what additional one or two things are 17 important to your household business that you want considered as this project moves forward? So it's 18 19 sort of -- we had the lightning round about this. SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 20 21 And this is -- now that we've SPEAKER: 22 gotten into the discussion -- I'm sorry, when I'm 23 moving it's hard to read. Let me -- let me move 24 the paper all around back and forth. 25 SPEAKER: We need Brianna [phonetic].

Then I only have to do one 1 SPEAKER: 2 thing, which is turn the letters over, right? 3 SPEAKER: But you could hold something. 4 SPEAKER: Right, and if you have specific 5 questions or specific concerns that we, you know, you want to -- you have a longer thought than I'm 6 7 capturing, but I do have note cards that you can 8 write on. 9 SPEAKER: So going back to that one word. 10 Yeah. Feel free. So what SPEAKER: 11 additional one or two things are important? 12 We're a much calmer group. SPEAKER: 13 It's shocking. What additional SPEAKER: 14 -- if you -- you all earned [inaudible]. What 15 additional one or two things are important to your 16 household business that you wouldn't consider? So 17 as I said, kind of going back to this lightning round, what do you want to make sure that these 18 19 designers when they go into their sessions and 20 they're thinking about, you know, what's the --21 what are the priorities that you want them up on 22 the board? 23 So okay go. SPEAKER: 24 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] So my biggest thing 25 is -- and I've been here only since my kids were in

middle school, so there -- Susan (ph), you know --1 2 there's other people here who raise children and it is a very -- because of the two schools, it is a 3 4 very kid-driven neighborhood. And that -- I think 5 a lot of people think little kids, you know, kicking balls, but I have two kids learning how to 6 7 drive in this neighborhood. 8 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. Uh-huh. 9 SPEAKER: You know, I mean, you have kids 10 that are going out trick-or-treating or just, like, 11 even when my kids were, like, unable to drive, 12 like, heading over to a friend's house and just 13 knowing that they were going to make it there safe. 14 SPEAKER: That they had to cross Ridge Road, that was my thing. Even though we have 15 16 sidewalks and they could walk, I won't want my --17 SPEAKER: There's no -- there's no place to cross until you get to Glen Eden. 18 19 SPEAKER: There's nowhere to cross Ridge 20 Road and the traffic is horrible, so I would never 21 let them do it by themselves. 22 SPEAKER: Right. So it's just -- it -- I 23 just think they need to understand when we say kids 24 we're talking zero to 18 and -- and learning how to 25 drive when people are coming off the highway at 60

and they're trying to drive 35. 1 2 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 3 SPEAKER: Like, my daughter trying to 4 pull out of Bancroft is --5 SPEAKER: It's so hard. It's so hard. SPEAKER: The girl is, like, 6 7 white-knuckled, in tears just trying to turn on to 8 Ridge Road without getting hit. 9 SPEAKER: Right. Uh-huh. 10 SPEAKER: And, you know, driving a car 11 for the first time. So I think that would be 12 something that I would really want them to realize. 13 They will really -- okay. SPEAKER: 14 SPEAKER: And I think we're really unique 15 in that neighborhood because if my impression is --16 SPEAKER: The Ridge Road neighborhood, 17 right? The Ridge Road and -- and interchange? 18 SPEAKER: Right. The Ridge Road 19 neighborhood, but our neighborhood is turned over 20 and you've got some people who raise their kids and 21 are now moving out of the neighborhood and the 22 people who are moving in are still bringing in 23 It's just -- it's just that kind of kids. 24 neighborhood because you've got the two schools. 25 SPEAKER: Yeah.

SPEAKER: Because you've got ability to 1 2 have your kids walk -- be able to --SPEAKER: And the churches because 3 4 there's some solid preschools here. 5 SPEAKER: Yeah. Oh, yeah. I'm forgetting about the preschools. Yep. 6 7 SPEAKER: And there's the preschool that 8 Lacy so there's Goddard School, there's --SPEAKER: Oh, now there's the Goddard. 9 10 SPEAKER: Yes. Yes, a lot of the 11 children walk to school. A lot of the preschool 12 moms walk their kids to preschool, so there's 13 Goddard, Moravian, here, Highland, and at Lacy is a 14 preschool. So five preschools. 15 SPEAKER: So five preschools. Five 16 preschools. 17 SPEAKER: On Ridge Road. 18 SPEAKER: A lot of dog walking, too. 19 SPEAKER: Yeah. 20 SPEAKER: It's an actual business for 21 teenagers here, dog walking. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. 23 SPEAKER: Great. 24 SPEAKER: I'll let you figure out how to 25 condense these because I'm not sure. The impacted

area -- the study area is where there's really four 1 2 intersections, only one of those intersections is a 3 neighborhood and that's Ridge Road. SPEAKER: 4 Okay. 5 SPEAKER: So not withstanding that the other three intersections that -- that Glenwood, 6 7 Lead Mine and [inaudible] are commuter 8 intersections. SPEAKER: Uh-huh, and there's no --9 10 And there's a little SPEAKER: 11 neighborhood intersection. I've lived here all my 12 life. SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 13 SPEAKER: Commercial intersections. 14 15 SPEAKER: I grew up in the neighborhood. 16 Ridge Road is one of the few neighborhoods in 17 Raleigh that remains with the same type of presence 18 that you talk about that it had in the 1960s. 19 SPEAKER: Okay. 20 SPEAKER: Bicycles and dogs and children 21 and -- and -- and kicking balls out in the street 22 and feeling free to do so. And it's already been 23 degraded enough over time --24 SPEAKER: Absolutely. 25 SPEAKER: -- with the cut-throughs and

everything else and it's not nearly as safe as it 1 2 was in the 60s and now they get to [inaudible] kill -- kill it. 3 4 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. Yep. 5 SPEAKER: Well, I think that his point is good. It's like, you're -- I -- you keep talking 6 7 about the study area, but ours is the only part of 8 the study area that is a neighborhood. SPEAKER: Yeah. 9 10 SPEAKER: And that's why we keep talking 11 about it. 12 SPEAKER: But then I think, because I --13 Glenwood's not a neighborhood. It's a mall. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah. 15 SPEAKER: Okay. 16 SPEAKER: And I think the study area has 17 to be expanded because that -- the area they're 18 studying what they're going to do to it is going to 19 have a huge impact on the one little part of Ridge Road that's in the study, but even as it goes down 20 21 further. 22 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 23 SPEAKER: Well, I had a guy here that said he worked in the neighborhood -- doesn't 24

didn't live in the neighborhood, but he worked in

25

the neighborhood, sitting next to me. And some --1 2 he said well, I don't think it's going to be that 3 big a deal. He's like, they're never going to 4 widen Ridge Road. And I said, actually I disagree 5 with you, because it would be super easy to widen Ridge Road. He said, it would be too expensive. I 6 7 said, no it would be super easy. Bye-bye bike 8 lanes. 9 SPEAKER: Yeah. 10 SPEAKER: Oh, and if we take away the 11 sidewalks we can do that too. 12 SPEAKER: Yeah. 13 Because if you have -- if you SPEAKER: 14 have that kind of traffic going through and you 15 need to widen a road, it actually isn't going to be 16 hard to widen Ridge Road at all because you have 17 those -- it's -- there -- it's a nice wide road 18 already. 19 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 20 SPEAKER: It's just that we have bike 21 lanes on both sides. 22 SPEAKER: Okay. 23 So the second that you take SPEAKER: 24 away the two bike lanes, that's a car lane. 25 SPEAKER: Uh-huh.

So -- so it's important to you 1 SPEAKER: 2 -- can I say that it's important to you to keep the 3 bike lanes and the sidewalks on Ridge? 4 SPEAKER: Yes, because we keep being told 5 there's no plans to widen Ridge Road and then let's see what the plans are in five years or 10 years. 6 7 SPEAKER: Yeah. Once traffic --8 SPEAKER: It's a slippery slope, as they 9 say, yes. SPEAKER: Well -- well, I don't believe 10 11 [inaudible]. 12 SPEAKER: And then one of the DOT 13 gentlemen that I spoke with said that he -- he 14 thought this would be less traffic he -- that we 15 didn't want Ridge Road to be used as the 16 cut-through because that's what he does when he 17 goes to PNC Arena and the Beltline backed up. Wouldn't we feel more comfortable if it was our 18 19 neighbors coming through here going to the mall? 20 And I'm like that's silly because everybody's going to realize it's a cut-through right to Wade Avenue. 21 22 Like, you're not going to have that fact, and ways 23 are going to tell you to go that way. 24 SPEAKER: Right.

25 SPEAKER: Like, we're not going to get

1 less cut-through traffic, but I don't understand 2 what his reasoning was there. 3 SPEAKER: Yes, I think the biggest 4 concern is that we'll get more traffic and more 5 traffic will result in another project, which will be to widen Wade Road. 6 7 SPEAKER: Yep. 8 SPEAKER: And so, regardless of whether 9 widening Wade Road is a concern now, it will be a 10 concern in the not so distance future. 11 SPEAKER: Right. 12 SPEAKER: And, if you want an exactly, 13 like, a clear example of that, you could use 14 Creedmoor Road, where the -- where it intersecting 15 Millbrook and Lynn Road. 16 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 17 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 18 SPEAKER: There was no plan to widen them 19 and their both four lanes now. 20 SPEAKER: Yeah. 21 SPEAKER: Okay. 22 SPEAKER: Yep. 23 Going back again. Okay. We've SPEAKER: 24 got Ridge Road. Going back to any of the other 25 intersections, do you have any other thoughts about

the other intersections? 1 2 SPEAKER: All Metroplex, is going to be 3 over there. 4 SPEAKER: I mean, you know, I'll say what 5 I've said in a meeting before when I was just getting a little bit prissy is the reason you have 6 7 this problem, is 100 percent on the same people who 8 are trying to fix this problem. SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 9 10 So, you built a whole bunch of SPEAKER: 11 apartments without considering traffic and now it's 12 on -- now it's on us to fix your --13 SPEAKER: Did you see where they tore the 14 house down? That -- way in the back by the hotel 15 and they're building up more apartments? 16 SPEAKER: Yeah, oh yeah. Those are all 17 going to be apartments. 18 SPEAKER: So -- so I'm going to put that 19 under the traffic problems and the specific 20 problems, right? 21 SPEAKER: Yeah, okay. 22 SPEAKER: The specific intersections and 23 where are the -- and the -- and the apartments are 24 where? 25 SPEAKER: Oh god, they're everywhere.

1 SPEAKER: Everywhere. 2 SPEAKER: Everywhere. SPEAKER: That's the problem. So, Lead 3 4 Mine, Blue Ridge, Glenwood. 5 SPEAKER: You guys, what's that -- what's 6 that -- Hill Road, what is that road? 7 SPEAKER: Blue Ridge? 8 SPEAKER: The one where the big hill? 9 No, no, no, that comes off of it, Kidd's Hill. 10 But, off the road. 11 SPEAKER: Kidd's Hill. Kidd's Hill area. 12 SPEAKER: Yeah, K-I --13 SPEAKER: D-D --SPEAKER: K-I-D-S? D-D? 14 15 SPEAKER: Yeah, two D's. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah, connect -- coming off of 17 Blue Ridge here and, you know, it goes this way to 18 the mall. 19 SPEAKER: Oh, yeah. Okay. Yes. 20 SPEAKER: Oh, that's Bates Cars 21 [phonetic]. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. 23 SPEAKER: Bates Cars [phonetic]. 24 SPEAKER: Okay. So, the apartments have 25 increased?

SPEAKER: Yes. Oh. 1 2 SPEAKER: A million of them. 3 SPEAKER: I live in Durham, we know about 4 apartments everywhere. 5 SPEAKER: Yeah, apartments. Yeah, Durham is totally different than it used to be. 6 7 SPEAKER: You now have Crabtree Boulevard 8 Avenue -- Avenue Boulevard, I guess is what it was called? 9 10 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 11 SPEAKER: It's a dead end now at 12 Creedmoor Road. 13 SPEAKER: Crabtree Avenue Boulevard? We 14 put a road & a street in there? 15 SPEAKER: Yeah, where Creedmoor 16 transitions over to Edwards Mill. 17 SPEAKER: Dead ends. 18 SPEAKER: Dead ends at Creedmoor? 19 SPEAKER: At intersection of Creedmoor 20 and Edwards Mill. 21 SPEAKER: Yeah, Creedmoor slash Edwards 22 Mill. 23 SPEAKER: And that's problematic? 24 SPEAKER: Yeah. 25 SPEAKER: Yeah, very [inaudible].

SPEAKER: Yeah. I mean, its like they 1 2 decided to build a bunch of apartments because 3 people want to live near a mall, which kind of 4 cracks me up, because people don't actually say I 5 don't live near a mall anymore, but, their building the apartments anyway. 6 7 SPEAKER: Yeah. 8 SPEAKER: So, you have literally 9 surrounded Crabtree Valley Mall with apartment 10 building, after apartment building, after apartment 11 building and then you turn and say why do we have 12 all these traffic problems? 13 SPEAKER: Yeah. 14 SPEAKER: And, to our point, that's what 15 -- where you said it's more commuter traffic than 16 mall traffic. They're not going to the mall, 17 they're going to all the freaking apartments you built without any consideration about roads. So, 18 enjoy your taxes. Don't make us fix it. 19 20 SPEAKER: Right. 21 Okay. Okay. SPEAKER: 22 SPEAKER: And did we put anywhere -- make 23 a point of saying that -- that I'm back to Ridge 24 Road, not the other intersections. That the entire 25 road is residential until you get to the Wade

Avenue interchange? Because, my point is like I 1 2 just don't understand why people are sitting around in a room thinking we need to alleviate some 3 4 traffic on Glenwood and then they though, oh, well, 5 let's put an interchange that goes up in to a residential neighborhood with three churches, two 6 7 schools and a bunch of houses. That just makes no 8 sense. 9 SPEAKER: Yeah. 10 SPEAKER: Have you ready for one more 11 traffic problem? 12 Of course. We'll make it work. SPEAKER: 13 SPEAKER: Interstate highway intersecting 14 with a neighborhood street? 15 SPEAKER: Okay. 16 SPEAKER: I mean that goes back to the --17 it's a 35 speed limit on Ridge Road and they're coming off at 60, because it's a highway. 18 19 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 20 And the only reason we haven't SPEAKER: 21 had anything catastrophic happen is because what's 22 her name has a big lot with a farm, so there's not 23 a lot going on there and then they have that open 24 area so the houses are kind of pushed back, because 25 I think if you had a lot of interaction going on up

there, there are going to be accidents and death 1 2 all the time. Accidents all the time. 3 SPEAKER: 4 SPEAKER: I mean, if you had kids trying 5 to cross up there, it would be a nightmare. SPEAKER: That's why I don't let me kids 6 7 cross up there. 8 SPEAKER: Okay. Okay. So let's get to the last question and then we can revisit. 9 What 10 can NCDOT do to demonstrate being a partner with 11 the community of stake holders while tackling the 12 complex transportation challenges created by rapid 13 urban growth in Wake County? 14 SPEAKER: All right. 15 What do you want DOT to know SPEAKER: 16 that what do you want them to do? 17 SPEAKER: You need to partner with the 18 people who are -- who are -- who are approving all 19 of these building permits. I've never lived in a 20 city where they left hand and the right hand had no 21 freaking idea what they were doing. 22 SPEAKER: Okay. 23 So, if you're going to build SPEAKER: 24 all these apartments, then where -- why aren't you 25 involving transportation in there?

1 SPEAKER: Right. 2 SPEAKER: Why aren't you talking about 3 bus stops in front of those -- those apartments and 4 what -- how big the roads are and what the 5 expectation is of other building things that are going on that are going to impact streets. I -- it 6 7 just -- it just -- everyone is sitting in their own 8 little silo, making their own little decisions and 9 not having any idea what anyone else is doing. 10 SPEAKER: Right, I mean transportation, 11 apartments, bus stops, you know. 12 SPEAKER: Yeah, schools, you know, like 13 -- that's the other thing, like, you know, don't 14 even get me started on the schools. 15 SPEAKER: Don't even get me started on 16 the schools. 17 It will be the happiest day of SPEAKER: 18 my life when I'm done with Wake County Public 19 School. 20 SPEAKER: Oh my god! I'm like -- I don't 21 mean to rub it in your face but two in a half year. 22 SPEAKER: Okay. That's -- that's off 23 topic. Bring it back here. That's a whole other 24 listening session that I am not going to work. 25 What else?

SPEAKER: Yes, that listening session 1 2 won't happen. 3 SPEAKER: No. 4 SPEAKER: They don't listen. 5 SPEAKER: My grandchildren are now graduating from college, so I [inaudible]. 6 7 SPEAKER: But what else? What -- what --8 what would you like -- how would you feel -- what 9 would make you feel that DOT is listening to you and your neighbors and the people in your 10 11 community? 12 SPEAKER: For them to ever actually react 13 in a way -- in a positive way to those being asked 14 to do instead of just going right on ahead with 15 whatever their plan is. 16 SPEAKER: So, this is good, this is a 17 step in the right direction. I think they are actually listening. 18 19 SPEAKER: I don't know, are they? I don't know, do you think it's 20 SPEAKER: 21 just PR? Is it just PR? 22 SPEAKER: We weren't allowed to hear in a public forum what -- what one gentleman had to say. 23 24 So then -- I mean, here, you'll have no voice 25 inflection, you'll have no body language, you would

1 be like a test rat. 2 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 3 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 4 SPEAKER: So, it will divide and conquer, 5 then. 6 SPEAKER: I think the other problem with 7 the DOT -- and I think it's just my problem in 8 North Carolina in general -- is that the DOT seems to only be focused on cars. 9 10 SPEAKER: Yeah. 11 SPEAKER: On what? 12 SPEAKER: On cars. On vehicles. And, 13 you know. 14 SPEAKER: Can you state that on a 15 positive. 16 SPEAKER: On combustible, four-wheel --17 SPEAKER: So what would you like them to 18 -- to focus on instead? Putting it in a more 19 positive way. 20 SPEAKER: I have an inside into the 21 younger generation and they, like, there are kids 22 not even getting their licenses. They have no 23 interest in driving. 24 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 25 SPEAKER: Okay? So they're going to

bike, they're going to walk, they're going to take 1 2 public transportation, they're going to bird scooter, those stupid things. Whatever they're 3 4 going to do, but they're going to -- they're going 5 to -- they're going to Uber it. They're going to -- they're going to, you know, ride share. 6 7 SPEAKER: There's easy ways for them to 8 get around. 9 SPEAKER: There's all the kinds of things 10 that they're way more interested in than cars. 11 SPEAKER: Okay. So, bikes, walking, 12 scooters, public -- public transportation, Uber. 13 SPEAKER: Uber. 14 SPEAKER: Uber's a big one for kids, 15 because that is an easy way for them to get around, 16 which -- it concerns me, 'cause I'm like, you don't 17 get your license, who's going to be the Uber driver? 18 19 SPEAKER: Exactly! 20 SPEAKER: Have you thought this through 21 people? 22 SPEAKER: Okay. So it's -- it's a --23 it's a -- did I capture it that -- that it -- they 24 should -- the positive is you want them to focus on 25 something other than cars?

SPEAKER: Well, I just think they need to 1 2 look at other -- if they -- if everyone around 3 Raleigh keeps calling us a city, which I don't 4 think we are --5 The world keeps changing. SPEAKER: If they want to say we are a 6 SPEAKER: 7 city then they need to look at other cities and see 8 what they are doing, because -- besides Atlanta, 9 because they don't do it well, either. And that's 10 my concern is, like, we keep wanting to say we're a 11 city, but then we keep -- we keep building like 12 we're urban and we're just going to keep adding 13 streets and parking lots. 14 SPEAKER: I don't know -- I don't know 15 what you're saying -- I don't know where --16 SPEAKER: I think it would be --17 SPEAKER: I'm sorry. SPEAKER: Go ahead. I'm sorry. 18 19 SPEAKER: I don't know where you put this 20 If it is a [inaudible] it would fall in a one in. 21 lot of these questions. If you think that Crabtree 22 Valley is a problem -- that whole study area's a 23 problem, take yourself out to the intersection of 24 540 and I believe 401 North at 8:00 a.m. and it 25 will make -- it will make Crabtree Valley look like

1 an easy passthrough.

2 SPEAKER: Seem like no big deal, yeah. 3 Yeah.

4 SPEAKER: Anyone who spends \$231 million 5 down here to solve the problem is not nearly as 6 significant as one on, I believe, 401. And I know, 7 because I was just out there two weeks ago at 8 8 o'clock.

9 SPEAKER: So, would you say --10 SPEAKER: Prioritize the project. 11 SPEAKER: Yeah. Prioritize the projects 12 that are --

SPEAKER: Prioritize the expenditure ofthe problems.

15 SPEAKER: I think -- I think there's a 16 lot of people around here that're suspicious this 17 was a very political project. They thought it was 18 going to go too fast and quick and they were going 19 to be able to throw something in the win column. 20 SPEAKER: And the legislature gave them

21 the money to that.

22 SPEAKER: The legislature not only give 23 them the money. They said to do it quickly.

24 SPEAKER: Yeah.

25 SPEAKER: So they wanted a quickie.

1 SPEAKER: Falling into the corporate 2 spend it or lose it mentality. 3 SPEAKER: Yes. 4 SPEAKER: I have to just say 448, 401. 5 SPEAKER: 448, I'm sorry. SPEAKER: 448 --6 7 SPEAKER: 548. 8 SPEAKER: 540. 9 SPEAKER: Problem is we have too many 10 40s. 11 SPEAKER: Yeah. A lot of 40s. SPEAKER: 40. 445. 540. 12 13 SPEAKER: Yeah. 14 SPEAKER: 140 had the biggest. 15 SPEAKER: So on the on project on the 16 political question how do we -- how do you phrase 17 that? What would you like to know? What would you 18 like to know from DOT about the politics? 19 SPEAKER: How about --20 SPEAKER: Transparence? 21 What about specific benefits? SPEAKER: 22 And how are they greater than the benefits of other 23 needed areas or areas of need? I mean I would like 24 to like big bang for your buck if we're going to do 25 it and I don't think this is one that I would like

add it like to me Glenwood and that intersection 1 2 while its always relatively busy unless its --3 SPEAKER: It move. 4 SPEAKER: It moves unless its Christmas 5 or 8 o'clock in the morning or 5 o'clock in the 6 afternoon. 7 SPEAKER: Even 8 o'clock in the morning? 8 SPEAKER: Can I say why is this urgent? SPEAKER: Yeah. 9 10 SPEAKER: Yes. 11 SPEAKER: Yeah. That's a good one. 12 Perfect. I would also like to say politics, 13 question mark. I would just like to say that 14 traffic is not that -- does not appear extremely 15 problematic except for certain times of the day. 16 SPEAKER: Yeah. So when you have a bunch 17 of people here I drive through Glenwood all the 18 time and I agree. It's all it's you don't love it, 19 because there's a lot of stoplights but it moves. 20 SPEAKER: Yeah. It's no worse than many 21 other places in Raleigh. 22 SPEAKER: Yup. It moves. 23 SPEAKER: But the size of the road that 24 it is that how many lanes it is and you know that 25 it takes you to so many places it moves very well.

1 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 2 SPEAKER: Except for certain times in the 3 night of the day, but I would argue you that you 4 could go almost anywhere in the Triangle --5 SPEAKER: Exactly. You live in Durham, you can say that. 6 7 SPEAKER: It takes 25 minutes just to get 8 out of Durham. SPEAKER: 147 there is one really bad 9 10 intersection. It's not an intersection, but when 11 you come off the Beltline getting on to Glenwood 12 not going towards the mall, but you come off and it 13 seems like it's going to be a free-flowing lane and you can merge, but you have to stop at that --14 Is this? 15 SPEAKER: 16 SPEAKER: -- stop sign --17 SPEAKER: I think that's where a lot of 18 accidents happen. 19 SPEAKER: Yeah. 20 SPEAKER: Oh that's terrible. Yeah. I 21 know what you're talking about. 22 SPEAKER: Because nobody realizes you 23 have to stop. 24 SPEAKER: Right. 25 SPEAKER: So you're talking about when

1 you get off Ridge Road and go left to go to Ridge 2 or right to go to Glenwood? 3 SPEAKER: Yes. You go right to Glenwood 4 and it leads you back. 5 SPEAKER: It's not a stop sign. I 6 thought it was a yield. 7 SPEAKER: Is it a yield? 8 SPEAKER: And it's a long yield. It's 9 like you can kind of can go. 10 SPEAKER: But you can't really go, 11 because people are trying to get on. 12 SPEAKER: Exactly. 13 SPEAKER: 440. 14 SPEAKER: I think it might be a stop now. 15 SPEAKER: Is it a stop now? 16 SPEAKER: I think it is. 17 SPEAKER: Okay. So its 440 and so you're 18 going to Ridge. 19 SPEAKER: Yeah. You get off at Ridge and 20 instead of going left to go to Ridge you go right 21 to go to Glenwood and that --22 SPEAKER: I agree with that. That's very 23 problematic. 24 SPEAKER: And you see that's -- no. But 25 that's poor design. Again, when you're looking at

those number of wrecks that the DOT keeps saying we 1 2 have to do something, because there's been how many 3 ever wrecks over the last five years. Again, 4 that's poor design and that's doesn't have to do 5 with the whole mall thing really. SPEAKER: Right. It's just the poor 6 7 design. 8 SPEAKER: To have, you know, the 9 accidents like me just sitting at a stoplight and 10 one turns green and the person thought it turned 11 green that has nothing to do with the intersection 12 and I also want context. I want to know like to 13 tell me another intersection like this, how many 14 wrecks did they have? 15 SPEAKER: So I'm going to put -- I'm 16 going to reiterate this question over here. 17 SPEAKER: Right? 18 SPEAKER: And you need to be more 19 transparent, because I hate when people just throw around data but it's like --20 21 SPEAKER: Did you just --22 SPEAKER: Of course. You always pick the 23 data that supports your you know --24 SPEAKER: We are doing this, because of 25 all these accidents.

1 SPEAKER: But then no ones asking like 2 okay lets give me some details on those accidents. 3 SPEAKER: Need to be more transparency. 4 Transparency. 5 SPEAKER: Yup. It has to be shown that 6 it's specific to --7 SPEAKER: The problem. 8 SPEAKER: If we move those if we did what we did how is that going to decrease the accidents? 9 10 And if it's just you're going to have less cars 11 well I don't. 12 SPEAKER: What solution will help solve 13 the problem? Or will the solution? SPEAKER: How will the solution solve 14 15 accidents problems specifically? 16 SPEAKER: Okay. 17 SPEAKER: And I think to know that you 18 literally would have to know those 2,000 accidents 19 or whatever they're saying like what was the 20 specifics of each one? Just like I said. Mine was 21 not related to that intersection. It could have 22 happened anywhere. 23 SPEAKER: To go back to that traffic 24 thing the DOT when we talk about partnerships, but 25 you know how it -- I feel like the DOT is very

1 reactive. Like here's a problem and now we have to 2 fix it rather than proactive. SPEAKER: Like where is --3 4 SPEAKER: Yes. You know what, Wake 5 County is growing but it's growing like weeds. Not growing like weeds everywhere. There are certain 6 7 pockets that are growing more than others so why 8 aren't we focusing on figuring out where those 9 pockets are going to be and making sure that 10 they're ready before we have problems. 11 SPEAKER: Okay. 12 SPEAKER: So like in other words this 13 neighborhood really hasn't grown, right? 14 SPEAKER: No. 15 Yeah. You tear down a house, SPEAKER: 16 you put up a house. 17 SPEAKER: Exactly. You tear down a small 18 house and put up a humongous house. Seriously, 19 there's still more people moving into that house, 20 right? SPEAKER: 21 Yeah. 22 I mean, I am amazed. SPEAKER: Ι 23 remember this one house got built and I was like I 24 went inside, young couple. They didn't even have a 25 kid yet. I was like, oh my God. You are like

1 7,000 square feet. It's nuts. Anyway -- anyway --2 SPEAKER: It's a hotel here. 3 SPEAKER: So anyway they rip down those apartments and in behind Martin and what they put 4 5 up? They put up apartments so --6 SPEAKER: Well -- there are more --7 SPEAKER: Well, my point being there is 8 it's not changing that much, so it's not us that's the problem. 9 10 SPEAKER: Well, and the homes has 11 expanded but the apartments have --12 They need to be more proactive SPEAKER: 13 around the growth areas and not reactive. 14 SPEAKER: Yeah. If you're getting 15 building permits to build a billion apartments 16 around Crabtree Valley Mall then they should know 17 that ahead of time and the DOT should have a plan 18 for dealing with the bazillion apartments that 19 you're planning to build around. 20 SPEAKER: Or then you say it's not 21 feasible. 22 SPEAKER: It's not feasible or 23 economical. It's not feasible. 24 SPEAKER: Or the DOT has a vote in it and 25 says no you know what you don't get to give a

1 building permit there, because our road structure 2 is never going to be able to handle that. 3 SPEAKER: There's no capacity. 4 SPEAKER: You're going to have to --5 SPEAKER: You've got to put separation on DOT and city responsibility. That's where the 6 7 problem. 8 SPEAKER: That's where the problem is. 9 SPEAKER: Yeah. DOT doesn't have a 10 responsibility --11 SPEAKER: And that's why I'm talking 12 about a DOT partnership. 13 SPEAKER: Yeah. 14 SPEAKER: Really. 15 SPEAKER: A partnership. 16 SPEAKER: That's right. That's right we 17 don't. SPEAKER: State and local --18 19 SPEAKER: State and local are not --20 SPEAKER: Cooperative. 21 SPEAKER: Jiving. 22 SPEAKER: They're not what? 23 They're not jiving. SPEAKER: 24 SPEAKER: Jiving. 25 SPEAKER: Don't put that down.

1 SPEAKER: Cooperation is the professional 2 word. SPEAKER: There's no jive. 3 4 SPEAKER: There's no jive. 5 SPEAKER: Okay. What else? So this has 6 been a --7 SPEAKER: You're not old enough. 8 SPEAKER: To say jive? 9 SPEAKER: No. You're not old enough. 10 SPEAKER: You're doing a great job. 11 That's what I was going to say. 12 SPEAKER: [inaudible]. 13 SPEAKER: Oh really? 14 SPEAKER: Yeah. And really there's not 15 going to anymore traffic. 16 SPEAKER: Wow. 17 SPEAKER: So Lake Boone Trail and Blue 18 Ridge we couldn't attest to that, right? 19 SPEAKER: Okay. So we've gotten through 20 the questions as we were instructed. 21 SPEAKER: So that brings up the Blue 22 Ridge expansion. That is happening now, is that 23 correct? 24 SPEAKER: Yes. 25 SPEAKER: So what will that do to this

area? Like will that take some of the headache off 1 2 the traffic or no? SPEAKER: I don't know. 3 4 SPEAKER: We're -- we're in Blue Ridge at 5 the intersection of Blue Ridge and Ridge Road 6 excuse me Blue Ridge and Hillsborough. 7 SPEAKER: Oh? In Hillsborough? 8 SPEAKER: Blue Ridge and Hillsborough. 9 SPEAKER: I thought it was coming up 10 though towards the mall? 11 SPEAKER: I don't know. Oh you're -- oh 12 you're talking about the Blue Ridge widening? 13 SPEAKER: Yes. SPEAKER: Close to the mall. 14 15 SPEAKER: Yeah. Yeah. SPEAKER: That's just that -- that won't 16 17 hurt anything. That's just the widening to three 18 lanes --19 SPEAKER: Okay. 20 SPEAKER: -- through there. So that's 21 not really going to have a big impact, in my mind 22 on the traffic situation. 23 SPEAKER: Okay. 24 SPEAKER: Okay. Do you want to look 25 through the questions again and you all have been

great? You have been fabulous participants. I 1 2 appreciate the I appreciate the good humor on a 3 passionate topic. Makes my job easier when you're 4 actually talkative and not --5 SPEAKER: I mean I think you know just because I know you don't know the technicality of 6 7 the project, but since this started everyone in 8 this neighborhood had she went up there and said we 9 had energy. Okay. We were pissed off --10 SPEAKER: Right. 11 SPEAKER: -- because you --12 SPEAKER: That's pretty clear. 13 SPEAKER: Yeah. You guys put together a 14 study area that did not include our neighborhood 15 and the fact that you did not include our 16 neighborhood is just you trying to avoid what you 17 knew was going to be a problem. SPEAKER: 18 Right. 19 SPEAKER: You knew this neighborhood was 20 going to get negatively impacted so we won't put 21 them in the study so that they don't think they 22 have a problem and unfortunately, we are apparently 23 brighter than we look, because we figured it out. 24 SPEAKER: I hear you. I would say that I 25 did not put together the project.

SPEAKER: I know you didn't so no -- no 1 2 -- no I'm saying --3 SPEAKER: Let me ask you this positively 4 of what you want DOT to do. Would you want to put 5 Ridge Road into the study area? SPEAKER: Yeah. Ridge Road needs to be 6 7 in the study area. 8 SPEAKER: The whole part of it. 9 SPEAKER: I think we mentioned that, but 10 it's like it doesn't seem like it's getting 11 listened to, because the study area has not 12 In the six months that people have been changed. 13 bitching and moaning about this project it hasn't 14 changed. 15 SPEAKER: Yeah. 16 SPEAKER: One word, transparency, used 17 100 times in these meetings or lack of transparency 18 between. 19 SPEAKER: And I think the concern is that 20 they expand the study area then where do you put 21 the line, but the plain and simple fact is when 22 you're going to put anything off of a highway onto 23 a street that entire street needs to be considered. 24 That is I just that's just common sense. So --25 SPEAKER: You're going to bring someone

1 off the highway --2 SPEAKER: You're going to take someone going 60 miles per hour onto 35 --3 4 SPEAKER: Onto a neighborhood street. 5 SPEAKER: Onto a 35 mile per hour road. 6 SPEAKER: Not another road, a 7 neighborhood street. 8 SPEAKER: Oh, that's the other thing we should talk about. Every single one of the 9 10 exchanges in the study area is outside of the 11 Beltline, except for us. We are inside the 12 Beltline. That is -- that is a distinctive thing 13 in Raleigh, to be inside the Beltline and outside the Beltline. 14 15 SPEAKER: Okay. So --16 SPEAKER: And we pay taxes. 17 SPEAKER: A lot of taxes. 18 SPEAKER: Only intersection in study area 19 inside the Beltline. 20 SPEAKER: Yes. 21 SPEAKER: Stand [inaudible] put ITB? 22 Does everyone know what that means? 23 SPEAKER: Yeah, everyone knows what that 24 is. 25 SPEAKER: Everybody does?

1 SPEAKER: Yeah. Okay. Others are OTB. 2 SPEAKER: OTB. 3 SPEAKER: And you all pay taxes? More 4 taxes? 5 SPEAKER: Well, I mean we're -- I think 6 our property taxes are. I mean it's the same rate, 7 but we're --8 SPEAKER: Different bceause of property 9 values. 10 SPEAKER: The values is a lot. 11 SPEAKER: Property values correct. The 12 property values are higher, so yes. Thank you. 13 SPEAKER: Okay. I was going to say how 14 does that work that you're taxed higher, but you 15 have higher property values. 16 SPEAKER: But it's the same higher --17 higher property values, therefore --18 SPEAKER: I mean all you have to do is 19 cross the bridge on -- on Glen Eden. 20 SPEAKER: Yeah. 21 SPEAKER: And it's huge difference. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. Yeah. 23 SPEAKER: You literally drive over 440 24 and the property taxes go up. Or the property 25 values.

1 SPEAKER: The property values go up. 2 Yeah. SPEAKER: SPEAKER: That -- that is what the --3 4 Yeah 5 SPEAKER: Yeah. Yeah. SPEAKER: Thus the taxes. 6 7 SPEAKER: I was like, I don't think 8 there's a city county line. Not for that one, but property values for sure. Okay. 9 10 And it, like Glenwood is SPEAKER: 11 Highway 70 or Highway --12 SPEAKER: Yeah, 70. 13 SPEAKER: Yeah, 70. 70. 14 SPEAKER: 15 70. SPEAKER: 16 SPEAKER: So you truly are -- and the 17 Beltline is a highway. Not--18 SPEAKER: Yeah. 19 SPEAKER: I guess I. Whatever. 20 Interstate. 21 SPEAKER: Yeah, interstate. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. 23 SPEAKER: So you're truly bringing 24 highway-interstate traffic to a neighborhood road. 25 It makes no sense.

1 SPEAKER: Right. Right. I think we --2 Yeah. SPEAKER: 3 SPEAKER: Yes, I think we said bringing-4 SPEAKER: I agree. 5 SPEAKER: -- highway traffic to 6 neighborhood road. Right. Okay. I'm just going 7 to -- I'm just going to bring us back to assets. 8 SPEAKER: Okay. SPEAKER: Since there's a lot of what was 9 10 wrong. Right? 11 SPEAKER: Right. 12 SPEAKER: Any more thought about what --13 what was -- what's right -- what -- what's good? I mean if we -- we've had some of it in important 14 15 things like, you've got bike lanes and sidewalks. 16 Other thoughts about -- thinking about those 17 specific places what you -- what makes you happy as 18 you drive by them. 19 SPEAKER: We repeat ourselves an awful 20 lot this morning, but Chart 3 --21 SPEAKER: Yeah. 22 SPEAKER: Just about every one them is 23 outside the study area. 24 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 25 SPEAKER: Okay.

1SPEAKER: Yeah. So -- so the things --2the things that we're saying we love --

3 SPEAKER: That we know are going to get 4 impacted.

5 SPEAKER: -- and we know they're going to get impacted. There's just no way they can't. You 6 7 just - it's just impossible. So the reason we've 8 written all this, and the outside is, you know --9 the plain simple fact is the study area that you 10 guys keep trying to talk about, three quarters of 11 it is all commercial stuff. Everything that's on 12 Glenwood is commercial. Everything that -- it's a 13 very -- they're very commercialized neighborhoods. Whatever you want to call them. Ours isn't. And 14 so the reason we're bringing up these things is 15 16 because you're -- you're going to impact -- you're 17 going to bring that commercial stuff and ruin all So I don't know -- I mean I agree, it's 18 this. 19 like, I mean I'm trying to think of community 20 assets, you know like, that are more in the study 21 area, but I think the biggest problem is that 22 you're going to take your study area and dump it on 23 our neighborhood. That's what you're going to do. 24 You're going to pick that study area up and just 25 throw it right on.

SPEAKER: And there's no -- like at one 1 2 of the meetings somebody said, will this bring --3 do you think this will bring more traffic? And the lady said, well, we don't want to do anything that, 4 5 you know, brings more traffic. Or something, I can't remember exactly what was said. But it's 6 7 impossible not to bring more traffic. So you can't 8 do it and not bring more traffic to Ridge Road. It 9 just doesn't even make --10 SPEAKER: Well, then, why are you doing it? If -- if it's not to -- well, what we were 11 12 told is you guys were trying to relieve traffic on 13 Glenwood, but we're not going to bring more traffic 14 to Ridge Road. 15 SPEAKER: Yeah, there's no way. 16 SPEAKER: You're literally talking out 17 both sides your mouth. There's no way that it happens. 18 SPEAKER: 19 SPEAKER: Yeah it can't -- it can't do 20 it. So I mean, I think -- you know when you talk 21 about what do we love. Quiet neighborhood -- I 22 mean part of --23 We already have a lot of SPEAKER: 24 traffic. 25 SPEAKER: You know, I think they're

waiting for us to be like, oh! I love my corner 1 2 store or whatever. It's -- we don't have that. 3 It's not a commercial neighborhood. It is a 4 neighborhood. It is a neighborhood that you --5 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] SPEAKER: -- that you have a hard time 6 7 finding nowadays. Right? You have a hard time, 8 especially in this area. Like, I moved from 9 another part of Raleigh. We had -- my neighborhood 10 was a neighborhood, but had no sidewalks, no 11 lights, no crossing thing. So when my kid went out to play, it was -- it was a neighborhood, you know 12 13 like a development. 14 SPEAKER: Right. Yeah. 15 So, you know, there wasn't a SPEAKER: 16 ton of traffic, but it wasn't --17 SPEAKER: It didn't have the amenities. It doesn't have the amenities. 18 SPEAKER: 19 Here, it's like my kid can get on a bike, in a bike 20 lane, ride over to his friend's house, do whatever 21 he's going to do, then -- and then, you know, leave 22 his bike -- oh, I left my bike at so-in-so's, 'cause we went to so-in-so's. So I walked home. 23 24 And he can walk home on a sidewalk. It's just a 25 completely different feel.

1 SPEAKER: Right. 2 SPEAKER: That it's a unique 3 neighborhood. 4 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 5 SPEAKER: And that's why we're -- we're 6 _ _ 7 SPEAKER: Right. 8 SPEAKER: -- fighting on. 9 SPEAKER: Right. Right. I understand. I understand. I think we --10 11 SPEAKER: So there's no other assets. I 12 can't think of any other assets. 13 SPEAKER: But there -- the other --SPEAKER: We don't have ice-cream trucks 14 15 that come through there, right? 16 SPEAKER: If you're looking -- Glenwood 17 and Creedmoor, Blue Ridge, Lead Mine, all along 18 that area, 440. Just to remind you what the study 19 of area is. 20 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] 21 SPEAKER: So this is Glenwood right 22 there? 23 SPEAKER: I'm really [Inaudible] with the 24 questions. 25 SPEAKER: [Inaudible]

So we're like, right at the 1 SPEAKER: 2 edge. The edge, right? 3 Yeah, right there at the edge. SPEAKER: 4 Yeah, right there. 5 SPEAKER: Yep. 6 SPEAKER: So where is Ridge Road? 7 SPEAKER: So Ridge Road is -- kind of 8 runs parallel from Glenwood -- Glenwood to here. 9 This is all the way down. 10 [Inaudible] It is -- this links SPEAKER: 11 -- [Inaudible] 12 So you get off at Glenwood, and SPEAKER: 13 you immediately get on --14 SPEAKER: No, so you can get off 440 and 15 you could go to the right and go to Glenwood, or 16 you can go stay to the left and come down Ridge 17 Road. 18 [Inaudible] The impact section SPEAKER: 19 [inaudible] at Ridge Road. 20 SPEAKER: If it were really -- just 21 really not on there. 22 SPEAKER: Yeah -- so this is -- we are 23 technically in the study area. But Ridge Road goes 24 all the way down here. 25 SPEAKER: All the way [inaudible].

SPEAKER: So you stopped it at a point --1 2 SPEAKER: Right. Right. 3 SPEAKER: -- where it's still getting 4 impacted. 5 SPEAKER: Yeah. 6 SPEAKER: Like the -- one of the schools 7 is right here. And then the other school is down 8 here. I always come up Ridge Road 9 SPEAKER: 10 from Wade Avenue and never go all the way up, so. 11 SPEAKER: Yep. Yep. 12 SPEAKER: I don't have reason to go. So 13 -- so --14 SPEAKER: So and besides Wade Avenue, 15 those are the only stores we have. So --16 [inaudible] and the avenue you had like wholesales 17 18 SPEAKER: And all of this is -- is 19 congested sometimes, but it still moves. Like you 20 said. So it -- and during the morning and the 21 evening it's worse. 22 SPEAKER: Especially when you get over 23 here, there's nothing over here. 24 SPEAKER: Yeah. Nothing. 25 SPEAKER: It's just right here.

1 SPEAKER: Yeah. 2 SPEAKER: Right in front of the mall, 3 'cause people are turning up Lead Mine or up 4 Creedmoor. 5 SPEAKER: Now, there was that discussion 6 about that second entrance into the mall. The one 7 that goes to the upper deck. 8 SPEAKER: Yeah. SPEAKER: They were -- discussion about 9 10 if that light wasn't there, it would move even 11 faster. 12 SPEAKER: Faster. Yeah. 13 SPEAKER: And is that even needed? I don't know. 14 SPEAKER: I think it's needed on the 15 other side. 16 17 SPEAKER: Yeah. 18 SPEAKER: People turn on it, you know, 19 coming off of, like coming [inaudible] --20 SPEAKER: Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. 21 SPEAKER: -- go in that way. 22 SPEAKER: I do want to kind of -- I'm 23 trying to figure out how to capture that. And I 24 think -- did I already say that -- did I already 25 put it up that you are saying that the intersection

1	actually does move?
2	SPEAKER: Yeah.
3	SPEAKER: Yeah.
4	SPEAKER: Yeah.
5	SPEAKER: [Inaudible] but it's not
6	SPEAKER: I mean I travel Glenwood Avenue
7	going in that direction, so I so I'll come
8	SPEAKER: So let me put it over here in
9	important things.
10	SPEAKER: I come up I come up off
11	of here, get right my kid my kids are scared
12	to drive on 440 when they first started driving.
13	SPEAKER: Right.
14	SPEAKER: So we we go onto 440,
15	technically and, but stay in the right and get
16	right onto Glenwood. Do you know what I'm talking
17	about, right?
18	SPEAKER: Yeah.
19	SPEAKER: And then they turn left. And
20	so my daughter has piano lessons so we go up Lead
21	Mine and go, like so we do that once a week. My
22	son does Taekwondo, so we go up to Creedmoor and
23	he's off so I'm travelling up and down this all
24	the time. Usually very nervous, because I have a
25	15-year-old driving and I'm going to die.

1 SPEAKER: I know. SPEAKER: And we travel and -- and I'm 2 3 letting my 15-year-old go on there. The traffic is 4 not horrible or scary. It's what? Five lanes. 5 Right? 6 SPEAKER: Yeah. 7 SPEAKER: It's pretty wide. And that's 8 her biggest concern is, okay. When I'm coming off onto Glenwood and taking a left, what lane, Mommy? 9 10 What lane? And I'm like, get all the way to the 11 right so that you can take your right onto Lead 12 Mine. 13 SPEAKER: Okay. SPEAKER: So I mean, it is --14 SPEAKER: So it moves. 15 16 SPEAKER: -- so you're really -- it 17 moves. 18 SPEAKER: Yeah. 19 SPEAKER: What I'm hearing is that part 20 of the frustration is it seems like this is not as 21 bad --22 SPEAKER: Not that big of a problem. 23 SPEAKER: Yeah, this is not that big of a 24 problem. 25 SPEAKER: No.

1 SPEAKER: Are you --2 SPEAKER: Yeah, I'm trying to find Ridge 3 Road. 4 SPEAKER: Oh. Oh, you can't see it 5 either. SPEAKER: So --6 7 SPEAKER: It -- it's kind of going 8 parallel along this 40 right here. Like right in here. 9 10 SPEAKER: Oh. Okay. 11 SPEAKER: No, it's not showing it. That 12 -- that's hysterical too that you guys came to 13 Ridge Road. We've been studying that, but it 14 doesn't show Ridge Road. 15 SPEAKER: Exactly. Exactly. 16 SPEAKER: 'Cause we're not on there. 17 SPEAKER: You mean the study area is the 18 only --19 SPEAKER: No, no, no. The Study area is 20 -- I don't know why there's only one circle there. 21 It's all this gray area. It's all that dark gray 22 area. 23 SPEAKER: [Inaudible]. 24 SPEAKER: Do you know if a similar kind 25 of thing is going on about Six Forks Road?

SPEAKER: I do not know. I don't -- I 1 2 know that this group, Partners for Impact has not 3 been hired to do that. They've only been hired to 4 do this specific section. 5 SPEAKER: This specific thing. SPEAKER: So if DOT is doing it on Six 6 7 Forks Road, then they're doing it with somebody 8 else. SPEAKER: I feel like Six Forks is -- is 9 10 a far bigger problem. 11 SPEAKER: Oh it is. 12 SPEAKER: Okay. So I'm going to put that 13 over here. 14 SPEAKER: And they keep [inaudible]. SPEAKER: There's other areas like Six 15 16 Forks Road. 17 I'm kidding. Actually, like SPEAKER: 18 North Hills -- I mean I think they thought they were being pretty smart making it three lanes --19 20 SPEAKER: Yeah. SPEAKER: But maybe make it a Glenwood. 21 22 SPEAKER: Yeah. 23 It needed to be five. Again, I SPEAKER: 24 think, you know, when they built that they were 25 like, oh, we're going to think ahead and make it

three lanes. It's not going to need that right 1 2 away. But now it does. And now they have no way 3 to widen it. 4 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] really really 5 getting the sense that [inaudible] all the study 6 area is on Ridge Road [inaudible]. 7 SPEAKER: And we're not even in it. You 8 know --9 SPEAKER: Okay. 10 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] 11 SPEAKER: Okay. Okay. That's good. 12 That's good. 13 SPEAKER: 'Cause I haven't thought about 14 that --15 SPEAKER: Yeah. 16 SPEAKER: -- in what you were saying 17 today. 18 SPEAKER: It's because it's the most --19 the biggest impact, almost. 20 SPEAKER: Sorry, I stole that from you. 21 SPEAKER: It's okay. 22 SPEAKER: I mean why wouldn't the people 23 right around the Glenwood Interchange here 24 [inaudible]. 25 SPEAKER: Well, even, like this part of

1 the study area -- okay. So we were talking about 2 being inside the Beltline. So technically this, all this is inside. 3 4 SPEAKER: Yeah, it's [inaudible]. 5 SPEAKER: But this part of Glenwood, 6 that's all businesses. 7 SPEAKER: Right. 8 SPEAKER: All businesses. 9 SPEAKER: Right. 10 SPEAKER: So --11 SPEAKER: Well, I think that -- that the 12 ___ 13 SPEAKER: There's no houses there. 14 SPEAKER: -- the concern for this project 15 is try to get those businesses, those business 16 owners, the people that work there --17 SPEAKER: Right. 18 SPEAKER: -- into these sessions too. 19 SPEAKER: Right. 20 SPEAKER: Right. So that -- 'cause 21 they're affected by the traffic. 22 SPEAKER: Right. 23 Right. They're going to be SPEAKER: 24 affected. So it is -- that is the goal, is to get 25 people. That's why there's some in the evening,

some on Saturdays, to get more people -- all the people who are impacted. Not just the people who live there.

SPEAKER: And if I worked on Glenwood Avenue, I would say, yes, there's a lot of traffic. I wish I could get to my work sooner. But I could say that about anywhere in Raleigh. If I worked on Falls of the Neuse, I'd say the same thing, yes, there's a lot of traffic. I'd like to get there sooner. I mean, see [inaudible] big difference.

11 SPEAKER: It's interesting 'cause a 12 business person, you can have employees saying, I 13 want to get there earlier, there's traffic. But 14 then you get the business owners going, oh, I like 15 all the traffic, because I'm getting all this 16 drive-by.

17 SPEAKER: Yeah. Yeah.

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SPEAKER: And now you could be takingaway my drive-by.

20 SPEAKER: Or they could be saying, I need 21 -- I needed to slow down so people can actually, 22 like turn in to my driveway without --23 SPEAKER: But there's turn lanes --24 SPEAKER: There's many ways. But I mean 25 that's why -- the idea it's that -- when Beth said,

1 ask her. Tell her. Ask the people at the grocery 2 store. Ask whatever to come to the listening 3 sessions because the idea is to get more than --4 SPEAKER: What about those --5 SPEAKER: -- more voices. And actually 6 get more diverse voices. Right? You know, those 7 apartment dwellers. 8 SPEAKER: -- those huge houses they just 9 built at the corner of [inaudible] like, right --10 like if you come down [inaudible]. 11 SPEAKER: You know, the young [inaudible] 12 ___ 13 SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah, yeah. 14 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] humongous houses right there. 15 16 SPEAKER: What are their experiences? 17 SPEAKER: [Inaudible] of that. 18 SPEAKER: Okay? 19 SPEAKER: Oh yeah. All this is going on 20 now. 21 [Inaudible] the negative SPEAKER: 22 economic impact to some businesses a part from this 23 project. And I'm sure you're wondering what I'm --24 SPEAKER: Will there be a negative 25 impact?

SPEAKER: -- where I'm referring to. But 1 2 I represent the group that owns three of the hotels 3 on the other side of 440. What they're talking 4 about doing is -- is widening -- taking [inaudible] 5 Boulevard, bringing it up through those properties 6 7 SPEAKER: And put it through those 8 hotels? 9 SPEAKER: Yeah. 10 Yeah. SPEAKER: 11 SPEAKER: -- and building a huge 12 retaining wall so your going to have added traffic, 13 you going to have added lights, you going to have 14 horns, you going to have [inaudible] on your -- on 15 the road switching up there, [inaudible] nightmare. 16 So from a business point of view, negative impact. 17 SPEAKER: Okay. 18 SPEAKER: Oh see, I thought the hotels 19 would have been happy 'cause they get the drive-by. 20 SPEAKER: But in the beginning --21 SPEAKER: Absolutely not. 22 SPEAKER: They weren't, okay. 23 SPEAKER: But in the beginning, the 24 hotels didn't even know about it when Judy went 25 over there and asked them about it.

SPEAKER: We already did. 1 2 SPEAKER: They did? 3 SPEAKER: Well, yeah. I've been 4 following this project since 2013. 5 SPEAKER: Okay. All right. Well, that's 6 good to know. 7 SPEAKER: Maybe whoever she saw that day 8 didn't know about it. SPEAKER: That's good to know. 9 10 SPEAKER: You must have a [inaudible]. 11 SPEAKER: I've got all of the renderings 12 from back in 2009 and '10 when they did those. 13 SPEAKER: Okay. So when they first -- am I crazy? 'Cause when they first sent something to 14 15 us, I thought the proposal -- this was years ago, 16 then they dropped it. I thought the proposal was, 17 cut off the bridge at --18 SPEAKER: Ridge. 19 SPEAKER: -- Ridge so nobody coming off 20 the Beltline onto Ridge. But then there was no 21 mention of bringing an interchange there to go into 22 the mall at that time. 23 SPEAKER: No, no there -- there was. 24 SPEAKER: There was? 25 SPEAKER: Yeah. I could bring -- there

1 were. 2 SPEAKER: Okay. SPEAKER: About six different 3 4 possibilities --5 SPEAKER: 'Cause I didn't understand 6 that. 7 SPEAKER: -- for design at that time. 8 SPEAKER: Uh-huh. SPEAKER: And most of those included --9 10 five out of the six included an interchange through 11 a neighborhood. 12 Okay. Somehow I missed that. SPEAKER: 13 'Cause I was excited about the bridge being gone. 14 SPEAKER: Sure, yeah, sure. 15 SPEAKER: Yeah, that'd be great. And we 16 didn't say that. I don't know --17 SPEAKER: No. Here's -- [inaudible]. 18 SPEAKER: But I don't want the bridge 19 gone and the interchange to come. We take the bridge, 23 then you have less traffic, but we'll bring the 24 interchange. 25 SPEAKER: We're about at the end of our

time.
