| 13 | the city. Preserving green space, making it a |
| 14 | smart city, not just a not just a big city. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: Okay. Does that relate to |
| 16 | safety or is that whatever |
| 17 | SPEAKER: Oh, absolutely it absolutely |
| 18 | does. I don't think I don't want my I want |
| 19 | to live in and I want my children to grow up in a |
| 20 | city that has trees and has green space and not |
| 21 | more roads going to a mall. |
| 22 | SPEAKER: Okay. |
| 23 | SPEAKER: What else comes to mind when |
| 24 | you think about safety? And we're talking about |
| 25 | safety in all of the that whole study area. |

| 4 | this once already, I'm happy to just chime in. |

| 6 | needs to respect needs to be designed for the |
| 7 | future and realize that transportation is more than |
| 8 | one dimensional, it's more than just automobiles. |
| 9 | We have to be we have to have a safe way to |
| 10 | handle bicycles, scooters, pedestrians, children, |
| 11 | joggers. This isn't just about moving cars in and |
| 12 | out of Crabtree. In fact, I would say that |
| 13 | designing to help Crabtree is a big, big mistake. |
| 14 | Because Crabtree is the past, not the future. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: Did I get that? |
| 16 | SPEAKER: Yeah. I don't know how you |
| 17 | write so fast. It's a gift. |
| 18 | SPEAKER: Does the city have anything to |
| 19 | do with the that big hotel that they going to |
| 20 | build down that Crabtree. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: I can't answer that. I don't |

| 23 | SPEAKER: Because that's going to create |
| 24 | a traffic problem. |

| 15 | there will be a hotel there. |

| 19 | SPEAKER: That is what I'm talking about |

| 13 | it? |
| 14 | SPEAKER: This is. Let me just say it |

| 18 | very close to the 440 exit, and what we have had |
| 19 | since we've moved in is several people that are |

| 22 | terms of safety, because it's a thoroughfare for |
| 23 | non-residential traffic, it brings it just |
| 24 | brings traffic that you, kind of, wouldn't expect |
| 25 | to come to your home. So I don't I don't know |

| 10 | SPEAKER: [Inaudible] to Blue Ridge Road. |
| 11 | SPEAKER: Same. |
| 12 | SPEAKER: That's because all the signs |
| 13 | are covered up with trees. |
| 14 | SPEAKER: That's right. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: That sounds like a safety |
| 16 | concern, too. I mean, it might not be dealing with |
| 17 | this process, but |
| 18 | SPEAKER: You can't see the speed signs, |
| 19 | you can't see the street signs, they're all covered |
| 20 | up. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: Okay. does this capture your |
| 22 | Ridge Road thoroughfare for non-residential-traffic |
| 23 | people getting lost and knocking on doors? |
| 24 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 25 | SPEAKER: Of homes, right? That's pretty |

| 1 | wild. Okay and the signs covered by trees. Right. |

| 3 | SPEAKER: Trees, greenery, whatever. |
| 4 | SPEAKER: Right. Okay. Other thoughts |
| 5 | about safety? You had a word, before the smart |
| 6 | city. |
| 7 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 8 | SPEAKER: That was your word, before. |
| 9 | SPEAKER: Who, me? |
| 10 | SPEAKER: Before your more trees? |
| 11 | SPEAKER: Yeah, what I was saying in |
| 12 | terms of safety is I think there's there are a |
| 13 | lot of different ways to look at safety. It's not |
| 14 | just a matter of you know, my boys go to Lacy |
| 15 | Elementary well they did, they just left but |
| 16 | there's a lot of different ways to look at safety |
| 17 | and it's not just, you know, it's not just about |
| 18 | cars. It is about wanting my children to grow up |
| 19 | in a place where we actually have trees and green |
| 20 | space and we have oxygen. If we cut down every |
| 21 | tree, we're not going to, I mean, our city's going |
| 22 | to be full of smog. |
| 23 | SPEAKER: Uh-huh. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: And that speaks to the property |
| 25 | value [inaudible]. |

| 4 | now in terms of safety. All of the people that |
| 5 | have been flooded in the eastern part of the state. |
| 6 | If we take away ten acres of forested, pervious |
| 7 | land and we cover it up with concrete, right near |
| 8 | Crabtree Creek, it's I mean, we're that's a |
| 9 | safety issue. |
| 10 | SPEAKER: Am I going to get dinged for |
| 11 | writing climate change or are we all good with |
| 12 | climate change. |
| 13 | SPEAKER: Yep, yep. Flooding. |
| 14 | SPEAKER: Noise. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: [Inaudible] trouble with |
| 16 | construction. |
| 17 | SPEAKER: Is there any way we can get a |
| 18 | wall, wall off that stuff? Like the [inaudible]. |
| 19 | SPEAKER: They have a wall on [inaudible] |
| 20 | 158 going towards [inaudible]. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: Yeah, there are walls all |
| 22 | around. It cuts off, at least, the |
| 23 | SPEAKER: Yeah, light pollution. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 25 | SPFAKER. Okay Okay We can come back |

| 14 | SPEAKER: That's right, there's a |
| 15 | community park, there's a |
| 16 | SPEAKER: [Inaudible]. |
| 17 | SPEAKER: Yes, [inaudible]. |
| 18 | SPEAKER: Community Park and a and a |
| 19 | |
| 20 | SPEAKER: Well, but one is one is used |
| 21 | as a city park. Varnell Park, itself, is used as a |
| 22 | city park and then there is a community garden park |
| 23 | that's the Beckanna what's it called? |
| 24 | SPEAKER: Beckanna Community Garden. |
| 25 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |

| 10 | children to play in, people walk their dogs, go and |
| 11 | sit. |
| 12 | SPEAKER: Yeah. And I've seen they've |
| 13 | got their basketball court, so at the corner of |
| 14 | Ridge Road and Varnell. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: There a creep going there. |
| 16 | SPEAKER: Their going to take that park |
| 17 | in connection with this project. |
| 18 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 19 | SPEAKER: Okay. |
| 20 | SPEAKER: Which park is that? |
| 21 | SPEAKER: Varnell Park will be completely |
| 22 | taken as a part of this project or it could be. So |
| 23 | what they're talking about, the Varnell Park that's |
| 24 | on the corner of Ridge and Varnell |
| 25 | SPEAKER: Okay. So there's one on |

| 1 | Varnell and Dade, and one on Ridge and Varnell? |

| 3 | SPEAKER: Yeah. And the city park that |
| 4 | has the basketball court that she was talking about |
| 5 | is the one on the corner of Ridge and Varnell. |
| 6 | SPEAKER: Okay. |

| 8 | SPEAKER: Judy's [phonetic] father |
| 9 | donated both lands. |
| 10 | SPEAKER: Right. |
| 11 | SPEAKER: Okay. |
| 12 | SPEAKER: Yeah. And you know, and that's |
| 13 | something that the city must respect and the DOT, |
| 14 | also. Because, you know, Judy's [phonetic] father |
| 15 | donated this land with the understanding that it |
| 16 | would be a park, not be paved over. |
| 17 | SPEAKER: Okay. |
| 18 | SPEAKER: Then there's the Glen Eden |
| 19 | Pilot Park, on Glen Eden. Which has tennis courts, |
| 20 | eating area, meeting a building for community |
| 21 | meetings and a bunch of other things. |
| 22 | SPEAKER: What other community assets are |
| 23 | in the area? |
| 24 | SPEAKER: Our sidewalks. |
| 25 | SPEAKER: Okay. |

| 1 | SPEAKER: It's, you know, many, many |
|----|---|
| 2 | areas in Raleigh don't have sidewalks. We do. |
| 3 | SPEAKER: And the sidewalks are full of |
| 4 | children going to and from school and church |
| 5 | activities. |
| 6 | SPEAKER: Yeah. That's our that's our |
| 7 | lifestyle here and this is why most probably, |
| 8 | why most of us moved here. |
| 9 | SPEAKER: One thing they've done recently |
| 10 | is put bicycle lanes on all the roads I drive. |
| 11 | SPEAKER: Would you take |
| 12 | SPEAKER: Which is very dangerous to me |
| 13 | with a |
| 14 | SPEAKER: If they take ten feet out of |
| 15 | our front yard for the bicycle lane, I'm really |
| 16 | going to be upset. |
| 17 | SPEAKER: Well, [inaudible] |
| 18 | SPEAKER: Because how many bicycles are |
| 19 | on that street? I see one every once in a while. |
| 20 | Maybe two a year. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: So I guess we could put like |
| 22 | our property itself, like, they say, their property |
| 23 | lines. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: They become the delivery lane. |
| 25 | SPEAKER: That they ride in |

| 1 | SPEAKER: When we have decision ones were |

| 2 | made, and I have quite a history with bicycle |
| 3 | lanes. |
| 4 | SPEAKER: How many bicycles do you see? |
| 5 | SPEAKER: Not a heck of a lot. That's |
| 6 | one of the reasons why we don't have why we |
| 7 | still have on-street parking on Glen Eden. And |
| 8 | that's a whole another battle. |
| 9 | SPEAKER: Do you understand? Their |
| 10 | saying there aren't that many bikes that use it, |
| 11 | and we already have bike lanes, so we don't need |
| 12 | SPEAKER: You have bicycle lanes on |
| 13 | Ridge? |
| 14 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: Is that an asset, or no? |
| 16 | SPEAKER: No, they're saying there aren't |
| 17 | that many bikes on that use it now, so why |
| 18 | why do we need |
| 19 | SPEAKER: But they're taking on their |
| 20 | streets. How about on Ridge Road. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: That is Ridge Road. Ridge Road |
| 22 | is a long road. |
| 23 | SPEAKER: That's Ridge Road. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: So not not |
| 25 | SPEAKER: Not all of Ridge Road has |

| 1 | bicycle access. |

| 2 | SPEAKER: And we don't need it |
| 3 | SPEAKER: And it's not needed. |
| 4 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 5 | SPEAKER: Not if you're going to take ten |
| 6 | feet of our front yard. |
| 7 | SPEAKER: Okay. |
| 8 | SPEAKER: No, we don't want to take |
| 9 | people's front yards for that. |
| 10 | SPEAKER: I think they just as soon move |
| 11 | into your house, just give it up. I mean that I |
| 12 | mean that it at it being sarcastic [inaudible]. |
| 13 | SPEAKER: Yes, ma'am. You need to point |
| 14 | that out to him. |
| 15 | SPEAKER: I think the, you know, the ten |
| 16 | plus acres of trees that are at the end of Ridge, |
| 17 | that whole area is wooded at the end of Ridge. |
| 18 | That's an asset that needs considering. |
| 19 | SPEAKER: Yeah, it sure is. |
| 20 | SPEAKER: It certainly is an asset. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: There again, it deflects the |
| 22 | sound. |
| 23 | SPEAKER: Yeah. It absorbs it absorbs |
| 24 | rain water. |
| 25 | SPEAKER: [Inaudible] too. |

| 8 | SPEAKER: So the trees? Put the trees on |
| 9 | here? |
| 10 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 11 | SPEAKER: Yes. |
| 12 | SPEAKER: Absolutely. City of the |
| 13 | city of oaks is going to be the city of stumps. |
| 14 | SPEAKER: Are there things that come to |
| 15 | mind and again, I'm going to push you think a |
| 16 | little bit beyond your own neighborhood to the |
| 17 | whole study area other things that are around |
| 18 | that interchange or the other interchanges in the |
| 19 | study area? |
| 20 | SPEAKER: One thing that concerns me is |
| 21 | that people get lost out there all the time. And |
| 22 | they are constantly knocking on your door, trying |
| 23 | to find which way to go. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: Right. Yeah. We got that over |
| 25 | here. |

| 1 | SPEAKER: Oh, you got that down. I'm |

| 3 | SPEAKER: It's okay. |
| 4 | SPEAKER: My memory is not very well. |
| 5 | SPEAKER: It's okay. It's okay. We got |
| 6 | it. Yeah, I was thinking that wall was not going |
| 7 | to support the stickiness. |
| 8 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 9 | SPEAKER: It's okay. We want to make |
| 10 | sure that we capture everybody's concerns. |
| 11 | SPEAKER: I'll keep my mouth shut. |
| 12 | SPEAKER: No, don't do that. |
| 13 | SPEAKER: Repeat so many times. |
| 14 | SPEAKER: No, don't [inaudible]. You can |
| 15 | tell us again, it's okay. Any other thoughts? And |
| 16 | again, we can come back, this is not the end of the |

| 20 | bicycle lanes that they have now, painted, brand |
| 21 | new bicycle lanes all up and down the road, each |
| 22 | street. Because somebody's going to get hurt. |

| 15 | makes it easy to get around our city. And what we |
| 16 | and so that we don't and we can sort of |
| 17 | system that minimizes the carbon impact of what we |
| 18 | do. |
| 19 | SPEAKER: [Inaudible] to that same point |
| 20 | the way, you know, we are becoming a less |
| 21 | mall-centric society, and you know, to devastate |
| 22 | that the that north end of Ridge Road in |
| 23 | order to put a direct access to the mall is just |
| 2.4 | not warranted now. |

SPEAKER: Uh-huh. That's right.

| 1 | SPEAKER: I mean, it may have been |

| 2 | warranted 20 years ago; it's not warranted today. |
| 3 | It is not, you know, to ruin these peoples' |
| 4 | properties and all of Ridge Road where our kids go |
| 5 | to school, for another intersection to the mall, |
| 6 | another access to the mall. |
| 7 | SPEAKER: I feel like you seem to know |
| 8 | more than I know. Like, you're speaking of a plan |
| 9 | that I'm not aware of. You know, like, what |
| 10 | what what are you basing I want to know. |
| 11 | Like, what are you saying you think is purposed to |
| 12 | happen? |
| 13 | SPEAKER: They're |
| 14 | SPEAKER: 'Cause they you know, she, |
| 15 | kind of, said, whatever you thought you saw ten |
| 16 | years ago, that's not the thing they're about to |
| 17 | build. |
| 18 | SPEAKER: That's that's not true. |
| 19 | SPEAKER: Okay. So you're going with the |
| 20 | assumption that that is true? |
| 21 | SPEAKER: No, it's not an assumption. |
| 22 | SPEAKER: Yes, it is. |
| 23 | SPEAKER: No, it's not. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: So can you do you have an |
| 25 | answer to that I mean do you have an answer |

| 1 | to that question? |

| 3 | know the DOT came up with plans in 2018 that |
| 4 | adopted the 2011 study that put that interchange at |
| 5 | the north end of Ridge Road. I've seen them. |

| 7 | SPEAKER: I've seen them, and I can show |
| 8 | them to you. |
| 9 | SPEAKER: Okay. |
| 10 | SPEAKER: I can show what will happen to |
| 11 | your house. |
| 12 | SPEAKER: Right. So from what you're |
| 13 | understanding, you're talking about that Crabtree |
| 14 | that Valley Road |
| 15 | SPEAKER: Crabtree Valley Avenue. |
| 16 | SPEAKER: making it way out to the |
| 17 | 440. |
| 18 | SPEAKER: At that interchange, the |
| 19 | proposal is to put that interchange to connect |
| 20 | Crabtree Valley Avenue to 440 on your property. |
| 21 | SPEAKER: Okay. And I hear you saying |
| 22 | that, and I get where you got it, but I also saw |
| 23 | her say, bullet point, Ridge Road not to be I |
| 24 | don't know, I guess I just feel like |
| 25 | SPEAKER: I'll show it to you after the |

| 13 | of Ridge Road in their front yard. I don't know |
| 14 | your name, so I'm sorry |
| 15 | SPEAKER: It's Ryan and Rhoda [phonetic]. |
| 16 | And if you're right, it would be my front yard, but |
| 17 | |
| 18 | SPEAKER: It's yes. |
| 19 | SPEAKER: Yeah. Yeah. |
| 20 | SPEAKER: And you keep saying Crabtree |
| 21 | Avenue. |
| 22 | SPEAKER: Crabtree Valley Avenue. |
| 23 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: The one behind Crabtree |
| 25 | SPEAKER: Okav. The one that runs up |

| 1 | behind Crabtree. |

| 3 | [inaudible]. And it is the point that the |
| 4 | purpose of it was for a direct connection to the |
| 5 | wall from I-440. |
| 6 | SPEAKER: And also, what they plan to |

| 8 | SPEAKER: Yeah. |
| 9 | SPEAKER: Well, that may be a I don't |
| 10 | know who's planning to do that. |
| 11 | SPEAKER: [Inaudible] coming in that |
| 12 | street. |
| 13 | SPEAKER: Well, I hope the I mean, I |
| 14 | can't imagine that well, yeah, I can. That's |
| 15 | the problem, I can imagine that 2018, DOT would do |

| 8 | the world's problems here. But I think that what |
| 9 | our friend here is the skepticism I hear is, you |
| 10 | know, look at what they plan to do at the |
| 11 | intersection of White Avenue and 440. You know, |
| 12 | take half the you know, take half of Meredith |
| 13 | College and half of the Faculty Club. That's what |
| 14 | that's why were suspicious, frankly. |

| L7 | SPEAKER: There's no traffic study |
| L 8 | whatsoever. |
| L 9 | SPEAKER: They going to have to be out |
| 20 | there to control all the traffic |
| 21 | SPEAKER: See what we're going through |
| 22 | now, what that [inaudible] what addition that's |
| 23 | going to put on us. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: Well, what happens when, you |

Ridge Road is a city street; Crabtree Valley Avenue is a city street. If the City of Raleigh does not want Crabtree Valley Avenue extended and connected to I-440, the DOT won't do it because it's a city street. So they won't need to put that intersection at the end of Ridge Road if they don't extend Crabtree Valley Avenue. The City of Raleigh needs to step up and say, don't do this; that needs to be DOT and City

| 23 | think. |
| 24 | SPEAKER: They just need to leave Ridge |
| 25 | right alone |

| 1 | SPEAKER: Yeah. Just leave yeah. |

| 3 | SPEAKER: Bottom line. |
| 4 | SPEAKER: Bottom line. |
| 5 | SPEAKER: Bottom line, just leave it |
